National, Local Markets

BUTTER MART TONE STEADY, ACTIVITY SEEN

PORTLAND, Oct. 9, (AP)—Cheese showed a barely maintained tone at leading primary points during the week. In spots the trade was inclined to show a small degree of strength early in the period, but this disappeared generally with the renewal of very free and liberal offerings.

Butter Market Steady

Tillamook, however, appeared of steady character during the week with a general price change.

Market for butter was showing

a generally steady tone with a fair degree of activity suggested in late trading here. Open market sales were within the late price range.

Sales of too many peewee eggs

as pullets was complicating the general trade in fresh goods here, according to some interests. A cleanup of the situation by the state was being demanded.

Market for live chickens was

holding steady except for light weight hens which were more or less poor quality. Broilers were in favor and at full prices.

Potato Trade Firm

Market for country killed meats was about steady locally, although the movement out of the source was by no means brisk. Demand appeared up to immediate local offerings.

Market on onions was being

held steady here, but speculative interest was high. Growers in general were seeking 75c and sacks for No. 1 grade, with small lots moving at that.

Notes of Wholesale Trading

Concord grape movement was gaining, with prices very low. Wine grapes on the tracks were moving more freely, with prices firm.

Cantaloupes were steady to

lower with a general top of \$1.25 for Dillards.

Some fine Solway peaches were

arriving from Grants Pass. Priced around 75c to 85c.

Local apple demand was slowly

gaining, but without material price change.

Cauliflower shipments to Chi-

cago were slowly gaining.

EGGS ADVANCE

PORTLAND, Oct. 9, (AP)—Further advance in the price on local fresh eggs was announced by Edna B. Reed, general manager of the Pacific Co-ops, effective Tuesday morning. The new prices will be 2c higher than last week with overalls 31c and extras 29c, standards 25c, medium 25c. No change in others.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9, (AP)—

Assistant Secretary of War Woodring today approved plans for a bridge across the Columbia river and Cello canal about four miles east of The Dalles, Ore.

The plan carries with it permanent use of federal land along the river and canal for bridge and highway purposes. This authority was granted by a law passed last June.

At public hearings on the application for the proposed bridge some protests were made against location of the span and its construction because of economic considerations.

Mrs. Hoover at Scout Conclave

CHICAGO, Oct. 9, (AP)—Rallies
