

SILVER LAKE CAMP TO MOVE BY OCTOBER 16

Fire losses here this year have been increased by incendiarism. Chief Bardell pointed out that since the capture of two arsonists, responsible for serious fires there had been no suspicious blazes here.

Chief Bardell Friday said that a compilation shows the Klamath Falls fire loss for the first six months of the year is \$28,021.57. The county loss was around \$56,000. The fire loss here for the first six months of 1932 was \$49,135.79.

Policy for State Also.

The statement by Scott was interpreted also as the policy of the state advisory board, inasmuch as it followed a conference of the commission with the advisory board.

Scott said he had been advised that the board would not recommend a blanket loan for highways to be apportioned by the highway commission but that each project must be submitted on its individual merits to the federal public works board; that a fixed sum would be placed to the credit of Oregon from which all projects would draw, highways being included with sewer systems, water systems and other projects.

Contracts Awarded

Consequently, it was explained, projects submitted and approved for highways would reduce the allotment for sewage systems and other construction.

Scott declared further that the highway commission can not choose the highway projects to be built with federal funds but this will be done by the state advisory board. The commission can only recommend.

With about three-fourths of a million dollars of national recovery money, the commission announced at the night session that it was awarding a group of highway and bridge contracts in Jackson, Klamath, Umatilla, Multnomah, Washington, Grant and Malheur counties.

fired hundreds of shots into its buildings for nearly 12 hours. Strike Object Upheld
Although objecting to its presence, the national guardsmen accomplished, at least temporarily, one of the principal purposes of the progressive violence.

Progressives stormed the mine because they objected to "importation" of United Mine Workers of America from Williamson and Franklin counties to work the shaft.

Military authorities today announced they had received orders from Springfield to prevent miners from nearby counties reporting for work.

Peabody officials imported the U. M. W. A. from nearby counties because the number of United Mine Workers in Saline county were insufficient to work the shaft.

Score Killed
Most of the miners in this county are aligned with the progressive union, formed about a year ago over a dispute of the legality of a referendum vote to decide approval of a wage contract.

Since the split, much violence has figured in the controversy. More than a score have been killed, and considerable property damage caused by frequent bombings.

Saline county miners have remained staunchly behind the progressive movement since it began.

The orders to militia officers reflects an order of Gov. Horner, several months ago to Sheriff Eugene Chalmers of Saline county barring "importation" of miners.

Relief Economies Shown by Using Requisition Plan

Figures indicating a reduction of per capita cost under the requisition system of relief, which was established September 15, were released Friday by Miss Phyllis Hartzog, director of Klamath county relief work.

Miss Hartzog stated the budget for September provided for \$3500, but that only \$1999 was actually spent. For the month as a whole, the per capita cost was \$5.73, with 359 cases.

For the last half of September, when the requisition system was in effect, the per capita cost was \$4.26, including half of the administration cost for the month, all taken out of the commissary during the 15-day period, and all requisitions. Help was given to 232 cases.

In August, when the commissary system was in effect, total expenditure was \$4005, Miss Hartzog reported. Cases taken care of totaled 488, and the per capita cost was \$8.41. She cited the difference between this per capita figure, and the \$4.26 set in the last half of September. She investigated, she said, is cutting down the number of cases on relief.
