# National, Local Markets

## PULLET FIRSTS AFFECT TRADES ON EGG MARKET

PORTLAND, Oct. 18. (AP)—Sales of so-called pullet firsts were demoralizing the trade here except for the best goods. The demand for quality eggs remained favorable although the volume of business in these as compared with ordinary to poor stuff was very limited.

## No Change In Butter

Buying prices on fresh goods were showing a late advance at country points with decreasing supplies reflected.

No change was suggested in general butter market trading for the day on the open market.

Farmers were stationary on all scores with storage holders inclined to await federal purchases.

Rather good trading tone was suggested for live hogs of all weights but springer stuff was rather heavy and especially the white sort. No further change in the price list.

Demand for turkeys was about steady for dressed birds with general cash offers around 20-21c lb. for old and young No. 1 hens and up to 23c lb. for young toms of best quality and weight.

## Ewes Still Weak

Market was held easy on country killed hogs with most sales at the lower end of the price list. Lambs were in call but ewes remained weak. Beef was finding a better market for the canners.

There was much complication in the market situation. State officials now say there is no law prohibiting producers or others from refusing to move into but it is unlawful to move into other states unless graded.

Onion growers of Oregon were refusing to sell supplies except at prices higher than what wholesalers were moving Yakima stock into retail channels. There was a complete stoppage of buying therefore at local primary points.

## Pears Failure

Nothing but disaster was indicated locally for pears. Even at around 50c box for good stuff, unwrapped, it was impossible to move more than a small per cent of current offerings of popular fall varieties.

Notes of wholesale trading: Lemons were up 50c case again.

Florida grapefruit was fractionally lower.

Potato trade was quiet and inclined a trifle weak.

Tomato market was as low as 1c for undergrade with an extreme of 30c.

Celery shipments were small but undertone was steady. Most sales 1c crate.

Cauliflower shipments were heavy with 60-65c the general top P.O.B. cars.

## LATE ADVANCE BOOSTS WHEAT

CHICAGO, Oct. 18. (AP)—Despite New York stock market setbacks and notwithstanding unsettled settlement of foreign exchange rates, wheat prices advanced late today, with commission houses active buyers on dips.

Further purchasing of wheat for United States government account was reported in leading markets today, and the cash basis for hard winter grades were substantially advanced compared with December contracts. For the first time this season, immediate delivery wheat brought a better figure than December, 1/2 cent premium in contrast with 1 1/2 cents discount 24 hours previous.

Wheat closed strong, 2 1/2-3 cents above yesterday's finish. Corn 1-1 1/2 advanced, oats 1-1 1/2 up, provisions varying from 12 cents decline to 5 cents gain.

## KLAMATH SPUDS SELL AT \$1.25 IN BAY REGION

(Federal quotations from Oregon State college through the county agent.)

Potato shipments yesterday totaled 753 cars, Oregon supplied 10, Washington 28, and Idaho 119. Maine shipped 203 cars and Minnesota 97.

At Presque Isle, Maine, the shipping market was about steady. No. 1 Green Mountains brought mostly \$1.10 per hundred, sacked, in carloads f.o.b. shipping point.

The Idaho Falls market was steady. Harvesting is about complete, and growers are holding for higher prices. No. 1 Russets were quoted at 70c to 75c per hundred, sacked, in carloads f.o.b. cash track.

In the Twin Falls-Burley district demand was limited, and the market was about steady. No. 1 Caterpillar brought 70c to 75c per hundred, with some held higher. At Yakima demand was very slow and the market weak. No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$2.20 a ton in carloads f.o.b. cash track.

At Chicago trading was rather slow, but the market on Russets No. 1 Idaho Russets brought mostly \$1.50 to \$1.55 per hundred, sacked, track sales carlots outright.

The Fort Worth market was steady.

The Los Angeles market was about steady, with No. 1 Idaho Russets quoted at \$1.25 per hundred, sacked, brokers sales.

San Francisco the market was weak and unsettled. No. 1 Klamath Russets brought \$1.20 to \$1.25 per hundred, sacked, sales to jobbers, while No. 1 Washington Russets sold at \$1.15 to \$1.20, and No. 1 Idaho Russets \$1.15 to \$1.25 per hundred.
