OBSERVATION TOWER PLANNED AT REFUGE

A steel observation tower to be used in connection with wild life activities will be erected at the Tule lake refuge, according to Hugh M. Worcester of the biological survey. The tower will be 100 feet high and built and operated by the government. A crew of six men has started survey work in this district as part of a state-wide program ordered by the biological survey. They will survey the boundary lines of all refuges. The men will be in Oregon for three months and the first work will be in the Klamath country. This new work, Worcester said, has been undertaken as a part of the national recovery act to create employment.
