

REPORT SHOWS RAPID STRIDE OF BUSINESS

NEW YORK, Oct. 13. (AP)—Dun and Bradstreet said today that the "most impressive pick-up of the fall season occurred this week in general trade movements."

"The first full week of seasonable weather," stated the agency's review, "brought reports from all parts of the country of sharp increases in retail distribution, particularly pronounced in rural communities, with the strong drive of the 'buy now' campaign proving a powerful stimulus to the spread of the demand for merchandise."

"The reports were accompanied by advice of labor difficulties being straightened out completely in some industries and partially in others, removing one of the most serious handicaps to progress during the last few weeks."

"Financial conditions have become noticeably easier, with work already under way to remove the last lingering traces of the almost complete cessation of banking facilities last March."

"The extent of the business up-trend since June, accompanied by the steady rise of employment and increase in payrolls, has developed a new public psychology, which is now one of spending rather than hoarding."

FEDERAL GROUP DENIES GRANT TO RAILROAD

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13. (AP)—The interstate commerce commission was urged today by M. S. Jameson, examiner, to deny an application of the California and Oregon Coast Railroad company for permission to build a road from Grants Pass, Ore., to Crescent City, Calif.

Jameson said the road would run parallel most of its length to a fine public highway. He said estimates of the population and number of square miles the line would serve are excessive.

Line Started in 1913
The railroad would be an extension of a line started in 1913. The original plan was to build a road from Grants Pass, Ore., to Crescent City. Fifteen miles of the line have been constructed. Grants Pass built the first 10 miles of the line through an issue of \$200,000 in bonds. In 1915 the property was deeded to the company under a contract requiring the company to construct certain new lines within specified periods of time. Under the contract an additional five miles was built and a considerable sum expended to rehabilitate the first segment.

But the company was unable to finance the remainder and last summer applied for a reconstruction loan of \$5,718,565 and later sought a public works loan of a similar amount. The road connects with the Southern Pacific at Grants Pass.

Pine Association Reports Business

PORTLAND, Oct. 13. (AP)—New business amounting to 42,538,000 feet, about 6 per cent less than the previous week and 17 per cent under the three-year weekly average for October, was reported today by the Western Pine association for the week ending Oct. 7.

Shipments for the week were 43,573,000 feet, and production amounted to 50,344,000 feet, putting production at 23 per cent of capacity compared with 23 per cent average for the year to date. Current orders were 27 per cent of sawmill capacity.

He's Not Insull

Industrial Mishaps Take Lives Of Two

SALEM, Oct. 13. (AP)—Two fatalities and 457 accidents were reported the past week in Oregon industries, the industrial accident commission announced today.

Miss L. C. M. Gillette, stenographer at Crater Lake and Jack Ludvigson, logger at Molalla, were the fatalities.

COMPANY ENJOINED FROM INTERFERING

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 13. (AP)—The Simplex Shoe Manufacturing company was enjoined today from interfering with unionization of its workers and labor leaders hailed the court order a preliminary victory of nationwide significance in the interpretation of labor's rights under the NLR.

Circuit Judge John J. Gregory held the company had violated section 7-A, the so-called labor provision of the national recovery act, by refusing to deal with C. J. Morrow, Boston, vice president of the International Boot and Shoe Workers' union.

The Simplex firm, the judge held, had threatened workers with loss of employment if the plant were unionized. The company contended the action should have been tried in federal court, but Judge Gregory held the blanket industrial code, which the Simplex firm signed, was a contract for the benefit of a third party, in this instance the workers and that under the Wisconsin labor code, such a contract comes under the purview of state courts.

Smith Receives Doctor's Degree From New York

NEW YORK, Oct. 13. (AP)—Alfred E. Smith hung a new honorary degree on his office wall today, but there's still room for a few more.

He was given the degree of Doctor of Laws by the University of the State of New York in Albany last night to add to those from Harvard, Columbia, Manhattan, Fordham and the University of Ireland, not forgetting the degree of F. F. M. by his own description, "Fulton Fish Market."

"I've got room on my office wall for a few more," Smith said after he received his latest degree.

Prunes Shipped To Foreign Mart

SALEM, Oct. 13. (AP)—Shipments of 1933 prunes to foreign

ports started here this week with large blocks of Roseburg prunes included in the exports. Italy, Norway, Argentina, Germany, Poland and England were named by the canners as foreign destinations for the Oregon fruit.

DIES WHILE HUNTING

OREGON CITY, Oct. 13. (AP)—Apparently the victim of acute indigestion, Harry Duncan, 30, of Estacada, died Thursday while on a hunting trip in the mountains about nine miles south of Estacada, within 15 minutes after he had eaten some honey from a bee tree which he had found.

BLAST KILLS SIX

VIZAGAPATAM, India, Oct. 13. (AP)—Six persons were killed and eight injured seriously in an explosion today at a fireworks factory. The plant collapsed and it was feared ten workers were caught under the debris.
