

WILD BIRDS MASSING ON LAKE SHORES

One of the most interesting and unique glimpses of wild life that has been afforded to city dwellers for many a year may now be observed at the lower end of Upper Klamath lake, where great flocks of ducks, including sprigs, mallards and other varieties, are feeding close to shore, literally by the roadside.

Never before in the memory of local pioneers have so many wild ducks come in close to civilization and remained for so long a time.

The portion of the lake so heavily populated with wild fowl at the present time is inside the city limits and if the birds develop any discretion, they will remain right where they are, and save a few of their feathers.

The season on migratory birds opens at noon, Monday, October 16, and sportsmen will open a barrage at that time. It, however, a hunter so far forgets himself to boom at a duck inside of the city limits, he will find himself in a pretty pickle, liable to fine, imprisonment, or both.

One of the prominent ranchers of the Upper Lake district, has volunteered to donate several bags of grain to feed the birds at the lower end of the lake, in the hope of keeping them there as an added tourist attraction for the city. Thousands of tourists visit Lake Merritt in Oakland, Calif., each year just to see the "famous" wild ducks. If the birds are not frightened away from their present haunts where they are easily observed from the highway, and if officers patrol the shores on the opening day of the season, it is probable that the ducks will visit Klamath's favorite white pelican in creating interest among visitors to this country.

CHANGE IN HIGHWAY IN A M E SUGGESTED

In re-naming The Dalles-California highway, Klamath Falls has an opportunity to link itself more closely to Oregon and to make its name more widely known. It was declared here on Thursday by Mrs. I. L. Patterson, widow of the former governor of Oregon.

Speaking before the Kiwanis Mrs. Patterson asked: "Do you suppose California would permit a highway to run through the state known as the San Diego-Oregon highway. You

have a chance here at Klamath Falls to identify yourselves more closely with your state, by working for another name for The Dalles-California highway that will make your own name widely known."

Mrs. Patterson accompanied Mrs. John Y. Richardson, state regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution, to Klamath Falls.

KATHRYN, MOTHER SEEK SAME PRISON

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 12 (AP)—Kathryn wasted no tears today on the sentence that sends her to prison for the rest of her life.

Instead, back in the county jail, she put into vehement words her concern over whether she will be sent to the same prison with her mother, Mrs. R. G. Shannon, given a life term last week for her part in the Urchel kidnapping.

"They couldn't be so cruel as to separate us," she said.

"If they send us to the same place, where I can watch after my mother and know that she is near me, I'll be a good prisoner. If they don't I'll go stark raving crazy!"

Federal agents have hinted that mother and daughter might be taken to different prisons. No definite announcement has been made, however.

SENTENCE AGAINST CLERK POSTPONED

SALEM, Oct. 12. (AP)—Sentence was deferred when Albert G. Maizels, 22, pleaded guilty to appropriating for his own use \$205.11 state money, in circuit court here yesterday.

Maizels appeared without counsel and waived preliminary hearing and grand jury indictment. District Attorney William Trindle asked that sentence be suspended until auditors could report on the exact shortage in the state board of control collection department, where Maizels was in charge. Trindle said it was Maizels' first offense.

Judge L. H. McElhan released Maizels on his own recognizance, requiring that he report daily to District Attorney Trindle and be available to assist in the audit. Trindle said Maizels would probably ask for a bench parole when he appeared for sentence.

BRANCH OF PARK WILL OPEN HERE

Crater lake national park branch headquarters has been assigned room 302 in the federal building. It was announced Thursday by Postmaster John McCall, custodian of the building. McCall said space in the building has been much in demand and all offices will be filled.

The federal re-employment office, with Nelson Reed in charge, will move soon to the federal building from the basement of the courthouse, McCall said.

Ranger David Canfield of the park will be in charge of the park offices, which will be opened about October 15.

SEATTLE, Oct. 12. (AP)—Washington's chances of conquering Oregon at football for the first time in six years here Saturday were less hopeful today with Paul "Socco" Sulkosky, regular fullback, still in the Seattle general hospital with a sprained muscle in one knee.

Dr. Don Palmer reported that "it might be possible for Sulkosky to play if necessary," but Coach Jimmy Phelan declared he would not use the rugged blocker unless "he is right."

KENO RESIDENT BEATEN, ROBBED

Charles O. Langley, 47, of Keno Road was severely beaten and robbed of \$40 Tuesday night, according to reports filed at police bureau by Langley himself, who dragged himself to the station when he regained consciousness.

Langley who is an employe of the Keasterson Lumber company, told officers that he went into a local pool hall Tuesday night and cashed a check for \$40. He engaged in conversation with two men whom he had never seen before, purchased some drinks, and planned to go on a party with these men at their invitation.

One of the strangers told Langley that they would take him home and then collect several others for the party. Langley agreed, according to his reports to police station.

Arriving at his house, Langley and the two men from the pool hall went inside, leaving the automobile driver outside.

Langley switched on a light and at the same time was struck over the head with a black-jack, or "sap." He told officers that he begged his assailants to take his money but not to kill him.

When he came to hours later, the money was gone.

Langley was able to furnish only meagre descriptions of his assailants.

NEGRO MURDERED BY LYNCHING MOB

LABADIEVILLE, La., Oct. 12 (AP)—A NEGRO, arrested yesterday for questioning in connection with the slaying of Miss Louisiana LaRose, 15-year-old white girl whose body was found in a field, was taken from the Labadieville jail today and lynched by a mob of unidentified men.

The negro, whose name was not disclosed at the time of his arrest, was seized quietly by the mob and hanged from a grider of the bridge over Bayou La Fourche. When early risers in the community saw the body at dawn and officers cut it down, they found a roughly written note pinned to the clothing warning "all persons" against attacks on women of the section.

SOLDIERS MUTINY AT SIAM CAPITAL

BANGKOK, Siam, Oct. 12 (AP)—Martial law was proclaimed here today after two up-country regiments mutinied and seized the Dommuang airframe, the headquarters of the royal aeronautical service.

Firing occurred in a clash between the up-country troops and troops from the capital 13 miles outside the city. Whether there were any casualties was not immediately reported.

The king and queen of Siam are in Huahin. Quiet prevailed in the capital tonight.
