## BUYING ORDERS SEND GRAIN UP

CHICAGO, Oct. 17 (AP)—Buying orders rushed wheat, corn and oats prices up late today to the extreme limits allowed for any day.

Official statements that federal government agencies were purchasing at many cities large wheat supplies for food relief purposes had an electric effect on all the grain pits here. Trade became of enormous volume, with wheat rising 5 cents above yesterday's finish, corn up 4 cents and oats 3 cents. Earlier, violent selling had smashed season low price records in all grains.

Wheat closed strong at the day's top figures, 4½-5 cents above yesterday's finish, corn 3¼-4 cents up, oats 2 cents advanced, and provisions showing 20-50 cents gain.

# National, Local Markets

## FRESH BUTTER QUOTED STEADY AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 17 (AP)—Market on cube butter was unchanged during the week's initial session of the produce exchange. On the open market there was a similar situation.

Holders of butter in store were not a unit in their ideas as to government participation in the market. This was due to the fact that most of them were in a position where they will of necessity be forced to take quite a loss if they sell to the government on the basis of current values.

Fresh Butter Steady  
Fresh butter was quoted at least steady but was still affected by storage, whereas butter usually supplied with fresh churning.

Butterfat was unchanged. Market for eggs was holding about steady with some strength in spots of top notch goods. Storage stuff was alone easy with especially slow trade in undergrades which were being pushed by outsiders.

Conditions within the live hen market were about steady and practically unchanged as to price for the day. Springer stuff continued its recent weakness.

Potato Values Weaker  
Determination of brokerage interests to control the potato trade here has again resulted in weakening of values with some lower spots noted even for Deschutes which were as yet only in small supply locally.

With recently sharp abating of livestock prices together with importations of dressed pork from the inland Empire, country hog prices here were showing a slight reduction.

Market for country killed calves continued firm and at late price advances while lambs were fully steady and top moving 9-10½ lbs. generally. Ewes were weak especially the junk.

Union Market Quiet  
Union market was a quiet affair locally. So slow were offerings from Yakima that much of the recent trade in Oregon stock beef was being taken in preference to locals on account of the lower price. Practically all the Pacific markets have been grabbed by the eastern berries.

Better movement of both table and juice grapes.  
Cashflower sales in carload lots increasing at late prices.  
Limited demand for buckles-berries.  
Celery demand from the southwest was gaining but sales were still mostly \$1 job cars.  
Cheernuts were being offered around 30 lb.

## LOS ANGELES SPUD MARKET HOLDS STEADY

(Federal quotations from Oregon State College, released through the county agent)

Potato shipments yesterday totaled 720 cars. Oregon supplied 12, Washington 18, Idaho 108. Total loadings for the season amounted to \$2,678 cars which compared with 76,557 cars during the corresponding period last year.

At Presque Isle the market was about steady with No. 1 Green Mountains bringing most \$1.10 a hundred, sacked, in carloads job, shipping point.

The Idaho Falls market was dull. No. 1 Russets brought mostly 70 to 75 cents a hundred, sacked, in carloads job, cash track.

In the Twin Falls-Burley district demand and trading were light and the market slightly weaker.

At Yakima demand was light and the market slightly weaker. No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$20 a ton, sacked, in carloads job, for cash track.

The terminal market at Chicago was barely steady. Demand and trading were slow and supplies heavy. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought \$1.50 to \$1.55 a hundred, sacked, track sales carlots outright.

At Fort Worth the market was reported steady.

The market at Los Angeles was about steady. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought \$1.35 to \$1.30 a hundred, sacked, brokers sales.

The San Francisco market was weak. Sales were too few to establish reliable quotations.
