

Pelicans' Record Improves

Los Avrit Leads Klamath to 14 Victories in Two Seasons. Medford, Bend Only Teams Not Defeated. George Varnell Encourages Rumors of Split Conference.

The record of Leslie Avrit as head coach of the Klamath Pelican football team has been an outstanding one. Placed against the story of previous football coaches at the high school, this former Oregon State college fullback will have a position of leadership.

The Pelicans, counting the three games already played this season, have marched through just 20 contests under the direction of Les Avrit. There have been 14 victories, five defeats and one tie. That's an achievement sufficient to assure the standing of any coach in any position, and there are not many who can match it in Oregon intercollegiate football.

Figuring the Pelican percentage on the basis of 19 games—eliminating the scoreless tie with Corvallis last week—Avrit's record would appear something like this:

There are only two teams having regular positions on the Klamath schedule. Avrit has failed to defeat. These are Medford and Bend. The fifth victory scored over the Klamath goal line was in a tremendous upset last season, when Grants Pass rode over the Pelicans in the first contest, 12 to 6. The Pelicans smothered Grants Pass in the second game on Modoc field.

Bend, playing the Pelicans on a cold Thanksgiving Day two years ago, won 6 to 0 after Klamath had consistently outplayed its opponent through the majority of the contest. That same year Medford, playing on Modoc field, won 7 to 0. It was that disputed game when Klamath scored a touchdown and had it called back.

Those were the only games Avrit lost in his first year as head coach.

Last year Bend and Medford, coupled with the disastrous loss to Grants Pass, won again. The Lava Bears scored their triumph, 19 to 6, on Modoc field. Medford won on its home field, 14 to 0.

The loss to Medford, however, was as never as it seemed. Klamath had ambitions, but was not seriously considered a state champion-contender. The Tigers, however, were selected to meet Jefferson of Portland for the Oregon intercollegiate football title. They had, perhaps, the strongest team since the days of Frank Callahan.

The victory record of the Pelican team for slightly more than two seasons includes one win over Corvallis, four over Ashland, three each from Alturas and Weed and three from Grants Pass.

Back time the rumor of a split in the Pacific Coast Football conference arises, it is a little stronger than the one before. George Varnell, sporting editor of the Seattle Times, this time has discovered a rumor, he says simply will not be downed.

Varnell has his fingers in the conference affairs pretty closely. He is an outstanding referee on the coast, and he conducts one of the most alert sport columns in the country. He obtained his most recent information at the Oregon State-Gonzaga game in Portland last Saturday.

"The inference gathered after much talk," Varnell wrote, "was that the suggestion made months ago that the California members form a new conference to divorce themselves from the present organization and form the background of a new eight-member California conference, was gaining much headway."

"The split in the conference, as suggested, calls for the California members—California, Stanford, University of California at Los Angeles, and Southern California—to drop out of the conference and start a league that would include St. Mary's, Santa Clara, University of San Francisco and Loyola of Los Angeles."

Varnell pointed out that the only sport general to the present conference arrangement was basketball. A play-off is held in basketball, but only occasional track meets are held between the northern and southern divisions, and no baseball.

The idea of a split conference had long been advocated in this column. It's destined to come, and the move can't be far off. Oregon, Oregon State, Washington, Washington State, Idaho, Montana and Gonzaga are capable of forming as strong a conference as there is in the country.

Lou Brouillard To Meet Dundee

BOSTON, Oct. 11. (AP)—Lou Brouillard will defend his world's middleweight championship title against Vince Dundee of Baltimore in a 15-round bout at Boston Garden October 30. Matchmaker Billy Amey announced.

Brouillard is to receive 37 1/2 percent of the gate, Amey said, and Dundee 12 1/2 percent. Each is to post \$2,000 as a guarantee of appearance and weight of 160 pounds.



ASHLAND DROPS KLAMATH GAME

Athletic Relations Between Schools At Odds.

Slightly strained athletic relations developed Wednesday morning between Klamath Falls and Ashland high schools with the cancellation of the contest set for Modoc field Saturday afternoon.

Dwight French, director of athletics at the high school, announced that the Ashland officials had refused to continue the game as scheduled several weeks ago. The principal at Ashland said a game had been scheduled for his team against Lakeview.

Announcement late The game was originally scheduled with Ashland, French said, with the understanding that if it could not be played the Ashland principal would let the matter be known as quickly as possible. Ashland didn't announce its cancellation until Tuesday night.

French offered to come to the aid and made a change on its own schedule to permit the Ashland-Klamath game to go on. The valley officials, however, refused all offers of compromise.

Malin Meets Wildcats French said a second game had been scheduled with Ashland on November 18. Under present conditions, however, he did not know whether or not Klamath would accept the contest.

The Malin-Klamath Wildcat game will be moved up to Saturday afternoon as the only game here this week. Les Avrit and Al Stiglar, Klamath coaches, turned this week to building up the Pelicans to meet the six man defensive system. The Pelicans failed to break through this type of defense in the Corvallis game last Saturday.

Practically every team the Pelicans will meet this year will present a six-man defense. Avrit has learned the system will be employed by Ashland, Grants Pass, Bend and Medford, the major eleven to oppose Klamath this year.

Taber in Shape The two men most seriously injured in the Corvallis game, Lynn Propert, end, and Bob Leslie, halfback, may be ready to start this week-end. Propert received an injury to his back, and has been under the care of a doctor. Leslie's knee was twisted in a hard tackle and was removed from the Corvallis game in the first half.

Big Norman Taber, fullback, is in better condition than he has been at any other time this season. Avrit said. The husky ball carrier has been bothered by a bad leg, but it apparently had improved this week.

The Pelicans didn't practice Monday night. Tuesday, however, they started intensive preparation for the next game. Avrit was encouraged by the spirit of the squad, but he still considered the men had much to learn before becoming real threats for the conference title.

Terry, who in his first full season as manager piloted the sixth place New York Giants to a world championship, was accompanied by his wife and son. He was by way of Niagara Falls. Terry may return to New York soon to consider radio and theatrical offers.

COAST FOOTBALL WINS PRAISE OF ALONZO STAGG FROM CHICAGO

STOCKTON, Calif., Oct. 11. (AP)—Western football measures up to the best traditions of the game, the veteran coach, Alonzo Stagg, declared today, adding that in some respect it was superior to the gridiron play to which he was accustomed during his forty years at the University of Chicago.

Stagg, "grand old man of football," now coaching at the College of the Pacific here, said the leading coast teams were equal to those in the big ten and the east.

St. Mary's Praised "Certainly there is no team in the big ten conference that has the man power that St. Mary's showed last Saturday in the California game," said Stagg.

"California and Stanford also have some magnificent physical specimens. I didn't get near the players on the field but when I read of men weighing 225 pounds and saw them move on the field, I know that they were fine stuff."

"There is no question but that the leading Pacific Coast teams will measure up to those in the big ten or in the east. I would say that the western teams are a little further advanced at this stage of the game."

Passing Attack Strong "There was not much fumbling in the St. Mary's-California game and both teams handled the ball well. St. Mary's was good with its wide stuff early in the game and California opened holes in the line. Coach Bill Ingram's attack was well conceived from the standpoint of strategy. He did not use many plays but they were well done."

"Coach 'Slip' Madigan played the Notre Dame attack very effectively. My observation of the Notre Dame system has been largely through its use by Purdue. I would say that Madigan's team depended heavily on strong side plays, while Purdue's attack is more developed on the weak side."

Bob Myers, pupil of Ted Thye when Thye was wrestling instructor at Multnomah club at Portland, has been matched against Billy Newman in the semi-windup. These lightweight, both popular in the northwest, have the ability to present a bout to rival the action expected in the main event.

HUBBELL NAMED MOST VALUABLE

Slender Southpaw Wins Season's Honors in National League.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11. (AP)—The selection of Carl Hubbell as the National league's "most valuable player for 1933" will bring few squawks from John Hoyer's crowd, and absolutely none at all from the Washington Senators, champions of the American league.

By almost unanimous consent, the slender southpaw pitching ace of the world champion New York Giants was adjudged most valuable to his team in balloting by a committee of eight members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America. The results of the poll were announced yesterday by Denham Thompson of the Washington Star, committee chairman.

Hubbell polled 77 points out of a maximum total of 80, and won out by decisive margins from Chuck Klein and Wally Berger, slugging outfielders of the Phillies and Boston Braves, respectively.

For several years Hubbell has been rated one of the National league's most effective hurlers, but the lean master of the screwball never before enjoyed so sensational a season as he did this year. He was the dominant pitching figure in the Giants' dramatic drive to the National league pennant, winning 23 games, 22 of them shutouts, and twice turned back Washington in the world series. The Senators failed to get an earned run off him in 20 innings.

Sons to Present Strongest Lineup for Tilt on Modoc Field.

Howard Hobson, not needing to admit he has a brilliant football team at Southern Oregon Normal school, began pointing his team this week for a major encounter with the University of Oregon Freshmen on Modoc field, Saturday, October 23.

The sons from Ashland, losing a close one to Oregon State College at the start of the season and then upsetting Pacific Northwest conference title, probably will move into Klamath Falls undefeated. The 19 to 6 victory over Pacific placed the team among the leaders in its own division.

Three Games For Frosh The Oregon Freshmen will have but three contests this season, two with the Oregon State Rooks and one with the Ashland team. The trip to Klamath Falls will be the only long jump of the year for the Frosh.

Bill Reinhardt, back as coach of the Yearlings at Eugene, has mustered some of the outstanding high school players on the coast. These are the men who will compose the Oregon variety for the next three years.

Ka-Pelicans to Play Listed among the freshmen candidates are Rex Hamaker, halfback, Bill Estes, tackle, and Chandler Berry, center. All three of these boys learned their football under Leslie Avrit at Klamath Falls.

Hobson will throw two former Pelicans into his backfield combination for the Frosh contest. Lew McAninch will get the starting position at quarterback and Bob Elliott will move against the Yearlings at fullback.

The Ashland squad will be light and not too experienced. There are, however, a sufficient number of outstanding men to assure Hobson of a second successful season. The men will improve rapidly, Hobson believes, and, barring injury, should be at the peak when they clash with the Oregon team.
