Mrs. Kelly Profane

The revelations of kidnapping plans and talk of multiple killings sent shudders through the nearly 200 women who crowded early into the small fortified tower courtroom to see Kelly.

Mrs. Kelly, who said she would claim her husband forced her into the kidnapping plot, was pictured in the little girl's story as a hard, profane woman who said Urschel should have been killed after the ransom was collected.

Kelly was identified early in today's sessions as the man who collected the ransom in Kansas City from E. E. Kirkpatrick, go-between. Albert Bates, now serving a life sentence on conviction at the first trial, was named in other testimony as the man who helped Kelly with the abduction.

The two split the ransom, \$100,000 each, and matched for the leather bag in which it was delivered, Rorer said Kelly told him.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Oct. 10. (AP)—Hundreds of women stormed the federal tower courtroom today, where George (Machine Gun) Kelly and Kathryn, his wife, are on trial for the \$200,000 kidnaping of Charles F. Urschel.

A perspiring squad of uniformed policemen tried to keep the corridors cleared. The courtroom was packed and many were turned away.

Court Opening Delayed

There was a delay in opening the second day of the trial while Judge Edgar S. Vaughn went to a hospital where an operation was performed upon his son, Edgar S. Vaughn, Jr., for a stomach disorder.

The prosecution's first testimony was the reading of the ransom notes that threatened Urschel with death unless \$200,000 was paid to his kidnappers. Then E. E. Kirkpatrick, the millionaire oil man's Tulsa manager, told his story of paying the ransom in ransom on a Kansas City boulevard. Asked to whom the ransom money was paid, Kirkpatrick pointed at Kelly, who shrank in his chair.

Parents in Jail

It was announced that federal officials have decided definitely that if Kathryn Kelly is convicted, she will not be housed in the same federal prison with her mother, Mrs. R. G. Shannon.

Mrs. Shannon, sentenced to life imprisonment, still is held in the county jail here.

R. G. Shannon, Kathryn's stepfather, likewise under a life sentence, also is still in the county jail here.

With the testimony of J. Klar, Fort Worth, Texas, firearms broker, the government began to draw Mrs. Kelly into its construction of the conspiracy. Klar said last February he sold Kathryn a machine gun for \$250 bearing the same serial number as the weapon later found beside the sleeping Harvey Bailey on the "Paradise" Texas, "kidnap farm" where the victim was hidden. Bailey is serving a life term for the kidnaping.

Child Testifies

The machine gun, prosecutors allege, was the one which was pointed at Urschel when he was hustled from his sunporch on July 23.

After Ruth Shannon, 13-year-old daughter of the convicted R. G. Shannon, had testified, prosecutors announced there was no need to call Pauline Frye, 15-year-old daughter of Kathryn, to testify against her mother.

"This little girl, Ruth, told substantially what Pauline would have said," they explained.

Ruth testified that on the Sunday Urschel was brought to the ranch, she was taken with Pauline and Mrs. Oleta Shannon to Port Worth.

"Who came and got you?" asked Hyde.

"Kathryn," responded the child in a whisper.

The prosecution was attempting to show that the girls were hurried out of the way by Kathryn Kelly so they would not learn of the presence of the kidnaped Urschel.

BAKERSFIELD, Cal., Oct. 10. (UP)—At least four men were killed today in clashes between cotton growers and striking field workers in the heart of California's agricultural district.

Two strikers were known dead and several other combatants seriously injured as result of hand to hand battle in the Arvin district 20 miles south-east of here.

Two more strikers were killed and seven wounded at Pixley, 60 miles north of Bakersfield, when a band of 50 cotton growers allegedly fired into a gathering of several hundred strikers.

Enmity between growers and strikers had been smoldering for several days, and the open conflicts were not unexpected. But peace officers, patrolling the troubled districts, were powerless to prevent them.

Falling Stars Shower Europe

People Frightened By Bright Display

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 10. (AP)—A comet whose orbit lies within 5,000,000 miles of the earth may be the source of the great shower of falling stars seen in Europe last night, says Dr. Charles P. Olivier, meteor expert of the University of Pennsylvania.

"In 1929," Dr. Olivier said today, "the Rev. M. Davidson of England calculated that Glacolin's comet might give a radiant point for meteors on October 9, half way between the constellations Beta and Theta Draconis. This comet's orbit was 5,000,000 miles from the earth's."

"Perturbations since then have evidently switched these meteors across earth's orbit, for the Draconid radiant apparently fits the press dispatches from Europe."

Perturbations refers to the pull of gravity either by earth or by other planets, which acts on the meteoric stones traveling in the comet orbit. Such perturbations are common, and may deflect meteoroids into a new path.

Residents started Lisbon, Portugal, Oct. 10. (AP)—The superstitious in many Portuguese villages, firmly believing the heavens were falling, rushed into the streets last night, during a meteor display which lasted several hours.

The church bells were tolled in some villages, and processions of penitents who carried lighted candles and sang hymns were organized. Others asked for mercy from heaven.

Lisbon itself did not view the show, due to a fog.

BERLIN, Oct. 10. (AP)—Two hundred meteor showers in 15 minutes were counted by German observatories during a spectacular display last night.

Reports from Portugal said that thousands of superstitious persons in Oporto and other villages were frightened at a prolonged meteor display. A fog hid the show at Lisbon.

CHANGE IN FOOD CODE PETITIONED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. (AP)—Secret prices by grocery and food manufacturers and wholesalers were described today as the "root of the price cutting problem" by representatives of the industry favoring provisions of the master food code before the far mad adjustment administration.

They asserted a clause in the code which would require manufacturers and wholesalers to make their sales upon the basis of open prices, uniform to all trade buyers of the same quantity, was essential in the program of seeking a halt in price cutting which was blamed for depressing prices of raw materials to farmers.

Klamath Potato Digging Enters Heaviest Week

Quality and yield of the 1933 crop dug to date is exceptionally good, according to reports from the county agent's office.

Yields are varying from 100 to 400 sacks per acre, with the average yield around 200 sacks. Prices are being quoted at a little less than \$1.00 per hundred pounds.

Shipments throughout the United States are about 9,000 cars ahead of the shipments on the same date last year.

All potatoes in the Klamath basin are being uniformly graded and inspected this year, the agricultural agent stated.

Some digging trouble was experienced last week at the beginning of the season because of the exceptionally warm weather.

Where potatoes were allowed to lie in the field in the hot sun for some time after digging, considerable damage and deterioration followed. When they were picked up from behind the machine, however, little damage was noticed.
