

3 Undeclared Teams Play Here

Klamath, Sons and Frosh Enter Modoc Field "Tournament" With Excellent Records. Medford Only Squad to Meet Reversal. Preparations Made for Huge Football Crowds.

Three of the four teams entering what looks very much like a football tournament on Modoc field next Friday and Saturday will be undefeated. And it's a rare thing for any city to watch unbeaten schools in action.

Medford, long the dominating team in southern Oregon, will come to Klamath Falls Friday with a record book smothered by a pertinent little school from Northern California. Crescent City, doing something it had never done before, upset these arrogant Tigers last week, 7 to 0.

Medford was destined to go against the Marshfield Pirates Saturday, but at this writing the result of the contest was unknown.

An already beaten Medford team doesn't mean a thing to the Klamath Pelicans, who have tasted more than their share of defeat from the Tigers. Very quietly, but very seriously, Les Avritt and Al Sinclair, coaches, have been preparing the Pelicans to wipe out the years—almost endless years—of Medford victories.

Klamath has had three regular contests this year with the following results:

Klamath Falls 13, Weed 9.
Klamath Falls 27, Astoria 9.
Klamath Falls 0, Corvallis 9.

You will observe that the Pelicans have progressed through three contests without having their goal defense penetrated. It speaks well for their defensive ability.

The week game failed to bring out any offensive punch and both touchdowns were scored on Weed mistakes. The power to score was a little more definite against Astoria but its strength was a little belittled by the weakness of the Astoria eleven.

Against Corvallis, the Pelicans had no offensive but a strong defensive. They managed to work into scoring territory upon two occasions, but only to be held without gain.

Now strong the development of an attack through the last few idle weeks? That probably will be the essential factor of a victory over Medford.

The second undefeated team will be the University of Oregon Freshmen. The Freshmen, described as the strongest group of Yearlings in the Webfoot coaching staff has gathered in several seasons, busted the Oregon State Rooks in their opening contest, 7 to 3.

That has been the only game of the year thus far. The Ashland contest here and a return game with the Rooks will complete the 1933 Yearling schedule.

Billy Reinhardt, head coach of the Frosh, and Al Schultz, former captain of the Webfoot variety and all-conference guard, possess some of the players who will march up to the varsity next season.

This, perhaps, will be Klamath Falls' only personal observation of the men who will be playing in the Pacific coast conference next season.

The best has been reserved for the last. This is young Howard Hobson's team from Ashland. This ambitious coach, almost a year corner in the Oregon coaching fraternity, has assembled one of the finest teams in the history of Oregon normal school football.

The Sons crashed through the Oregon State varsity for three quarters and then wilted only in the final period to lose, 21 to 9.



OREGON TAKES IDAHO, 19-0

Webfoots Score Conference Victory in Night Game At Eugene.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 21. (AP)—University of Oregon defeated Idaho 19 to 0 on Hayward field here last night. Oregon's charging line, coupled with the Temple-Mikulak-Gee backfield combination, which functioned so dramatically at Seattle a week ago was too much for the Vandals.

Reverses, cut-backs and off-tackle plays featured the Oregon attack for the three touchdowns, scored in the first, second and fourth quarters.

Vandal Passes Threatened Idaho's passing attack, from spread formation, furnished the only spectacular plays of the game, but failure to penetrate Oregon's forward wall made these offenses short-lived. Alert Oregon backs frequently intercepted the bullet-like passes to turn inspired rallies by Willis Smith, Jacoby and Geraghty to no avail.

In the first period an off-side penalty gave Oregon a first down on the Idaho 17 after Temple had returned Idaho's punt to the 37 yard line and the Webfoots had bucked through Idaho's light line for 15 yards.

A delayed reverse, with Temple carrying the ball, advanced Oregon to the two-line where Temple took the ball again to go over for the first score. Mikulak's place kick for the extra point was wide.

Morse Blocks Kick Hardly had the second period opened when "Bitch" Morse, Oregon end, blocked an Idaho kick on the Vandals' 13, and Pozzo, the other Webfoot end, caught the ball on the fly and returned it to the Idaho six. On the first play Mikulak, Oregon's star fullback, ran through guard a delayed back for the second touchdown. Temple's place kick for extra point was wide.

In the final period, after Idaho had kept the play mostly in midfield throughout the third quarter, Bobbitt carried the ball over from the Idaho 16 for the final touchdown. Milligan, replacing Temple at half, place kicked the extra point.

The Vandal passing attack in the second half, a treat to the spectators, was not sustained by follow-up plays and the Oregon goal was never seriously threatened.

Idaho made three first downs from passes, but only one from scrimmage, while Oregon tallied fourteen first downs from scrimmage and one by penalty.

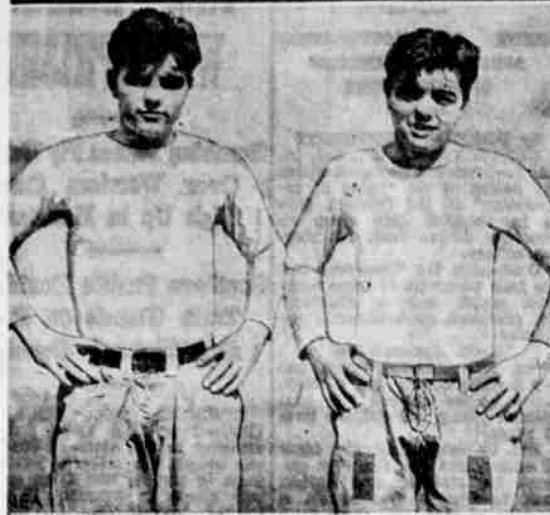
Bend Lava Bears Trim The Dalles

It was a complete reversal of the dope, as The Dalles, victors over Astoria, Benson and La Grande, had been regarded by many as at least three touchdowns better than the local eleven. The Dalles had been mentioned generally as the potential state champion.

The Dalles scored in the first period but from then on never threatened the Bend goal. At half time the Bend score was Bend 13; The Dalles 6. Long passes, one good for 45 yards, and a 75-yard run enabled Bend to score its three touchdowns.

Sons Smother Beaver Rooks; McAninch Stars

CORVALLIS, Oct. 21. (AP)—Smashing the Rooks with everything in the book of football strategy, Southern Oregon Normal of Ashland completely overran the Oregon State Rooks here Friday to the tune of a 39 to 0 score.

The Sons from Ashland scored in every period of the game. Only in rare flashes of defensive power were the Rooks able to offer resistance. Never did they offer a serious threat to score. They came no closer to the Son's goal than the 20-yard line and there one of their passes was intercepted.

At the kickoff opening the second half, Rasmussen, Normal back, raced 65 yards to a touchdown. McAninch, sub halfback, scored on another spectacular run for 35 yards on an intercepted pass in the last period.

Warner's Team Beats Virginia At Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 21. (UP)—The West Virginia Mountaineers went down to their fifth successive defeat when they lost to Temple University 13-7 at the Owl stadium.

After a scoreless first half, both teams opened their offensive attack. Temple was the first to score on a pass from Stonik to Watts for 27 yards in the third period. Soon the Mountaineers tied the score on a passing play.

The Owls, however, started a steady drive in the final period and Stonik plowed through tackle for the victory.

About 15,000 persons saw the game.

Salem Preppers Defeat Albany

SALEM, Oct. 21. (AP)—Jimmy Nicholson scored from the seven-yard line and with a 30-yard jump placed the ball on the three-yard line where a teammate scored. He ran 39 and 55 yards on his two third quarter touchdown jaunts.

Albany drove to the five-yard line in the first quarter, but an intercepted pass again halted its threat.

KLAMATH READY FOR GRID WEEK

Two Major Games Set for Modoc Field Friday, Saturday.

"Football week" will be celebrated in Klamath Falls next Friday and Saturday with the two major contests of the season.

Friday the leading teams of the Southern Oregon Inter-scholastic conference, Klamath Union high school and Medford high school, will clash on Modoc field.

First "Big Game." "Football eleven," the University of Oregon Freshmen and the Southern Oregon Normal school, will bring Klamath Falls its first football game beyond the inter-scholastic division.

Medford and the Klamath Pelicans, enemies of ancient tradition, meet on Modoc field for the first time since 1931 when the Tigers crashed to a one-touchdown victory. It was the first year Leslie Avritt, head coach, had developed a Klamath team. The Tigers won again last year but the odds have been considered fair this season for a Klamath victory.

The Pelicans, without competition since the Corvallis game, will be physically fit for the Tigers. Barring unexpected practice injuries, the full strength of the regular eleven will be available.

Hobson Men Favored. Howard Hobson's Normal school team stands out as a distinct favorite to defeat the Freshmen. The Ashland eleven has been made up of some of the outstanding inter-scholastic players in Oregon, a number of junior college transfers and one or two men who have been service in the Pacific coast conference.

Neither the Frosh nor the Sons have been defeated this season. The Sons' fourth quarter defeat from the Oregon State varsity has not been counted against its standing inasmuch as the difference in the size of the two schools was recognized before the game.

Chamber Active. The junior chamber of commerce will campaign this week to reach the 3,000 attendance mark set for the Son-Frosh contest. Tickets have been placed on sale in conspicuous downtown positions.

Each member of the chamber has volunteered his services as a ticket seller.

Monmouth Victor Over St. Martin

MONMOUTH, Ore., Oct. 21. (AP)—Completely bewildered by the variety of the Oregon normal play, the football team of St. Martin's of Lacey, Wash., went down to a 28 to 0 defeat here Friday as Coach Larry Wolfe's spectacular normal school team added another victory to its string.

A brilliant running and passing attack was displayed by the teachers and two aerial shots went for touchdowns. A 70-yard run by Edwards, halfback, bringing the ball to the St. Martin's six-yard line, was one of the big thrills of the game. The teachers easily pushed the ball over the line.

The half-time score was 20 to 0. In the third the Normal team got another touchdown, and a safety was added to the last period.

Columbia Irish Trim Bearcats Friday, 13 to 0

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 21. (AP)—A 56-yard return of a punt for a touchdown and a 35-yard pass for another score gave Columbia University a 13 to 0 victory over "Williamette" University in their football game here yesterday.

The Irish scored first in the opening period when Muri Nehl quick-kicked from his own 30. The punt caught Williamette off balance and the ball soared down the field and out of the Williamette end zone. Williamette punted to the Columbia 44, and Nehl, gathering in the ball, zig-zagged the entire distance, behind quick-forming interference, to score. In the third period Nehl intercepted a Williamette pass and returned it to the Bearcat 35. Phil McCarthy shot a quick pass to Phil Piskol, who dodged his way through three Williamette players to score. Corcoran place kicked the extra point after the first touchdown.

Ernie Maurer Beats Drouillard In East

A sudden demand for admission tickets developed today and led officials to predict a crowd of at least 50,000.

Paulino, who has been training here, did only a routine workout Friday and said, when it was over, that he wouldn't look at a glove until Sunday afternoon.

"Remember, I have never been knocked out in my entire career," Paulino said. "And if I can keep that record intact I hope to be able to win on points."

Carnera, meantime, finished his training at his home town of Sequela. He will fly here Saturday via Udine. Carnera "overjoyed" that he is "fighting before 11 Duce and my countrymen" is confident, he said, of winning, and maybe by a knockout—who knows.

COUGARS HOLD BEARS TO TIE

California Is Unable to Break Seven Year Winning Record

ROGERS FIELD, FULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 21. (UP)—The courageous Cougars of Washington State college kept a seven-year record intact of never having lost a game on their home field and tied California, 6 to 6, in a bitter football game this afternoon.

Coach Babe Hollingberry's rejuvenated team scored in the first period on a beautiful pass, Phil Barboe to Ted Christoffer. The big boy from Honolulu leaped in the air and caught the ball on California's five-yard line. It was easy for him to score. Mentor Dahlen was sent in to kick goal, but his attempt was low.

Bears Tie Score. The enraged Golden Bear fought savagely and in the second period tied the count after a power and passing drive into State's territory. Archie Williams crashed through from the one-yard line on the fourth down. The play was over right tackle.

Williams was set to kick the extra point but the pass from center was bad. Heedy, who was holding the ball, attempted to run but was downed on the three-yard line.

About 15,000 fans saw the Cougars come within inches of scoring again in the final period but the stubborn California line halted their bid for a second touchdown.

Punt Is Blocked. The deadly forward passing attack of the Cougars constantly had the Bears defensive bewildered.

It lead up to and counted the first score added by a double shift which caught California offside.

In the fourth period Brett, Cougar reserve end, blocked a California punt, caught it and was finally downed on the one-yard line, but the Bears piled up the attack as they did a previous time on their own four-yard line.

The closeness of the game was evident from the statistics. Washington State gained 199 yards from scrimmage to a total of 102 yards for California. State, however, gained 100 yards on passes, completing seven out of 16 tries. The Bears completed four out of nine for a total of 53 yards. California made eight first downs and the Cougars nine.

GEORGIA WINS, 13 to 12. MACON, Ga., Oct. 21. (UP)—Georgia won a close 13-12 victory over Mercer here after being outplayed for most of the game.
