

Dr. Devore To Referee Friday

Karasick Refuses to Accept Pete Belcastro As Third Man. Crescent City Eleven Upsets Medford. 7 to 0. Franklin, Mikulak and Temple All-Coast Material.

Few wrestling fans look upon shaggy Al Karasick with any show of fondness or favoritism. Dislike for Al has been pretty generally expressed at the Legion hall; now, however, it is time for Al to announce a private grudge.

The Russian Lion, meeting Harry Demetral the Greek Friday night, has refused to enter the ring if Pete Belcastro, Weed's wrestling referee, is to be the third man. Belcastro, the Lion insists, prevented the use of Karasick's famous and effective headlock against George Wilson last week. Karasick had been counting on the headlock to upset the former All-American but Belcastro ruled it out as a single hold.

So Mack Lillard, Klamath promoter, announced Belcastro, more popular as a referee than as a wrestler, will not officiate at the match between Karasick and Demetral.

It is quite certain Dr. Napoleon Devore, the Frenchman who wrestled two outstanding matches here several weeks ago, will be the third man in the ring Friday. The doctor was expected to arrive in San Francisco early this week and then start north, stopping over in Klamath Falls Friday night.

Devore has done considerable traveling and very little wrestling since he left Klamath Falls where he had his last match on the Pacific coast. The Frenchman had been invited to finish the fall season as a main event wrestler in Hawaii but some difficulty with the Honolulu promoters encouraged him to drop the tour.

He sailed across the Pacific, landed at Honolulu, discussed terms with the promoters and then sailed right back to San Francisco.

Klamath Falls, not Medford, stands out as one of the undefeated contributions to inter-scholastic football in Oregon. The Tigers, vigorous and successful enemy of the Pelicans team, was upset last Saturday 7 to 0.

Crescent City high school from the northern most coast city in California, accomplished this surprising trick at Medford.

It was the first time in gridiron history this California team had defeated the Tigers and its quite certain the defeat doesn't sit particularly well with Darwin Burgher, Medford head coach.

Burgher is inclined to believe his lads had a "prima donna" complex which, most assuredly, must be overcome before the Klamath game on Modoc field Friday, October 27.

At Medford, overconfidence and costly fumbles have been blamed for the defeat. Crescent City, however, had a particularly strong lineup. Every one in the valley, though, has rather forgotten the power Crescent City presents in its own elimination from the ranks of the undefeated.

The Californians scored in the third period on a pass. The Pelicans have been rather stage struck over the prospects of meeting Medford. But that is not unexpected, for the Tigers have won so many games from the Pelicans it is reasonable the Pelicans should be a little timid.

It's not often Klamath goes against a Tiger eleven which has already been defeated. The youngsters here may now consider that what Crescent City can do, so can Klamath Falls.

When they start selecting all-conference backs it will be difficult to forget about Norman Franklin at Oregon State and Mike Mikulak and Mark Temple at Oregon. There is a fullback, Mikulak, and two halfbacks who would look well even in the uniform of a Southern California Trojan. Franklin will have a wonderful opportunity to show his ability against the strongest team in the country when the Beavers run into the Trojans at Portland next Saturday. With just a little support, the Oregon State back should be able to maintain a continued threat on the Trojan goal line.

KLAMATH SEEKS FOOTBALL GAME

Redmond, Burns Sought As Competition for Idle Pelicans.

Dwight French, athletic director at Klamath Union high school, was concentrating this week on bringing a game to Modoc field Saturday. Lakeview, crippled after its game with Ashland, announced definitely it would be unable to meet the Pelicans.

Redmond and Burns stood out Tuesday as possible selections. French has sent communications to both these Oregon schools, and was expecting a reply momentarily.

Californians Contacted. Red Bluff, Redding and Dunsmuir, Northern California teams, also have been contacted. It was hoped one of these three teams would be able to play here Saturday in case both Burns and Redmond had a full schedule.

Klamath has not met any of these five teams in recent years. All, however, would be capable of offering strong competition.

Medford Beaten. Meanwhile, Los Arvrit and Al Sincclair, Klamath coaches, continued their preparations for the Medford contest here Friday, October 27. It is possible Klamath will go into the game undefeated, while Medford already has lost one clash with Crescent City, 7 to 0.

Idleness for more than a week has eliminated all the injuries from the squad. There have been no games on the schedule since the tie with Corvallis, but Arvrit and Sincclair have continued to give their players an abundance of training drills.

The fight was halted after two minutes and eight seconds of the sixth round of a scheduled eight-round bout.

Brennan's action, booed by some and cheered by others, gave Ferrando a technical knockout victory. Henry Perlick was alleged to have kicked Brennan when they passed on the way to the dressing room and both started exchanging punches. Police broke up the fight.

VANDALS RAID EUGENE FRIDAY

Webfoots Enter Second Conference Game Under Lights.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Oct. 17.—(Special)—The University of Oregon's fighting Webfoots, fresh from their upset victory over the University of Washington, will engage in their second conference game of the season here Friday night, when the University of Idaho Vandals invade Hayward field.

The Vandals will bring to Eugene one of the heaviest and most versatile football eleven ever molded on the Moscow campus. Led by Willis "Little Giant" Smith, triple-threat quarterback, Idaho has a powerful running and passing attack which has enabled them to score on every opponent this season.

According to comparative scores, the Webfoots will have a heavy "paper" advantage over the Vandals. Washington defeated the Vandals 32 to 6, while Oregon won 6 to 0 from the Huskies. Webfoot scouts who have watched Idaho in action this season report that Leo Calland's squad is much stronger than the Washington score indicates.

Oregon emerged from the Washington contest without any serious injuries, although several of the players brought back the usual cuts, bruises and "charley horses." Mark Temple, co-captain and left halfback, received a bad gash over his eye, requiring six stitches, but will be able to play Friday night. Bernie Hughes, Temple's partner at captaincy, also was hurt, broke his thumb and may give way to his understudy, Chuck Swanson, against the Vandals.

Interior points, which are accustomed to high temperatures when the sun beams, reported maximums ranging from 86 at Needles to 92 at Sacramento.

Los Angeles was mildly warm with a maximum of 88. San Diego was cool with a high mark of 66.

ORANGE POINT FOR TROJANS

Coach Stiner Prepares Attack for U. S. C. Saturday.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 17.—A five-day period of intensive practice was started here Monday in preparation for the football game between Oregon State and Southern California in Portland Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. Although scrimmages will not be allowed, Coach Stiner plans to polish the last rough spots off the Orange offense, which has clicked only occasionally this year.

The Orangemen have shown a great defense in their first five games of which four were victories and one a scoreless tie but have failed to uncover a real crunching power play. With the flashy Norman Franklin packing the ball, the Orangemen have been dangerous all season as he can punt, pass or advance the oval equally well. In the San Francisco game last week-end, Franklin ran back the opening kick-off for a touchdown and nearly repeated his performance in the second half. He also was on the tussling end of a 32-yard pass to Hal Fangle, which was good for the winning touchdown.

Although dope greatly favors the Trojans, who have won their last 25 games, the Orangemen may do surprising things as they always have given Southern California a tough afternoon. Even last year when Oregon State was hopelessly outclassed, the Trojans had a real task scoring 19 to 0 triumph.

Howard Jones, Southern California coach, who has won two successive national championships, will bring one of his strongest teams north. Not only are the Trojans outstanding on defense but they have two great ball carriers in Homer Griffith and Cotton Warburton. Warburton ran the Washington State players ragged with his long touchdown dashes a few weeks ago while Griffith, who features in the Trojan power plays, advanced the ball 75 yards in successive surges for a touchdown against the strong St. Mary's forward wall last weekend.

Troy's head man hoped Homer Griffith, first string quarterback, would show up this afternoon and rather expected Julius Rescos, first team end, would put in an appearance. The status of Capt. Ford Palmer was still uncertain. Cliffcut, starting fullback, was expected to be in suit.

Both Erskine and Youel are suffering from knee injuries of a type which probably will require a week of rest, team physicians said. Palmer hurt his foot. Griffith turned an ankle. Propst suffered infection and Rescos suffered a lame shoulder as an outgrowth of Saturday's victory over St. Mary's.

The Trojans will leave for the Northwest tomorrow night and are due in Portland Friday morning.
