KLAMATH MILK GIVEN GRADING BY INSPECTOR

Grading of Klamath Falls milk distributors in accordance with the standard milk ordinance and the United States public health ordinance and code, was announced Monday by Dr. C. H. Hartman, dairy and food inspector here. The grade report was filed with the city police judge.

Dr. Hartman said that the department uses all consumers to purchase milk on the basis of grade. He said the grade appears on each bottle cap and the grades of milk sold in restaurants, hotels, soda fountains and stores and establishments, will be indicated on placards. Grade A milk is the safest pasteurized milk, and grade A raw milk is the safest raw milk, the inspector said.

In his report, Dr. Hartman says there are two grade A producers, 17 grade B producers, and two grade D producers now operating in the Klamath Falls milk shed. All grade D milk has been ordered stopped to the distributors until grade requirements have been complied with, the inspector reported.

"On and after publication of this notice all dairymen must placard all containers of milk with the grade of milk contained therein, and the name of the producer or distributor on the cap or label," says Hartman's report. The inspector asked the public to co-operate by reporting violations to his office.

The grades of the milk supplied here were determined by the local health department in co-operation with the state department of agriculture. Hartman said that when requirements are met by the various dairies not already marked grade A, they will be given a new rating and the change announced in the newspaper.

THOUSANDS BACK AT WORK AGAIN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—The labor department reported today that over 620,000 workers returned to their jobs during September in the seventeen industrial and business groups reporting to its bureau of labor statistics.

Secretary Perkins said over 200,000 workers found employment in manufacturing industries and a slightly larger number in retail establishments.

The seasonal increase in canning accounted for 70,000. Gains in the wholesale trade were also shown.

Building construction industries indicated more than 20,000 workers were added.

ALBERT EINSTEIN ARRIVES IN U. S.

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 17 (AP)—Professor Albert Einstein, famed mathematician who will work with advanced pupils in "theoretical physics" at the newly organized Institute of advanced study, arrived in this quiet university town today and went into seclusion.

So quiet was the arrival of Dr. Einstein, his wife and his associate, Dr. Walter Mayer of Vienna, that few here knew of it. But it was learned the scientist was driven by automobile from New York to the home of friends. Where that home is was not known.

The lack of a reception and interviews here correspond with Prof. Einstein's arrival in New York earlier today. Reaching by port via the Westerland from Europe, the scientist's party was hustled into a tug to avoid the usual landing procedure and put ashore at the municipal pier. Battery Park, where a car was ready for the short trip to Princeton.

The livestock teams judged Jersey cows at the U. E. Reeder ranch at Pine Grove; Holsteins at the C. W. Lewis ranch in the same locality; Jerseys at the Earl Mack ranch in Spring Lake, and beef type cattle at the Alex Cheyne ranch, also at Spring Lake.

Sexton met with the Altamont poultry judging teams late Monday afternoon, giving club members instruction in the judging of all standard classes of poultry.

The Klamath 4-H club teams, accompanied by Sexton, will leave Sunday for Portland, where they will visit the P. L. and enter the annual contests.

MOTORIST FINDS GAS HIGH HERE

Indignant at Oregon gasoline prices, which he found ranging well above the price for motor fuel elsewhere, F. H. Thompson, manager of the Langell Valley Irrigation district, returned to his home last week.

Thompson, accompanied by Mrs. Thompson, visited the world's fair at Chicago, as well as friends in Wisconsin, Iowa, Nebraska and elsewhere.

He said that the highest price paid for gasoline outside of Oregon was 22 cents a gallon. He said that at John Day, in eastern Oregon, he paid 30 cents per gallon.

In Wisconsin, Thompson bought gasoline at 26 cents for five gallons, and at Chicago the motor fuel could be had for 31 cents for five gallons.
