

Sons, Frosh Display Strength

Power of Two Teams Mustered for Contest on Modoc Field, October 28. Billy Reinhart Does the Unusual. St. Mary's Record Strong Against Troy. Football Player Housed in Jail.

The success of two Oregon football teams Friday night has assured Klamath Falls of one of the major contests of the season. Victories for the University of Oregon Freshmen and the Southern Oregon Teachers from Ashland push these elevens to the front with promises of a colorful struggle when they meet on Modoc field Saturday, October 28.

Howard Hobson, coach of the Sons, has been described as the "miracle man" of minor college football in Oregon. Within slightly more than one year of coaching at Ashland he had developed one of the most sensational elevens in Normal school competition. Friday night he upset Larry Wolfe's Oregon Normal team from Monmouth, 12 to 7.

It was one of the most stirring contests of the season on Multnomah field. The Sons marched to two touchdowns in the first period and then held their advantage with a strong defensive style of play. And Lewis McAninch, former Klamath Pelican quarterback, was one of the chief figures in the Ashland victory.

The power of the Ashland eleven can't be disregarded. Any team able to beat the conqueror of Alton Stagg's combination from the College of the Pacific at Stockton, Calif., has an abundance of merit.

The Oregon Freshmen, back under the guidance of Billy Reinhart, one of the leading basketball and football coaches on the Pacific coast, tramped over the Oregon State Rooks 7 to 3. It marked the last appearance of the Yearlings before coming to Klamath Falls to meet the Sons.

The Sons, manned by some of the most brilliant high school players in the state and reinforced by conference intelligibility and junior college stars, will be outstanding favorites to defeat the Freshmen.

The Yearlings, however, rather surprised the world by defeating the Rooks for the first time in the history of the sport. In some of the most promising material from the high schools of the northwest, the advance word was that Oregon had rather lost out among the prep schools this season.

But that's Billy Reinhart football. He has the habit of winning men he isn't supposed to. His record against the Rooks, it recalled correctly, includes only one defeat.

St. Mary's has done pretty well since that 1931 day when the Gaels upset the University of Southern California. The Gaels have lost only five games, scored 244 points, have only let 121 points get through their own defense.

It's interesting to know that more than 10,000 northern California residents headed the Southern California to watch the Gaels go against the Trojans again.

Up until Saturday St. Mary's has met Southern California six times. Each team won three of its games.

Arkansas university apparently is the rising team of the Southwest Conference. Not, perhaps, that it has anything to do with the success of the team, but Gus Edison, veteran center and star of the squad, lives in the county jail at Fayetteville. He's not there as a prisoner but merely does chores for his board and room.

It rather reminds the coast of the generous sheriff's office at Seattle when some of the star players of the late Enoch Bagshaw and then Jimmy Phelan were housed and fed free of charge for the good of the University of Washington.

OREGON STATE WINS OVER DONS

Franklin Leads Attack On San Francisco; Score 12 to 7

KEZAR STADIUM, SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14. (UP)—Norman Franklin, a red-haired left halfback weighing 165 pounds, gave Oregon State college a 12 to 7 football victory over the University of San Francisco here today by brilliant field running and passing.

The Long Beach, Calif., youth received the kickoff and ran 55 yards through the scattered San Francisco team for one touchdown. In the middle of the last quarter, when O. S. C. trailed 6 to 7, Franklin drew back from the U. S. F. 20-yard line to the 40-yard line and passed perfectly to Hal Pangle, quarterback. Pangle took the ball in the end zone for a touchdown as two opponents reached for it.

Conversions failed. Both conversion attempts failed. Franklin tried to pass after the first score and Schwammel's kick was blocked after the second.

Franklin's spectacular punt returns and end runs were a constant threat to San Francisco.

In the third period, he returned a punt 50 yards from his own goal before stepping out of bounds as he slowed to wait for interference to form. Orville Condray, a substitute fullback for U. S. F., sparked his team in the third period. Almost immediately, he drove down from the O. S. C. 25-yard line, where San Francisco got the ball on a blocked kick. Condray plunged from the two-yard line for the touchdown and Blewett kicked for the extra point.

STANFORD TIES NORTHWESTERN

Game Ends Scoreless with Goal Lines Threatened Often

CHICAGO, Oct. 14. (UP)—Football teams of Stanford university and Northwestern played a scoreless tie before 40,000 spectators here today.

Thirty seconds remained to play in the second period, and Stanford had the ball on Northwestern's 2-yard line.

The two teams lined up and John Reiser, Stanford's sophomore left halfback, crashed into the Northwestern line. When the players were pulled apart by the referee the ball still was six inches from the Northwestern goal line, and the pistol shot rang out ending the half.

Stanford Outplayed That goal line stand by Northwestern, after a disastrous fumble, gave Stanford its scoring opportunity, enabled the Wildcats to hold the far westerners to a scoreless tie and redeem some of the prestige they lost by bowing to Iowa on the same field two weeks ago, 7-0.

Northwestern actually outplayed Stanford, gaining 170 yards from scrimmage to Stanford's 122. The Big Ten team made nine first downs to Stanford's six. But the far westerners had the two best scoring opportunities, both coming as a result of Northwestern's mistakes.

Grayson Stars After covering Ollie Olson's fumble on the 20-yard line with about two minutes left to play in the first half, Stanford rushed the ball to the 2-yard line in five plays, aided by a 5-yard penalty on Northwestern, but the timer's clock and the Northwestern line stopped the Indians when they were on the verge of scoring.

Stanford's other scoring opportunity came early in the third period when the invaders got the ball on Northwestern's 33-yard line after a poor punt by Olson. Bobby Grayson, Stanford sophomore fullback, ripped through Northwestern's right tackle for 12 yards.

Grayson, Sim and Maentz, Stanford's cardinal-jerseyed backs, poured through the Northwestern line to first down on the 14-yard line.

Northwestern Threatens Maentz failed to gain and then Ken Afferback picked up four yards in two plunges. On fourth down, with six yards to go, Bill Corbus, Stanford guard, who was named all-American last year, dropped back to the 17-yard line, apparently to attempt a field goal. Instead he threw a pass which fell into the end zone.

That was Stanford's last chance to score. Northwestern then made two marches into Stanford territory. The Wildcats reached the Indians' 23-yard line before losing the ball when Corbus intercepted Olson's pass on the 21-yard line in the third period.

In the final period Northwestern invaded Stanford territory again, making a first down on the 33-yard line and going three yards farther before Cruick's left-handed pass was plucked out of the air by Bob O'Connor, Stanford left guard.

Young Tommy Wins Decision From Japanese

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 14 (UP)—Young Tommy, 121½, Philippines, earned a decision here last night in a 10 round main event with Johnny Yasui, 120½, of Japan.

Tommy led the fighting in seven rounds, two were even and one went to Yasui, who gained strength in the closing rounds.

The Frosh recovered and line backs by Nye and Bishop advanced the platoon to the Rook one-foot line. Borden scored through left tackle. Murray's kick was good for the extra point.

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Berkeley, Calif., Oct. 14. (UP)—California pounded and pushed its way to a 23 to 0 victory over the Olympic club today, with the Golden Bear reserves playing most of the game against the San Francisco clubmen.

The victory may prove costly for Navy Bill Ingram's squad. Flier Blower, star halfback, was carried from the field in the second quarter with undetermined injuries. Later, Franklin Walker, reserve fullback, received a shoulder dislocation, after Walker's injury, Ingram yanked all his varsity men and entered the game with his second and third stringers.

The Golden Bears got two points in the first quarter when Bill Boone blocked an Olympic kick. The ball rolled beyond the end zone for a safety. In the second quarter the Californians scored two touchdowns. Gilt went across from the six-yard line on an end-around play. Raleigh Williams scored from the same line on a thrust off tackle. Williams converted both tries for extra points.

In the third period Jack Brittingham, new end sensation, ran 18 yards on an end-around play for the final touchdown. Chuck Cotton, fourth string halfback, whose line plunging dominated the Bears' attack, kicked the extra point.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14. (UP)—George H. Townsend, president of the American Power Boat association, cabled from Paris today that he has obtained nine foreign entries for a series of international speedboat races at Florida next February and March.

The races are to be held at New Smyrna, Miami and possibly Palm Beach. Townsend said he had received an entry of two 12 litre boats from Italy, and one from France which will race against the cream of the American gold cup boats.

He also received entries of outboard teams, three men each, from France and Spain in the international class X.

Puget Sound Trims Bearcat Team, 6 to 0

TACOMA, Oct. 14. (AP)—In a thrilling past period climax to a bitterly fought contest, College of Puget Sound upset the strong Willamette University football team 6 to 0 here last night.

With five yards to go on a fourth down in the fourth period, and the ball 8 yards from the Willamette goal line, Cps let a pass go and hauled it down in the end zone. It was a surprise play worked to perfection and Willamette was caught flat-footed.

Just after the start of the second half Willamette got to within one yard of Puget Sound's goal and a touchdown appeared sure. But Olson fumbled and Cps recovered on their own two-yard line. The Sounders kicked and Willamette again fumbled in receiving the ball and Cps took it on their 46-yard line.

Chief figures in that victory were Griffith and Wotkins, among the backs, and Aaron Rosenberg and Bob Erskine in the line.

Showing best for St. Mary's were Wilson, a tough, hard-running, good punting halfback, and the Caninus brothers, George and Fred, and John Yezerski, giant tackle.

Game Won at Opening The Gaels threatened dangerously in the final minute of play when Harry Mattos, left-handed passer, threw successfully to Erdelatz and Pennino for a total of 37 yards, but the Trojans were alert for the third pass and Mattos was tackled before he could throw. He was dropped just as the game ended.

The game was settled in the first half, when both teams did their scoring. The second half was bitterly fought, with honors practically even.

Irvine (Cotton) Warburton, midget, Troy quarterback, whose long runs were responsible for last week's rout of Washington State, was ineffective against the Gaels. Most of his yardage was made through the line with the Trojan "power house" running interference.

GAELS DEFEATED BY U. S. C. TEAM

Two Terrific Plunges Takes Team to 14-7 Victory

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, LOS ANGELES, Oct. 14. (UP)—Two magnificent power drives gave Southern California a 14 to 7 victory over St. Mary's college in a grueling battle before 50,000 people here today.

The Trojans smashed 68 yards to the first score and 73 yards to the second, completing each long march without losing the ball. Haskell Wotkins dove over center from the one-yard line for the first and Homer Griffith skied end two yards to make the second.

Game Rough Meantime St. Mary's, with one rapier-like stroke, made its touchdowns on a pass from George Wilson to George Caninus. The pass gained a total of 48 yards and Caninus ran across the line untouched. Carl Jorgensen converted.

The game, extremely rough and slowed up by frequent penalties, saw Southern California, national champion for the past two years, annex their 25th consecutive win.
