

The Pupil Meets The Teacher

Howard Hobson and Billy Reinhart Oppose Each Other in New Roles. Hobson's Training Under Oregon Coach Recalled. Strength of Freshman Team Unlimited. A message to Hunters.

Strange things will happen. On October 23 a young man who traces the responsibility for his coaching ability to a former instructor will bring a football team to Modoc field hopeful and confident it will upset this one-time teacher.

It will be a contest between Howard Hobson, the pupil, and William J. Reinhart, the instructor.

Hobson, exceedingly successful coach at Oregon Normal school, played football, basketball and baseball under Reinhart, head coach of Oregon Freshman team. And what Hobson learned in those days at Eugene, he will turn against Billy's Frosh on Modoc field.

Hobson, more thoroughly known as a basketball and baseball star than a football player, was a ball carrier on the Oregon Freshman team in about 1922. Bas Williams was coaching the squad then and Reinhart was backfield mentor for the varsity.

At the close of the season Hobson turned out for the Web-foot basketball team and Reinhart, his first real contact with football, the man who has led Oregon to keep titles.

Hobson made the team and eventually became an all-Pacific coast player.

Again in baseball Hobson played for Reinhart. The Ashland coach was one of the finest infielders and had more than one opportunity to enter the Pacific Coast league as a rookie.

Hobson and Reinhart didn't meet in football until 1925. Reinhart had persuaded him to concentrate his athletic talents on basketball and baseball, but Hobson wanted one try at varsity competition on the gridiron before he graduated.

He was selected on the first squad and won the game at Portland and was out for the remainder of the season.

Reinhart respected Hobson as an athlete; he respects him as a coach. It will be interesting to observe the pupil and the teacher when they meet on the field when the Frosh and the Frosh clash.

Hobson looks forward to his game with Oregon State Froshes Friday afternoon as a means of estimating the Frosh team's strength. The Frosh lost the Webfoot Yearlings, 7 to 5, and unless the Frosh can win by a larger score, Hobson will consider his team the underdog for the Klamath battle.

The Oregon Freshmen have been gathered from all parts of the Pacific coast and more than one candidate has come from as far as the middle west and the Atlantic seaboard with the hope of eventually becoming a Web-foot varsity man.

At Eugene it is common knowledge the Freshmen have more and better material than has been seen since Hayward field for many seasons. There's at least half a dozen of them ready to step into the varsity without further training.

Pointing out the tremendous annual waste in ducks and geese crippled or killed during the open shooting season and never recovered, W. C. Henderson, associate chief of the Bureau of Biological Survey, U. S. Department of Agriculture, in a statement issued October 14 on behalf of both the advisory board, migratory bird treaty act and the bureau urged American sportsmen to unite in a campaign to reduce these losses.

The statement follows: "Authorities estimate that for every two ducks killed and brought to bag, at least one bird is crippled and probably lost. This becomes appalling when it is realized that probably 15,000,000 ducks are counted into the bags of American gunners each season. It means that at least 7,500,000 birds are crippled and lost. They are not included in the gunner's bag and they are not included in the numbers of birds that return north to rear young. In such cases the young of breeding birds is thus seriously decreased without any resulting benefit, except to the creatures that prey on the unfortunate cripples.

"The picture is not a pleasant one. However, most of this inhumane and wasteful crippling can be prevented if gunners will refrain from shooting at birds at long range, and from using shotguns of a gauge too small to be effective. 'Flock shooting,' the indiscriminate firing into a flock of birds in the air or on the water, is a prolific source of crippling and is properly regarded with disgust by experienced sportsmen.

"Every gunner should make conscientious efforts to recover his wounded birds. Those acquainted with the wildfowl situation are genuinely concerned over the relative scarcity of these birds, caused by over-shooting and by a series of disastrous breeding seasons due to long-

Howard Hobson, coach of the normal school team, and Dr. Walter Redford, president of the school, came over from Ashland Tuesday to attend the banquet. Hobson said his team was growing stronger each day, and expected the team to be at the peak for the Klamath contest.

3,000 Expected

Dr. Redford expressed his appreciation for the interest and cooperation volunteered by the Junior chamber of commerce.

Tom Cunningham, secretary of the Ashland chamber of commerce, and former resident of Klamath Falls, was another guest. Cunningham said he was confident 3,000 persons would see the Frosh meet the Sons.

Paul T. Jackson, principal of the Klamath Union high school, said the Pelican band would be glad to offer its services for pre-game parades and stunts on the field. Another band from the normal school will also be here. A special section will be reserved for high school students.

continued droughts. Every sign plainly indicates that the future of the sport of duck shooting depends entirely upon our ability to protect now the diminishing supply of breeding birds. Federal and state conservation authorities are applying emergency measures by restricting open seasons and reducing bag limits. It is strange that, with these evidences before their eyes, so many gunners make only half-hearted efforts to find and retrieve their crippled game.

If, on the other hand, every gunner will do his utmost—will in fact make it the first rule of sportsmanship to recover his wounded birds—the number of breeding birds going north in spring will be larger by several millions than will be the case if this appeal is ignored.

"The supply of ducks is far too small to permit the least unnecessary wastage, and further restrictions on shooting privileges may be required unless every gunner does what he can to stop these pitiful losses. The least he can do is to adhere to sportsmanlike practices and save his own cripples."

AL KARASICK, HARRY DEMETRAL MEET FRIDAY FOR FIRST TIME

HUNTING

UNBEATEN GRID TEAMS TO PLAY

Fifteen Major Contests Lead Football Play Saturday.

By Herbert W. Barker (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Oct. 18. (AP)—Unbeaten teams collide in 15 major football engagements this week, and the crash of falling favorites will be heard from one coast to the other.

Out of the week's warfare will come the first general reduction in the number of contenders for sectional championships as well as a new and more accurate basis for calculating the comparative strength of most of the leaders.

Ohio Meets Michigan

The East offers seven of these duels of unbeaten teams, and the mid-West six, the other two being shared by the Southwest and the far West.

In the East the Princeton-Columbia, Penn-Dartmouth, Harvard-Holy Cross, Fordham-Boston college and Yale-Brown games all may have an important bearing on the race for sectional honors, while Carnegie Tech and Duquesne, in their tussles with Notre Dame and Detroit respectively, will be staking undefeated records against powerful sectional foes.

The middle Western slate yields to the East only in point of numbers. The clash of mighty Michigan and mighty Ohio state seems most important because of the strong possibility that the winner ultimately will be crowned champion of the Western conference.

Purdue vs. Chicago

The Big Ten hopes of Purdue and Chicago likewise hang on their meeting at Chicago, but this game will have to yield in point of general interest to the two big intersectional battles, involving Pitt and the Army, whose comprehensive schedules annually compete for national recognition.

Minnesota for a crack at Minnesota's Gophers, a powerful but unlucky outfit which so far has been tied twice, by Indiana and Purdue. Army, with its lightest and fastest team in years, tackles Bob Zupke's Illinois at Cleveland, with the outcome in doubt.

Completing the mid-West list of contests involving undefeated teams, Nebraska and Kansas State wage an important Big Six battle at Manhattan, Kan., while Kansas meets Tulsa, a power in the Oklahoma "Big Four," whose ranks have dwindled to three now that Phillips has abandoned football.

Oregon State's winning streak seems due for rude interruption in the forthcoming stand against Southern California's Trojans, while in the Southwest, Arkansas and Louisiana State will seek to ruin each other's record at Shreveport.

Newman, in five games with the New York Giants, has completed 17 passes in 35 attempts for a gain of 353 yards, while Herber, Green Bay star, has completed 27 in 57 for 371 yards. Friedman, now with the Brooklyn Dodgers, has a higher average than either of his rivals, completing nine out of 11 for a gain of 165 yards, but has played in only two games.

Paul Moss, former Purdue end, now with Pittsburgh, and Luke Johnson of the Chicago Bears, set the pace as pass receivers. Each has caught nine. Johnson for a gain of 153 yards and Moss for 143.

Great Yachting Race To Resume

NEW YORK, Oct. 18. (UP)—Yachting's greatest race, the international contest between Great Britain and the United States for America's cup, may be renewed in 1934 with T. O. M. Sopwith, English aircraft designer carrying on where Sir Thomas Lipton left off.

This became known Tuesday when the United Press received cable advice from London that Sopwith had filed formal challenge through the international yacht racing union.

At the same time Sopwith announced that he planned construction of a new yacht, Endeavor.

"Endeavor," he told the United Press, "will be constructed along the lines of the all steel yacht Velsheda. She will differ both in dimensions and other respects from Shamrock V."

Game Wardens Will Destroy Herd of Elk

BEND, Ore., Oct. 18. (AP)—Execution of the elk herd in the Ochoco national forest got under way today under direction of the state game commission. The animals are to be killed because of great damage they have been doing to farms in that region.

State Police Art Tuck and Iris Wells set out for the forest yesterday with orders to kill the animals, which were brought from the Wallows mountains a year ago last spring. The herd is believed to consist of only nine animals. The policemen said they expected to kill three of the elk within two days and to shoot the other six before the opening of the elk season in the far northwestern part of the state.

One bull elk in the Ochoco forest was killed early this year after it had attacked ranchers' children.

When the animals were introduced in the forest area, it was hoped they would be kept back into the isolated timber. Instead, they have selected the valley as their range.

The girl swam from the island to the mainland in 47 minutes. A flood tide created currents more difficult to master than usual. But Habe said: "I could jump in and swim right back."

Alcatraz was designated last week as a federal prison for hardened criminals such as George (Machine Gun) Kelly, kidnaper. It has been a military prison since the civil war. No prisoner has escaped by swimming.
