

Oregon Holds Jinx Over Huskies

Washington Ruffled by Five Scoreless Years Against the Webfoot Eleven. Sons Defeat Powerful Pacific Team. Great Game Expected Here Against Oregon Freshmen.

Washington, long listed as one of the Big Four in the Pacific coast football conference, has had a five-year grudge against the University of Oregon. It has been a grudge growing year after year without even the slightest bit of satisfaction.

Captain John J. McEwan started the affair, then came Dr. C. W. Spears to continue it. Frank Callison, the young Webfoot coach, has had one year of success—half-way success—in contributing to Washington's ill feeling.

Back in 1928 Captain McEwan's team, headed by Johnny Kitzmiller, Austin Colbert, George Christensen and Marshall Shields, gave Washington one of its worst beatings in years on Multnomah field. Cap followed up the next year with another at Seattle.

The Huskies failed to cross the Oregon goal both seasons.

The next year Dr. Spear's first of two Eugene, Johnny Kitzmiller, the famous Flying Dutchman, tramped the Husky line for one touchdown. He converted, and the game ended 7 to 0—it was another scoreless year for Washington.

It was Seattle's game in 1931. Spears, organizing his final Oregon team, had Joe Lillard, colored halfback, who was later declared ineligible, in the lineup. The Webfoots scored two touchdowns and the Huskies were blank.

Young Callison met Washington in Portland last season, and while the Webfoots failed to score, so did the Huskies. It brought Washington up to five scoreless years against Oregon.

There. You can imagine the feeling Washington has developed against its Oregon rival. It is a real "jinx" if there ever was one.

Howard Hobson's team at Southern Oregon Normal school in Ashland has not fallen short of early season predictions. The Sons crashed Pacific university, one of the strong members of the Northwest conference, at Ashland Saturday, 19 to 0.

Hobson has the sort of combination getting stronger with each week's practice. By the time he is ready to meet the Oregon Freshmen on Modoc field, October 25, he should have one of the best secondary outposts on the coast.

Ashland played a strong game. The team utilized the Andy Smith strategy—kick and wait for the breaks.

We're not sure just what part Bob Elliott and Lewis McAninch, two former Pelican backs, had in the victory. Both, however, were in the lineup and will be in the lineup here against the Freshmen. They will oppose three Webfoot youngsters, Rex Hamaker, Bill Bates and Chan Berry, all former Klamath players.

Attendance Up For Trojans' Grid Contests

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 10. (AP)—Arnold Eddy, graduate manager of the University of Southern California, said today that attendance and receipts are up 15 per cent over 1932. While exact figures are not yet available, the Trojans in four games, one of them a double-header, have played to approximately 120,000 persons this season, Eddy said.

For next Saturday's game with St. Mary's, approximately 70,000 seats have already been sold or held in reserved lists. The Memorial coliseum will hold 105,000 persons.

KLAMATH OPENS LEAGUE SEASON

Pelicans Meet Ashland On Modoc Field Saturday.

Still undefeated, although once held to a scoreless tie, the Klamath Pelicans this week prepare for their opening conference game. The lads of the high school, strong contenders for the southern Oregon title, meet Ashland on Modoc field Saturday afternoon.

Injuries received in the scoreless tie with Corvallis last week may bother the Pelicans Saturday. Norman Taber, big fullback, has been handicapped with a sprained leg. Lynn Frost, regular end, and Bob Leslie, swift young halfback, were both removed from the Corvallis game with minor injuries.

Chester Jones, halfback from last year, who turned out for the season after practice had started, probably will be in condition to start against Ashland. Teams coached by Les Avril in the last two years have never been defeated by Ashland. Avril's combinations won two games in 1931 and two more last year. While the Pelicans are favored to win both contests this season, it is believed the competition will be more severe than it has been in the past.

Giant Manager Gets Contract With New Salary

NEW YORK, Oct. 10. (AP)—Memphis Bill Terry, who boasted the nondescript, low salary, sixth place New York Giants club to a world championship in his first season as manager, Monday received a tangible reward from Club President Charles A. Stoneham in the form of a new five-year contract at an annual salary believed to be around \$40,000.

To sign the new document it was necessary for the dark-haired, 200-pound first baseman to tear up his previous two-year contract, which still had a year to run and which yielded about \$30,000 annually.

Terry signed two contracts, one as manager and the other as player. The player contract is required by Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis and carries the customary 30-day release clause. Memphis Bill's attitude indicated that his raise had been substantial and that he was well pleased after wielding the fountain pen.

Young Sullivan Weds In Indiana

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Oct. 10. (AP)—Billy Sullivan of the Chicago White Sox and son of Billy Sullivan, Sr., pitching ace of the Sox "hitless wonders" of an earlier day, was married Monday to Miss Louise Barthman of South Bend.

Sullivan was graduated from Notre Dame last June and just completed his third season with the White Sox yesterday. He will make his home in South Bend.

South African Wins Opening Fight in U. S.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10. (AP)—Don McCorkindale, tall, game heavyweight from South Africa, has cleared the first obstacle in what may turn out to be a successful, if not especially lucrative, American tour.

While a bare 4,000 fans looked on, McCorkindale boxed his way to a 10-round decision over Patsy Perroni, young Cleveland battler, in Madison Square Garden last night. In so doing, the South African displayed an educated left hand and a strong discipline to assume a horizontal attitude when he was tagged full on the chin.

Perroni fought a dull sort of a fight most of the way, but he did land one right cross square on the chin in the ninth round and two heavy right uppercuts to the same spot in the tenth. But each time McCorkindale, hurt though he was, opened up with both fists and fought his way clear.

Although the judges disagreed and Referee Patsy Haley cast the deciding vote for McCorkindale, the Associated Press scoreboard credited Don with five rounds, Perroni with three and two even. McCorkindale weighed 191½ pounds, Perroni 193.

Harvater was one of the greatest forward passers in the game when he sported a Carnegie Tech uniform. Now head coach there, Harvater already has developed a deadly aerial attack, as Pop Warner's Temple Owls, buried 20-0 last week, will testify. Boston college was the only winner.

This week should furnish a more accurate line on what power may be expected from Pitt and Notre Dame, picked before the season opened as two front-rank contenders for national honors. Panthers have been far from impressive in beating Washington and Jefferson, and West Virginia and Notre Dame was even less so in the Ramblers' shocking scoreless tie with Kansas. Pitt, however, may open up against Navy and Notre Dame should show improvement in its second game against Indiana.

Texas' Longhorns will have a chance to avenge themselves on the Big Six conference. Soundly trounced by Nebraska's Cornhuskers at Lincoln last week, the Longhorns will remain at home this week to entertain Oklahoma, another Big Six member.

Oregon, Washington Tilt Leads Contests for Next Saturday.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 10. (AP)—The Lion Stiver "new deal" got its first stiff competition on Multnomah stadium field last Saturday at Portland against Gonzaga's Bulldogs. Just what inherent disabilities were apparent will have to be ironed out during practice sessions this week. Led by Franklin, demon Beaver ball-carrier, and Pangle and Howman, halves, the Orange squad dashed about midfield, but lacked punch inside the 13-yard line. The Stivers play U. S. F. at San Francisco October 14.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 10. (AP)—Gardner Frye, 175-pound guard, was shifted into right tackle berth to somewhat fill the cavity caused by injury to lanky Erwin "Biff" Nilsson, Oregon's experienced tackle. Nilsson, according to reports, may not be able to play for several weeks. Outside of a few minor abrasions, Trainer Bill Hayward reported his Webfoot charges "as well as could be expected" after their tilt with Columbia university here last Saturday, which Oregon won, 14-7. Frank Callison drilled his eleven behind locked gates preparing for the Huskies at Seattle this week-end.

SEATTLE, Oct. 10. (AP)—Coach Jimmie Phelan's Husky gridmen were tugging at their leathers in practice, eager to upset the Webfoot Saturday. Oregon has for five successive years bowled over the Huskies. After two weeks' rest, Washington is expected to present "tough competition" for Oregon—considering the fact each team defeated Gonzaga by virtually the same scores.

MORAGA, Calif., Oct. 10. (AP)—There was no allibi for the 14 to 13 defeat by California in the St. Mary's camp as the Gaels prepared grimly for a comeback against the mighty Trojans of U. S. C. Coach Slip Nadiagan worried about Ed Gilbert, huge guard, and Fezeraki, behemoth tackle, injured against the Bears. Many of California's gains were made through the holes the pair left in the line. It was not decided whether they would be able to play Saturday.

PALO ALTO, Calif., Oct. 10. (AP)—A quietly confident Stanford student body awaited news of the Stanford team, en route to Chicago. The Cardinals, unbeaten and unscathed upon, were believed here to have an even chance to defeat Northwestern, which lost two Saturdays ago to Iowa 7 to 0.

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 10. (AP)—The battered but joyful California team took it easy and will get back into form gradually this week before playing Olympic club. Kiefer, Heller, Williams, Reedy, Jack Brittingham and Calkins were hailed today as stars of the victory over St. Mary's.

SANTA CLARA, Calif., Oct. 10. (AP)—A charge that they broke training rules caused Coach Clipper Smith to remove Johnny Beckrich of Santa Barbara and Bernard Lindsey of Merced from the varsity football squad. Beckrich, halfback, played a fine game Saturday at Santa Clara, lost to Stanford 7 to 0. Lindsey was an end on the second eleven. Both men are seniors. Smith would not divulge details of the rules infractions. He said the players were removed "for breach of rules, for food of the morale of the squad."

Cronin Signs New Contract With Senators

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. (AP)—Joseph Edward Cronin, younger manager of the Washington Senators, today signed a three year contract to pilot the club that captured the American league pennant this year but was turned back by the Giants for the world honors.

The pay was not disclosed, but President Clark C. Griffith indicated it was considerably less than the \$40,000 mentioned at the signing yesterday of Cronin's rival, Bill Terry, manager of the Giants.

The San Francisco man, who will celebrate his 27th birthday tomorrow, smilingly told newspapermen his contract was "satisfactory," and that it represented "a considerable increase over my salary for this year."
