TURKEYS FATTENED FOR THANKSGIVING

Approximately 5500 turkeys were brought to the Geary ranch from the Big Marsh country during the past month, awaiting the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons when they will grace the groaning dinner tables of hungry fatteners.

These turkeys have fed almost entirely on grasshoppers during their growing season and are still devouring the winged pests, although they are served a little grain these days for dessert.

The hopper-fed birds are not comparable to those which have been raised on a balanced ration, according to E. M. Hauser, assistant county agent, but they are in excellent condition and though they will not bring the high prices that the grain fed birds command, the cost of raising them has been so low that the net profit on the hopper-fed turks will probably be higher.

The turkeys were raised by Reynolds and Griffin of Colorado, but were purchased at Independence, Ore., soon after they were hatched. The growers plan to dress out the birds and ship them to outside markets in large consignments, according to Hauser.

KLAMATH FIRE LOSSES WELL OVER AVERAGE

Klamath Falls' per capita fire loss in 1932 was almost twice the national average.

This fact was cited here Thursday by W. F. White, engineer of the Oregon Insurance Rating bureau, who declared that unless the tide of loss is stopped, insurance rates here must be expected to move up sharply.

White said that the Klamath Falls loss per capita in 1932 was \$4.16, as against \$2.21, the national average. Reports from State Fire Marshal Averill on the first six months of 1933 show

Klamath Falls actual fire loss at \$53,477, one of the highest in the state.

Ten Firemen Here
Lack of manpower at the fire department was cited by White after a visit to the station and a conference with Fire Chief A. W. Hardell.

The local department is operating with ten men, and a call department of ten men. It has three pumpers and a city service truck. Standard manning calls for six men for each pumper in the day, and eight men at night. If that plan were in full force the local department would have 18 men on duty by day and 24 at night to handle the pumpers, and 21 men for the city service truck, White said.

White said that increases should be made in the call department. The average response from the ten volunteers now on the list is about five men. By weeding out the volunteers to get a larger response, and by increasing the number to about 20, the manpower of the department

could be strongly reinforced, he said.

Insurance Rate Average
The engineer said there are not enough men on the department to make inspections, nor to leave at the station to respond to second calls.

Present rates for fire insurance in Klamath Falls are about average. Mayor Mahoney said he had discussed the situation with White, and told him the city would be glad to consider recommendations to make the fire department more effective.
