FIRST LIQUOR 'ADS' APPEAR IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Oct. 5. (AP) - The first advertisement since prohibition addressed to the public by a liquor dealer, listing famous brands and quoting prices, appeared in newspapers in this city today.

The advertisement, occupying a full page and headed "For Delivery If and When Repeat Comes," quoted Black and White Scotch whiskey, Johnny Walker and Haig and Haig at \$25 a case of 12 bottles, plus \$14.77 a case for import duties and federal taxes. House of Lords gin will be sold at \$20 a case with a similar tax. Martell 3-Star cognac is quoted at \$25 a case, with the same tax.

All the standbys of pre-prohibition days appear in the advertisement - Blue-Gin, Liqueur, Cordial, Geneva Gin, Champagne, Brandy-Keg, Tonic, and the best known American and Canadian brands of rye and bourbon.

Sixteen year old American whiskey is priced at \$45 for a case of 12 quarts, with a tax of only \$1.25 because it is a native product.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5. (AP) - James M. Doran, commissioner of industrial alcohol, several weeks ago issued permits for the importation of 500 cases of Three Star Hennessy to meet what he described as a shortage of brandy needed for medicinal purposes in the hospitals.

The shortage was occasioned, he said, by the virtual refusal of holders of old brandy to release it from the bonded warehouses, preferring to hold it until prohibition is repealed.

BUTTER TONE HOLDS STEADY AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Oct. 5. (AP) - Steadiness in the butter position was reflected during the late session of the produce exchange, which simply followed the open market.

Prices were unchanged all around for butter with continued best call for the two lower scores which suggested that there should have been advanced rather than allowed to hold unchanged at the previous session.

With the trade decreased locally the trade here reports a much better undertone throughout the trade but the public was still looking for bargains, therefore purchasing more freely of the prime first and first.

Market for five chickens was holding steady. Egg market trading was firm locally and at late price advances for fresh stock. Storage goods however, continued to reflect a rather wide price spread and more or less weakness.

Market for live chickens was holding steady with no late change in quotations. Much under-grade stuff was again being offered and was hard to move.

Turkey Call Liberal
Call for turkeys was very liberal here for both old and new crop with shippers still seeking the former. Prices were firm but generally without further change.

While local selling prices were practically unchanged for Oregon, Yakima and Walla Walla onions, trading was inclined to be a trifle weaker at the source.

Increasing movement of cauliflower into eastern channels was reflected here with Chicago the general destination. Crop was coming on slowly with a very heavy output in sight on an increased area. Quality in general was never better.

Some time ago there was an advance of 15c in sugar refining prices. At least such an advance was named but not until today was it generally observed by jobbers of this territory.

Firm tone was showing for winter grapes on the tracks here as a result of orders from California shippers to advance quotations with increased price there and greater demand. Table grapes were quiet for both local and California with no further price change.

Some of the killed calves were weak except for heavy stuff with other lines unchanged.

Dillard yellow honeydew melons were being offered 2c as were casabas.

WHEAT IS SETBACK ON NEARLY 2 CENTS

CHICAGO, Oct. 5. (AP) - Maximum setbacks of almost two cents a bushel in wheat took place today, largely owing to a liquidating movement which disclosed dearth of aggressive buying.

Scattered demand developed later as a consequence of relative strength of the Winnipeg market, where cash wheat was quoted as above a delivery basis. It was reported concentrated holdings in Winnipeg had been transferred from nearby into distant deliveries elevator interests taking October contracts and giving distant deliveries in exchange.

Wheat closed weak, 1 1/2-1 3/4c under yesterday's finish, corn 1 1/2-1 3/4c down, oats 1 1/2-1 3/4c off, and provisions varying from cents decline to a rise of 5 cents.
