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A Wise Relief Policy.

YESTERDAY'S newspaper told how a penniless and injured Portland man was sent back to his home from Klamath county through the efforts of the local relief offices and co-operating agencies. That story is illustrative of a policy adopted by Klamath relief authorities which promises to save a great deal of money and to prevent Klamath Falls from becoming a dumping ground for the coming winter for the hungry and destitute from other communities.

The plan calls for a close investigation of relief applicants, particularly as regards their claims to residence here, and for the moving out of all those who should be getting their help elsewhere. It is especially effective in relieving the county from the burden of individuals and families who become stranded here without money either for sustenance or for moving on.

To move such people out frequently involves an immediate expenditure of money, but in the long run it should prove a great saving by lightening the relief burdens here. The case of the Portland man is an example of this. Had he not been moved out immediately, he might have stayed on indefinitely, receiving support and medical attention from local agencies. It is possible that his wife and children might have found some way of getting here from Portland, adding an additional relief burden here. By the expenditure of a few dollars from the Consolidated Relief council for charity train fare to Portland, all certain and possible expenses in connection with this case were cancelled.

Frequently, nomadic families become stranded in some community when the gasoline in their automobile is exhausted. The supply of a little motor fuel will serve to move them on. Cases have come to light, also, where local residents who have been

placed on relief lists have written to destitute relatives, inviting them to come and obtain similar support. The relief plan seeks to eliminate such burdens.

This policy should prove economical and is well worthy of public support. Our relief burden is such that we have our hands full taking care of our own.

Regulating the Time and Place of Play.

NOT the least of the police department's concern is for children. This time, however, the worry doesn't arise from another of those many recent incidents of child delinquency discovered by the police and reported to the county juvenile judge.

Making the city an unrestricted playground for children has increased the accident hazards. Boys particularly, and a few girls so say the officers, have turned the busiest streets and sidewalks into skating rinks and bicycle tracks. Pedestrians have been bumped and scratched and motorists have narrowly escaped having serious accidents on their hands.

It's not especially the duty of the police department to regulate the place and hours for children after school. The department, of course, is willing to co-operate, but it is the obligation of the parents to cultivate the habit of safety among their children and to eliminate the possibility of fatalities and serious injuries.

The holocaust that wiped out 50 lives in the Los Angeles district brings a thought of Oregon's freedom from serious disaster, of this sort. While heat waves, earthquakes, floods and fires take their tolls elsewhere, the people of Oregon live in comparative security from such misfortunes. True, there are occasional incidents in which one or even a few lives are lost in Oregon, but such terrible tragedies as that which occurred at Los Angeles are almost unknown in this beautiful state.

Over in Western Oregon Linn county farmers are going in for potato growing. They call their product the Linn spud, and are making great claims for it. Now look for the Albany newspaper to seek to horn in on the pleasant controversy that keeps them lively on this side of the mountain.

With Corvallis high school sending its team to meet the Klamath Union high school Pelicans, Saturday should prove a big day for the football fans.

NEWS VIEWS

A few days ago the same diplomatic sources inspired a yarn that an army of 800 counter-revolutionaries had been organized in an outlying province and was on its way to Havana. The days of the Grau regime were supposed to be numbered.

Investigation disclosed that the army was composed of 35 men who overthrew a mayor and went home to bed.

A dozen times or more the news has been passed that an American naval vessel was being rushed to protect American lives and property. In each instance the stories failed to pan out. Either the warship went and found everything peaceful or it failed to move from its Havana berth.

There is plenty of thievery, but most of it is due to hunger. The food shortage has induced many to seek relief by the kitchen windows. Whenever this happens to an American, the diplomatic dispatch usually says the home was "looted."

Individually these happenings could be attributed to human errors. Collectively they seem to indicate a state of mind usually not associated with diplomacy.
