Future program and policies will be discussed at the meeting of Oregon cattlemen to be held in the county court room of the court house at 2 p. m., Klamath Falls, on Tuesday, October 10.

The proposed packers marketing agreement will be fully explained. The packers have submitted their proposed agreement to the secretary of agriculture at Washington, D. C. A committee representing cattle raisers, and another committee representing the packers met at Washington and Chicago last month. Such matters as fixing minimum prices of livestock, fixing minimum prices of carcasses, allocation of livestock among the packers, and savings in delivery expense were contained in the proposed agreement.

The following speakers will address the meeting: Philip Klipsch, president of Western Cattle Marketing association, and also president of California Cattlemen's association; R. L. Concanon, sales manager, Western Cattle Marketing association at San Francisco, and John Curry, secretary of both associations and attorney for the California Cattlemen's association.

A meeting will be held at Yreka on October 9, another at McArthur, Calif., on the 11th.
