# National, Local Markets

## DEMAND FOR BUTTER HOLDS FULLY STEADY

PORTLAND, Oct. 7. (AP)—Butter manufacture in the Pacific Northwest was holding up better than during any recent season for like period. There continued a general increase of offering from out-state points, and even local manufacture was indicating a fractional gain for the week, instead of the loss of normal periods.

Demand for butter remained steady, but prices on the open market were unchanged for the day. Best demand continued for undergrades, which did not advance during late season of the exchange. Advertised low resale prices to consumers were usually of these grades.

Butter prices were at least firm.

## Fresh Eggs Stronger

Fresh egg market was strong locally with full prices being realized. Storage stock was showing a wide spread with much still coming from outside the state, which was having a bad effect here.

Generally steady situation continued in the market for live poultry and without price changes. This applied to turkeys, chickens and even ducks.

## Country killed meat market was unchanched generally for the day, with stocks showing little change as to volume. Low prices have slightly stimulated demand for veal and beef.

## Spuds in Demand

With increasing offers of Deschutes potatoes there was a growing demand for these, but locals were still taking the bulk of demand. General prices were unchanged.

Market for tomatoes was growing weaker here, with growers rushing about everything available to market. Prices were lower in spots. Quality was not quite so good, but some fancy packs were available.

Prices were being well held in the market for fresh fish with both salmon and halibut quoted unchanged at late figures.

## Oysters were showing but scant improvement in demand as prices were considered too high.

Wine grapes were showing a general advance here and in the south as a result of greater demand and the smaller crop, some of which was due to strike conditions in California.

## GOLD UP AGAIN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7. (AP)—Today's newly mined gold price was announced by the treasury as \$31.72, an increase of 17 cents an ounce as compared with yesterday's quotation.

## WOOL MARKET QUOTED SLOW FROM BOSTON

BOSTON, Oct. 6. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "The demand for wool has slowed up noticeably compared with the big movement which has been current for some weeks, but there is still enough business to keep prices firm, especially in view of the restricted supplies of wool available. It is estimated that of the 1933 domestic clip there are not more than 90 million pounds left in the hands of dealers and growers.

"New business at the mills undoubtedly is slower, but the mills are running very full still and consuming wool heavily. Reports from the piecegoods and clothing markets are encouraging, although strikes are a big fly in the ointment for the moment.

"Fall Texas wool is moving moderately at 25c and 27c to the growers.

"Foreign markets have been somewhat irregular and prices have eased the poorer wools. The London sales probably will be shortened.

"Mohair is quieter, with prices little changed."
