Opposition to the tax appears certain to develop at the hearings, with the "graduated scale"

Graduated Scale of Proposed City Tax on Gross Sales.

1. Tax of one-tenth of one per cent on gross sales in excess of \$10,000 and not exceeding \$500,000.
2. Tax of three-fourths of one per cent on sales over \$500,000 and not exceeding \$1,000,000.
3. Tax of 2 per cent on gross sales over \$1,000,000 and not exceeding \$750,000.
4. Tax of 3 per cent on gross sales over \$750,000 and not exceeding \$1,000,000.
5. Tax of 4 per cent on gross sales of \$1,000,000 or over.

Exemptions: Sales of automobiles, motor fuels and oils, public utilities, producers of farm, dairy and garden products.

feature of the ordinance coming into contention. It is believed that at least two businesses will fall in the \$500,000-\$750,000 bracket, on which a 2 per cent tax would be levied. Several, it is believed, would be affected by the three-fourths of one per cent on gross sales between \$100,000 and \$500,000, while many retail establishments would fall within the \$10,000 to \$300,000 bracket.

Exemptions Listed.

The proposed ordinance exempts from taxation all those engaged exclusively in the sale of:

1. Farm, dairy and garden products, actually raised and produced by them in this state.
2. Motor fuels and oils.
3. Automobiles.
4. Public utilities.

The latter group is already taxed by the city on the basis of gross revenue. Motor fuels are taxed heavily by the state and federal government, and automobiles pay state license taxes. Mayor Mahoney issued a statement Friday in connection with the proposed legislation. It appears elsewhere in this paper.

Mahoney emphasized the feature of the ordinance that provides the revenue shall go into the bond sinking fund. The city has outstanding general obligation bonds of some \$750,000, with the following payments coming due in the next few years:

Year	Principal	Interest

The city executive said he hoped the tax raised under the proposed ordinance would take care of the interest payments so that real estate would only be taxed for the principal.

Efforts to estimate the amount which could be raised under the ordinance met with considerable difficulty, because of lack of authentic estimates of the amount of retail business now being done by local establishments. In 1929, the government statistics indicated the retail business here was \$14,000,000.

Final Decision Pending.

The ordinance defines a retail merchant as a firm, person, association, co-partnership and corporation, opening, establishing, operating or maintaining any store or place of business . . . for the purpose of, and actually selling therefrom or therein goods, wares, merchandise, chattels, commodities and/or any subject of commerce.

Quarterly payments are called for, but final decision has not been reached upon what period of gross sales the tax will be based. A ten per cent penalty for failure to secure the proper license is proposed. The police judge and city attorney would enforce and administer the ordinance.

Mahoney said that insofar as he knows, the proposed tax is an innovation in the state. No other municipalities in Oregon have levies of this sort, he said. He was proceeding under the authority given in the charter to the mayor and council to raise indirect revenues.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13. (AP)— Mounted police rode their horses through crowds of rioters today at NRA headquarters at the Hotel Pennsylvania in midtown New York. Police said radicals numbering 350 were responsible for the disorders.

More than fifty arrests were made. Demonstrators, bearing placards and banners, were pushed back to sidewalks and police attempted to chase them out of the neighborhood.

More than 2,000 strikers in the cleaning, dying and tailoring industry assembled at the hotel at 10:30 a. m.

HENRY FORD LOSES COSTLY LAWSUIT

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 13. (AP)— Verdict of \$100,000 against Henry Ford was awarded today by a jury in the suits involving the Detroit manufacturer and the Sweeten Automobile company of this city.

The jury was out three hours. Ford sued the Sweeten Automobile company for \$6,800 admitted to be due on promissory notes, and the Sweeten concern brought a counter action to recover \$160,110 which it claimed was lost as a result of Ford taking over the Lincoln Motor company. The Sweeten company was the Philadelphia distributor for the Lincoln car at the time. It is now in receivership.

RUSSIA, JAPAN NEARING BREAK

MOSCOW, Oct. 13. (AP)— The tightly drawn cord of diplomatic relations between Russia and Japan has stretched a bit nearer the breaking point today.

It was strained farther with reports from Khabarovsk, Siberia, of the arrest of two more soviet officials of the Chinese Eastern railway in Japanese-aided state, Manchukuo.

Only a few days ago a sensation was created here with the publication of what allegedly were documents describing a Japanese plan to seize the G. E. R. One by one, it was said, the few remaining soviet among the road's officials were to be removed, eventually giving Manchukuo complete control.

The two latest arrests reportedly were made as soviet Consul General Slavutski at Harbin renewed his demands for an answer to his previous reports.

Meanwhile, from Tokyo came a foreign office spokesman's statement which indicated Japan's stand remained unchanged. "Several days of careful deliberation," he said, will precede Nippon's next move in the controversy.

SLAYER OF THREE WOMEN EXECUTED

SPEZIA, Italy, Oct. 13. (AP)— A volley of bullets in the back at dawn today ended 47-year-old Cesare Serriatti's gruesome career as Italy's modern "Bluebeard."

Serriatti was tied to a chair and shot in the spine by a squad of carabinieri. A huge crowd witnessed his death.

He was convicted and sentenced in the court of assizes on 11 counts July 7, all connected

with the mysterious disappearance and subsequently confirmed deaths of three young women who had given him their affections and life savings.
