## CLUE TO MISSING JUDGE EVAPORATED

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 23. (AP)—C. C. Proebstel, Umatilla county district attorney, said here today he was convinced that the body of an unidentified man found in Vancouver, Wash., was not that of Charles Marsh, former Umatilla county judge, who disappeared mysteriously a year ago.

Proebstel went to Vancouver to investigate the case after he had been advised that the unidentified body was recovered about the time Judge Marsh disappeared. He said, however, the man bore no resemblance to Marsh and that it appeared the man was dead before Marsh disappeared.

Marsh dropped from sight a year ago while driving from Portland to Pendleton.

# National, Local Markets

## FEDERAL AID CHIEF FACTOR FOR MARKET

PORTLAND, Oct. 23. (AP)—Aid of the government which was believed soon to be generally available, appeared the chief factor in retaining current cheese values.

Cheese stocks everywhere were fairly in excess of a year ago and especially in the western trade.

Tillamook was without price change for the last week as was Coss Bay.

Undertone in the butter trade was generally receiving aid by the expectation of heavy buying of surplus offerings by the government. The late advance by the exchange to take care of this was being maintained.

Eggs Steady.

General steadiness was continued in market for fresh eggs, and especially top quality. Demand was taking care of offerings but so-called fresh goods—partly fresh and partly storage—was showing a badly mixed price spread.

Over Sunday there was no change in general live chicken demand, particularly locally. Hens were in good call and pressure against springer stuff was not so acute as a week ago.

Generally good trading tone was suggested in practically all lines of country killed meats.

Cleanup of last week's offerings was almost general and this proved an aid to early Monday marketing.

Very scant supplies of fresh halibut were entering the trade and sharply higher prices were reported in the north as a result.

Greater supplies of fresh crabs were arriving from the coast. Prices are down slightly as a result.

Minneapolis has been added to the list of eastern points purchasing supplies of carlots of Oregon cauliflower. Prices appeared practically unchanged but the movement was rather fair.

Celery shipments were of fair volume but it appeared the top price available.

Sales of apples were increasing with a firmer tone locally.

Potatoes were firm at Yakima but Yakima stock was weak here.

Onion market was still lifeless for Oregon with little offering. Yakimas were steady. Crabs were the smallest for some years.

Mushrooms were scarce.

Small melons were lower.

## 15 CARLOADS OF POTATOES LEAVE OREGON

(Federal potato quotations from Oregon State College through the County Agency.)

Potato shipments Saturday and Sunday totaled 911 cars. Oregon shipped 15, Washington 24, and Idaho 142. Maine shipped 269 cars and Minnesota 123.

At Presque Isle the market was about steady. No. 1 Green Mountains brought mostly \$1.20 a hundred, sacked, in carloads for shipping point.

The Idaho Falls market was firm with No. 1 Russets bringing 75c to 80c a hundred in carloads for cash trade.

In the Twin Falls Burley district the market was slightly stronger due to a good demand. No. 1 Russets sold at 75c to 80c a hundred, sacked, in carload for cash trade.

At Yakima demand was very slow and the market dull. Best No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$20 a ton in carloads for cash trade.

At Chicago supplies were heavy. Arrivals today totaling 229 cars included one from Oregon. Demand and trading were moderate and the market about steady. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought most \$1.55 to \$1.65 a hundred, sacked, track sales carlots outright.

At Port Worth demand was light and the market about steady.

The San Francisco market was steady. Supplies were liberal with demand improved. U. S. No. 1 Washington Russets brought \$1.15 to \$1.25 a hundred, sacked. Sales to jobbers.

At Los Angeles the market for Russets was stronger. No. 1 Idaho stock sold at \$1.25 to \$1.40 a hundred, sacked, brokers sales.

## F. D. R.'S ADDRESS INFLUENCES WHEAT

CHICAGO, Oct. 23. (AP)—President Roosevelt's address to the nation made wheat prices go soaring today, reaching a point 1 1/2c above last week's low. The bottom-most point this season.

An outstanding feature was notable scarcity of wheat offerings. Aside from the president's announcement of a policy of higher prices for farm products, much notice was also taken of his free gold market plan, which leading experts here construed as likely to accomplish in a gradual manner the same effects as a devaluation of the dollar.

Wheat closed strong, 3 1/4-4 1/2c above Saturday's finish, corn and oats both 2 1/2-3 cents up, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 25 cents.
