AUSTRIANS HOLD GERMAN PRINCE

VIENNA, Oct. 21. (AP)—The German Prince Bernhard von Sachsen-Meiningen and his wife, Princess Margot, were arrested in Carinthia today in connection with an alleged Nazi conspiracy. The arrest was occasioned by the prince carrying a Nazi flag on an automobile, he drove through the streets of Klagenfurt yesterday.

National, Local Markets

POULTRY MART SHOWS WEAKER TREND TODAY

PORTLAND, Oct. 21. (AP)—Lack of suitable outlet for the increasing surpluses of chickens, forced another period of weakness and even some shading of prices in the trade. For the weekend the produce exchange quoted almost general losses with the exception of colored hens which were fractionally better.

The market shows its chief depression in springer stuff, which was out of line with normal conditions considering the season. Light hens appear steady and a trifle scarce, but heavy stuff was scarce. This showed the advance of 1 cent on the exchange for the week-end.

Sacrifices Made
Storage stocks of springer stuff was so heavy that sacrifice sales have recently been made by some interests to force some outward movement.

Trading in the butter market was staid here but more mental than actual betterment in the call. However, during recent days there has been a noticeable desire to buy that was lacking a week ago.

Full steadiness was reflected in the market for eggs here, at least for the fresh stock. Much of the storage goods was being moved east but some outsiders were still flooding the local market at various prices.

Calves Hold Firm
Market for country killed calves was holding firm along the wholesale way with prices unchanged but generally at the high point. Lambs were steady to strong while hogs were just about holding. Beef was steady.

Such nominal trading was reported for peaches here mostly 50c box, that quotations were no longer of general interest. Stocks in storage were said to be rather fair and were expected to result in heavy loss to storers.

Weather conditions were favoring the sale of carload lots of wool, but the territory east of the Rockies, but general toward the gulf. Sales were chiefly 1.05-1.10 rates.

Very good shipping movement of cauliflower was reported in carload lots out of various immediate Portland sections. Sales were chiefly around 55c crate for 1's F.O.B. with a few higher or lower.

FEDERAL BUYING INFLUENCES WHEAT

CHICAGO, Oct. 21. (AP)—Renewal of government buying of wheat late today helped to overcome the effects of stock market weakness, and left grain prices eventually with moderate gains.

Although confirmation was lacking, reports persisted that the Washington administration was considering plans for making loans on wheat and corn similar to those accorded cotton growers. The department of agriculture estimated the world wheat crop this year would be approximately 200,000,000 bushels less than was the case last year.

Wheat closed unsettled, 3c-4c above yesterday's finish, corn 5c to 1c advanced, oats 3c-12c up, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 15 cents.

BOSTON, Oct. 21. (AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Trading in wool during the past week has continued quiet but quotations on greasy combing domestic hogs have been firmly maintained within selling price ranges realized earlier this month. Occasional transactions were closed during the past week on medium fleeces and the finer grades of territory and other western grown wools, but individual sales involved only small quantities.
