

Who Can Defeat The Trojans?

Southern California Upsets Strongest Contender From Northwest. Second National Title Possible. Senators Strongest on Paper.

The hope a northern team might move into California this year to defeat the Trojans was pretty well evaporated Saturday. Washington State, considered the north's leading light in the conference, was badly punished, 33 to 0, by the coast and national champions. If there is a team left in this section—even one in the country—prepared to defeat Southern Cal., it still is to be discovered. The last team to defeat the Trojans, St. Mary's, will try again Saturday. Last year the wary Trojans discarded the schedule with the Gaels for fear of suffering consequences similar to those of 1931.

This season, however, St. Mary's hasn't established itself as one of the nation's leading teams. The Gaels went down, 14 to 13, against California, and California had been defeated the week before, 7 to 6, by the Santa Clara Broncos.

Southern California rests for a week after the St. Mary's game and then goes up to Portland to meet Oregon State. There is no one so optimistic as to believe the Beavers can do what greater teams have failed.

After Oregon State comes California. The game will be played at Berkeley. Stanford is next then Oregon. Not one of these three teams, as early in the season as this, can be considered. Notre Dame at South Bend will be the Trojan's game following the encounter with the Webfoots, but the Irish aren't doing so well this season. Notre Dame was held to a scoreless tie last week.

Georgia and Washington, closing the schedule late in the fall, will be the final teams to challenge Southern California's threat for a second national championship.

Loggers Defend Gridiron Honors In Northwest

SEATTLE, Oct. 9 (AP)—The battle for the northwest conference football championship appeared today to be another race between Whitman college of Walla Walla and College of Puget Sound of Tacoma which ousted the Missionaries last year.

The Tacoma Loggers, defending champions, jumped into the running last Friday when they whipped Albany college, 18 to 0, in the only conference struggle of the week. Whitman had entered the win column the previous week by conquering Linfield college, 7 and 6.

Two conference contests are on the program for the coming week-end with Willamette meeting C. P. S. at Tacoma Friday and Pacific university tangling with Linfield at McMinnville, Ore. Albany will play Columbia college at Portland, and College of Idaho will provide opposition for the University of Idaho at Caldwell, Idaho, Friday, and Whitman will meet Whitworth college at Walla Walla in non-conference duels.

Linfield showed increased power and a dash of deception in defeating Pacific Lutheran at Tacoma Saturday, 19 to 6. Whitman took a bad drubbing, 60 to 0, from the University of Idaho, and Southern Oregon Normal conquered another conference member, Pacific, 19 to 0, in the other games over the week-end.

Four Killed In Automobile Racing Mishap

BARI, Italy, Oct. 9 (AP)—A racing car driven by a German, Grosh, turned over yesterday during the Princesa Piedmont cup race, killed four spectators and seriously injured two other persons. Grosh himself was gravely injured.

This was the second serious racing accident in Italy within a month. Three drivers were killed September 10 at Monza during the running of the Grand Prix De Monza race in which the American, Whitney Straight, finished fourth.

An Italian racer, D'ipollito, was killed when his machine crashed into a cart alongside the road.

BASEBALL YEAR COMES TO END

Giants' Victory Over Senators Brilliant Climax.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9 (AP)—The clamor and thrills of the Giants' world series triumph trailed off today into history as baseball bowed its way out for another season, and left the sports field clear for the king of fall pastimes, football.

But from now on until the major leagues gather again in spring training camps, there was material enough for the hot stove league sessions through the long winter nights to challenge any intervening excitement in the feats of the fall this southpaw from Oklahoma, Carl Hubbell; the home run hitting little Melvin Ott, the boy wonder of Louisiana; the flair and color of New England's blonde John Ryan, and the master minding of Memphis Bill Terry.

New York Surprises
Rarely have newly crowned champions of baseball's realm presented such a varied cast of heroes and near-heroes as this amazing group that came from nowhere through the National league season, universally branded a second division ball club, and through sheer fight, spirit, and mastery of the pinches, climbed behind superb pitching first to the league title, then a world series triumph over the highly favored Washington Senators in five games.

Furthermore, warned Terry today as the Giants prepared to disband for the year, sorry it was all over and there were no more worlds to conquer, "this is a team that should be good for five more years. Pitchers like Hubbell, the best in the world right now, Hal Schumacher, Ray Farnes and Fred Fitzsimmons will be even better next year. Everywhere else on the team are youngsters just getting good. The best days of outfielders like Mel Ott, George Davis and Joe Moore are still ahead of them; Ryan is just a kid; Gus Mancuso will be an even greater catcher next season; and I know Travis Jackson, Hunkle Critz and myself are still far from through."

Youngsters Coming Up
"Besides that we've got two young pitchers in Johnny Salverson and Al Smith who'll be ready to take a turn next year and Watson Clark, who was the best left hander in the National league in 1932, will have recovered his strength. You won't make any mistake picking us right now to do this all over again in 1934."

Certainly the future of the 34-year-old Terry, who has a 15-year-old son taller than himself, seems assured for as long as he wants to handle the Giants reins. Believing implicitly in the strength he acquired in trades that tore the old Giants apart last year after he had succeeded the veteran John McGraw, Terry installed a sort of town meeting form of government on the ball club, let everyone join in the strategic conferences that gather every time there is a sign of trouble brewing, and wound up bewildering the American league champions at every turn.

Terry's Plans Succeed
Travis Jackson had away, Gus Mancuso a vote, and Blondy Ryan the floor most of the time in the innumerable get-togethers the Giants held around the pitcher's box all through the first two games they won in New York and the three they played in Washington, losing only the first, 4-0, in the face of Earl Whitehill's left handed mastery. Rarely did Terry's strategic hunches, or the consensus of opinion of all the field generals, fail.

In fact the success of Terry's strategy, and the failure of just about everything Joe Cronin tried, left the 26-year-old manager of the Senators looking just about as good as a big league pitcher from the moment he started Left Handed Walley Stewart against the Giants in the first game until Mel Ott, with two out and the bases empty in the tenth, sent one of Jack Russell's fast balls into the center field stands with Fred Schulte tumbling after it for the home run that won the fifth encounter, 4 to 3.

Cronin's Plans Fail
In the matter of pitching strategy Cronin locked very well indeed as he wound up with Whitehill, his only winning hurler, sitting on the bench waiting probably to pitch the opening game of the 1934 season because of Cronin's failure to use him before the third game, although the southpaw's appearance may have been delayed by a sore arm. Likewise, Monte Weaver, who forced Hubbell to go 11 thrilling innings to win the fourth game, 3 to 1, did not arrive until the Senators' cause was all but hopeless.

The experts agreed that with Whitehill in the first game and Hubbell in the second, and both able to return for the fourth and fifth games, the outcome of the series might not have been different, but the battle would have been considerably stiffer.

The failure of the Senators to prolong the series beyond five

FEDERAL MONEY POURS INTO WEST

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—With more than half of the \$3,300,000,000 public works fund allotted to hundreds of projects throughout the nation, a stream of gold totaling \$93,441,500 has started pouring into four Pacific Northwest states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Utah, and Alaska. This does not include blanket funds covering several states.

Of the four, Washington to date has been allotted more than the others, combined, receiving a total of \$63,125,800, which includes \$63,000,000 for the construction of the Grand Coulee dam on the Columbia river above Wenatchee.

Oregon came second on the list, with five approved projects for which money was allotted. They were: Bonneville dam, \$20,000,000; Vale and Owyhee reclamation works, \$6,000,000; Bonneville dam study, \$250,000; Salem waterworks, \$1,500,000; Merrill water company works, \$17,000.

CHICAGO, Oct. 9 (AP)—With the spark of resentment fanned into flame the Green Bay Packers today were back in the National Professional Football league race with a 17 to 0 shutout over the powerful Portsmouth Spartans to their credit.

After being held to two ties and defeated once, the Packers' chances for the championship were regarded very slim, but yesterday's victory changed opinions although the road ahead is still hard.

Bears in Lead
The Chicago Bears gained undisputed possession of first place yesterday by defeating the Brooklyn club, 19 to 0 for their third straight.

Boston nosed out New York, 21 to 20, and the Chicago Cardinals won their first game by beating Cincinnati, 5 to 0.

The Packers scored in the opening period after drive from the Spartans' 16-yard line. Bruder carried the ball over and Grove converted. Clark Hinkle added three more points with a boot from the 50-yard line in the third frame. Buckle Goldenberg intercepted a pass in the fourth quarter and a short time

TROJANS OPEN PENNANT RUSH

Southern Cal Meets St. Mary's in South Saturday.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9 (AP)—Bounding along the football highway in what followers confidently believe will be a non-stop dash to both coast and national honors for a second successive year, Southern California's Trojans meet St. Mary's Gaels next Saturday in one of two outstanding games of the far western schedule.

Two years ago another St. Mary's team invaded the stronghold of Southern California to snatch a 13-7 victory over the Trojan warriors. Since that day early in 1931, Coach Howard Jones has watched his team pile touchdowns upon touchdowns in a triumphal march that thus far has accounted for 24 wins and no defeats in the records of U. S. C. Trojans Favored

On the strength of last week's showing of the two teams, Southern California will go into the game a strong favorite to turn the tables on the eleven which which was responsible for its last defeat.

The Trojan forces ran up the unexpectedly high score of 33-0 last Saturday in winning from the powerful Washington State Cougars.

Whereas the big St. Mary's team was the victim of an upset, beaten by California's Bears, 14-13.

Southern California's lopsided decision over its coast conference rival caused many optimists who were prepared to give St. Mary's an even chance to revise their predictions.

Webfoots Meet Huskies
While St. Mary's and Southern California are battling in the southern section, Oregon and Washington will meet in one of the traditional tilts of the north.

On the comparative basis of a game each played with Gonzaga, the two conference teams shaped up on fairly even terms. Washington won from Gonzaga 13-0, and Oregon defeated the same team, 14-0. Last year the two rivals played to a scoreless tie.

Another conference game will pit Washington State against Montana. Although Washington State lost to Southern California, it is expected to be an easy winner over Montana, which lost its first conference start to Oregon State, 20-0.

Stanford's Indians, who upset predictions last Saturday by defeating Santa Clara, 7-0, were en route to Chicago, where they will meet Northwestern this week end.

A field goal by Lillard from the 15-yard line in the second period gave the Cardinals their game.

REFUGE LEASING CARRIED TO MEAD

Lease of areas in the Tule lake refuge for grazing purposes, subject of contention between local sportsmen and the reclamation service, will be taken up with Dr. Elwood Mead, chief of the reclamation bureau at Washington, D. C.

This was indicated here Monday by Paul Reddington, chief of the U. S. biological survey, following a discussion of the matter with B. E. Hayden, local reclamation bureau superintendent.

Reddington leaves for Bend Monday to look over the refuge area in connection with the leasing question. He returned Monday from northern California and Nevada, conferred with Hayden and local sportsmen, and left later for Bend.

Hayden said that the reclamation bureau is inserting in all leases, covering any appreciable length of time, a clause that no grazing will be permitted until August 1. Grazing before August 1 would take away the cover and also molest nesting birds, it is claimed.

Hayden asserted that the short lease for fall grazing, similar to

leases recently made, will not interfere with bird life.

So far as nesting grounds are concerned, Hayden said, the Tule lake sump is useless because of the rise of water in early spring after the birds are nesting.

With reference to Clear lake, it is Hayden's opinion that a plan can be developed between the department of the interior and the department of agriculture to include the whole area as a nesting grounds.

This refers particularly to the peninsula, on which at the present time there is a five-mile fence built by the biological survey. It is the intention of the biological survey to tie on to both ends of that fence, running it to water, thus fencing out stock.

T. R. Gillenwaters, president of the Klamath Sportsmen's association, replied sharply Monday to Hayden's statements about the situation as announced by Reddington.

"The grazing of livestock in bird refuges generally is not compatible with the protection or propagation of bird life," declared Gillenwaters.

SUBMARINE BLAST KILLS TWO SAILORS

LONDON, Oct. 9 (AP)—The admiralty announced today it would hold two inquiries into the fire and explosion in the submarine L26 at Campbeltown Harbor, Scotland, yesterday which resulted in two deaths and serious injuries to 14.

One of the inquiries, it was announced, would be into the grounding of the submarine on Kintyre Peninsula Rocks, and the other into the explosion itself.

Another seaman, named Wiseman, was now stated to be in a critical condition as a result of injuries.

It was the worst British naval accident since January, 1932, when the submarine M-3 sank off Portland with seven officers and 53 men. The cause of that disaster continues a mystery and costly efforts to raise the hull have been baffled by the currents and depth.

Under its own power and apparently in good shape, the L-26 was refloated from the rocks and proceeded here. The blast occurred yesterday and was due, officials believed, to water reaching the batteries, which were being recharged, through a hole in the hull.
