At Crater Lake Shows Big Drop

from California, followed by the state of Washington with 3322 visitors, while Idaho was fourth with considerably less. Foreign countries, representing all parts of the globe, are credited with 23 cars and 310 visitors.

The heaviest travel of the season occurred during the Labor Day week-end when 5,393 visitors entered the park.

The educational division at Crater Lake, under the direction of D. B. Libbey, park naturalist, reported a successful season. Figures reveal the one permanent and seven temporary members made 100,232 contacts with visitors in rendering service in the way of auto carvans around the rim, field and boat trips, lectures at the lodge, Sinnott Memorial Community house and at E. C. W. camps and service at the information bureau and at the head of the lake trail. This is an increase of 135 per cent over the preceding year with a total of 47,936 recorded contacts.

Wilcox Writes

The matter of pushing local relief contributions was discussed in a letter from R. B. Wilcox, chairman of the state relief committee.

Wilcox said that federal aid in relief work is based on the understanding that municipalities have done their full share, and that locally raised funds are insufficient to handle the relief situation. He urged that the largest possible appropriations be made in county budgets for relief purposes.

Failure to do this, Wilcox said, may be prejudicial to Oregon's interests in obtaining federal relief help.

The belief was expressed by county officials and others Saturday that Klamath county and Klamath Falls will receive substantial credit for the money they put into the armory to be constructed here.
