Railroads Reduce Rates

IT WILL be interesting to watch the results of new and cheaper passenger rates on western railroads. The fares are to be cut from 3.6 cents a mile to three, with two cents a mile for round trips. The Pullman surcharge will probably be dropped before long.

We shall see whether through these lower fares, and continued improvement of service, the railroads can recapture their former dominance in the passenger transportation picture. An additional factor in their favor is the increased cost of gasoline, which runs the automobiles and the buses that took so much business away from the railroads.

Here in the west we are hopeful that lower fares on the railroads will result in increased tourist travel from the east. Railroad men say there should be heavier travel to the coast in the coming winter. Present and expected pick-up in railroad passenger business has resulted in rumors that the Great Northern will institute passenger service through Klamath Falls, over the Western Pacific line to San Francisco, next spring.

Speedier, more comfortable trains. Lower fares. Thus the railroads move to keep pace with changing times.

Jamboree Friday Night

ONCE each year the boys of Klamath Union high school and their dads get together at the high school building for what is quite properly called a jamboree. There is an infectious spirit of gay camaraderie about this affair that makes it one of the most important events in the year for father and son.

First, there is the gathering in the halls and school rooms. Somehow, here a new relationship springs up between the man and the boy. The scenes are familiar to the boy, and he for once becomes the pilot, pointing out places of interest, explaining the use of this room and that, introducing his father to other boys.

The boys stay close to their fathers, and as the men enter into conversation, they talk of things that will keep the youngsters in the picture. Football is a more favored topic than taxes.

Then comes the crowning event of any such evening for men and boys—the feed. It is served in the high school cafeteria, which is jammed with boys and their dads. And the chief thing that is done is to eat. There is little speech-making or formality. This is a jamboree.

After that the boys take their dads to the auditorium, where the platform, as they take pride in pointing out, becomes at times a gymnasium floor. There are boxing and wrestling events to witness here. Usually, in addition to the amateurs, professionals put on an exhibition such as seldom is seen by many of the men.

Here, that relationship of equality, that must mean much to the boy's heart, is in evidence again. The boy always knows more about boxing and wrestling than his dad.

And so it goes, a happy, carefree, comradely affair. But more of the same spirit, the same relationship between father and son would go far in solving some of our most serious problems.

them to go ahead and tax themselves into semi-bankruptcy in order to build up a great armament, they will think so much about that that they WILL THINK LESS of their own internal troubles that are due to Hitler.

If he can then add a war scare, he may be able to give them so much to think about that they will FORGET their internal troubles and get behind him as the national leader whose job it is to repel the possible invader.

GIVING the people—the cannon fodder—a war to think about in order to take their minds off their own internal governmental troubles is an ancient and time-tried device in Europe. It has worked so many hundreds of times in the past that Hitler is justified in believing that it will work again.

THESE, of course, are only guesses. This may be wide of the mark.

But don't forget this: Hitler's big task is to KEEP HIS JOB. Many a ruler in Europe in the past has kept his job by starting a war.

Europe is inclined to do again what it has done before.

IF THE war should come, largely as a result of the reasons here guessed at, will this country get into it?

It is this writer's judgment that this country couldn't be prodded into another European war with pitchforks. We got our fingers too badly burned the last time.

It is certainly this writer's modest and unimportant judgment that this country HAS NO BUSINESS to get into another European war. The thing for us

The Inside Story From The Capital

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19

Economic advisers to the president are running around tearing their hair about the monetary rumors in current circulation. The latest one is that the president considers devaluation absurd and will probably issue currency in a restrained inflationary way.

Treasury officials swooned on muzzles like the Russian ballet in the march of the wooden soldier when they heard that one. At first they feared some monetary crank had reached the presidential ear and then circulated the story. Then they thought the idea behind it was to create confusion and heighten public interest in what the president may ultimately do.

PLAN

Their feet-on-the-ground view of the monetary situation is as simple as A B C.

Only two courses are known to have been seriously recommended to the president. Unless he is getting secret advice from a ouija board.

The first course is that he do nothing except issue a statement. In this statement he could say the value of the dollar today is indeterminate. It has not yet found its natural level. Too many speculative influences are at work on it.

He could say that next year sometime, when the dollar finds its natural level, he will reorganize the monetary system. But never would he do anything to debase the currency of the country.

That would be fine—if Congress were not convening in January.

BACKGROUND

Anyone who knows anything about the existing Washington situation will realize Congress cannot be expected to go along with a sane policy like that. It has a majority for inflation, swift, wild inflation, any kind. It cannot be put off much longer, even by Mr. Roosevelt. It can be expected to force his hand at the first opportunity.

Therefore Mr. Roosevelt must consider the existing political situation in his currency policy. Not only must he promise a currency stability which will dispel existing financial uncertainty. He must also do something to prevent the wolves in Congress from taking the situation out of his hands.

A statement clearing up existing doubts is all he needs to prevent creeping paralysis of the capital market, but it would leave him a continuous battle with the inflationists.

He may decide on that course, but his best friends doubt it.

ALTERNATIVE

The only other alternative is to make a stab now at what would be a good value for the dollar and devalue to that point before January 3.

Today the stab would probably hit 66 cents. Last week it would have been 63 cents. No one can tell what it will be next week. That is only of secondary importance. If you are going to make a stab in the dark and you know it will be somewhere between 63 and 70, it does not make much real difference exactly which point you hit.

Mr. Roosevelt is not anxious to make this stab. The main reason for his shyness is doubt about what it will do to commodity prices. Most economists believe it will remove whatever speculative hope is left in the commodity markets.

But it would also remove currency uncertainty and permit normal progress in business.

The big thing is that it would take the matter out of the hands of Congress before the wolves can assemble.

METHODS

The best inside monetary experts are advising against the devaluation process suggested by the committee for the nation. That committee wants the president to depreciate the price of gold instead of reducing the number of gold grains in the dollar. The two steps are inter-related to a great extent, but the natural way to proceed would be through direct dollar action.
