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BIDS CALLED FOR KLAMATH ROAD PROJECT

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The Oregon job includes the grading of the section of road across the flats along Lower Klamath lake. The grade will be raised higher than the water level, and a more solid foundation built. The job will include all surfacing except the final oiling. It is understood here.

Employment Considered
This project is expected to proceed through the winter months, providing employment for local labor during that period. It is one of several national recovery projects in the state.

The commission also called bids on the Agency-Deschutes river section of the Warm Springs highway, including 2.41 miles of grading, a bridge over the Deschutes river and two bridges and a creek on the Warm Springs highway near Madras.

This road will cut off north-east from the Dallas-California highway at Madras, and will connect with the Wapinitia cut-off at Bear Springs. This will reduce the distance to Portland, by way of Bend and the Wapinitia cut-off by 35 miles.

The commission also has called for bids on furnishing 6000 cubic yards of crushed rock on the Greensprings highway in Jackson county, west of here.

meat case, wherein packers are trying to obtain reduced rail rates on dressed meat and meat products.

Livestock operators feel that such rates would be particularly harmful to producers and small packers, inasmuch as the large packing companies could ship produce all over the country at reduced rates, thereby doing away with all competition.

R. L. Concaison, general sales agent of the Western Cattle Marketing association, discussed the present market situation and cited figures to show the great increase in the number of half-cattle, and other off grades.

P. L. Kilpatrick, president of the association, presented a picture of the rapidly decreasing membership has upon the marketing organization. He also discussed partially the agreement now being worked out with the secretary of agriculture by representatives of meat packers and meat growers committees.

Kilpatrick stressed the fact that if stockmen do not hold together and line up in some sort of organization, they will have very little representation on the board in working out of the national trade agreement.

Sheldon Potter, of Alturas, presented briefly to the meeting, facts relating to a new type of organization which would secure full support of stockmen on the coast and obtain fair representation in determining the national livestock policy.

SEALED VERDICT RETURNED FOR KELLY'S TRIAL

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will be sealed and the jury will retire for the night.
"The purpose of this law," declared Judge Vaughn sternly, "is to stamp out kidnapping. Do not be swayed by emotion."

Immediately after receiving the case at 5:45 p. m., the jurors started deliberations, foregoing dinner with the hope they could complete their task speedily.

"The court's instructions," said James H. Mathers, attorney for Kelly, "amounted to a directed verdict of guilty for both defendants."

Mrs. Kelly Testifies
The instructions, completed within 45 minutes, were similar to those given the jury which 19 days ago convicted seven other charged kidnapping defendants and sentenced four to life in prison.

Today's fast moving dramatic session gave to the jury Kathryn Kelly's emotional and contradictory story of forced participation in the \$200,000 ransom plot—a story smashed to bits by government cross examiners. During the two hours of final arguments government prosecutors riddled her account with sarcastic comment.

"Many parts of her story," Judge Vaughn told the jurors, "did not sound convincing to the court. Her claim of coercion did not justify the crime."

Jury at Dinner
As for Kelly, the swaggering bootlegger who became a terrorist, asked Kelly, rubbing his strawberried hair that covered bruises inflicted by a federal agent's pistol butt when Kelly became fractious the first day of the trial.

At 6:15 p. m. the jurors went to dinner, accompanied by bailiffs and a heavy guard. There was no indication of an agreement having been reached at that time.

Roosevelt Plans For Repeal and Congress Meeting

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11, (UP)—President Roosevelt made plans tonight to meet two major problems—liquor and congress—already headed for the White House doorstep.

The chief executive revealed he is desirous of having a program ready if and when prohibition is repealed.

With Senate Democratic Leader Joseph T. Robinson he also went over plans for clearing away routine affairs before congress starts in January.

Within a week Mr. Roosevelt will bring together four agencies representing the treasury, internal revenue, justice department and state department, in an effort to coordinate the independent work they already have accomplished on repeal problems.
