

Sons, Medford Favored

Records and Traditions Point to Winners of Klamath Football Tournament. Web-foot Publicity Man Has High Praise for Oregon Freshmen. Next Year's Varsity Will Play On Modoc Field.

The traditions backing up one contest and facts assembled behind another, leave little room for the selection of winners in Klamath Falls' football tournament this week. The traditions between Klamath and Medford high schools—without considering the playing records for this season—point to an indisputable Tiger victory on Modoc field Friday afternoon. Some say the Pelicans once defeated Medford; others say never. Everyone, however, is pretty well convinced the record of competition is a bit too unfortunate to stand up under repetition. Medford will be a favorite Friday. Klamath's story of four victories and no defeats this season and a goal line not yet crossed looks excellent on paper. Weed and Alturas were not opposition of particularly outstanding caliber. Corvallis already had been defeated when it came to Klamath Falls for the scoreless tie and the Klamath Townies weren't in the best of shape for last Saturday's game. Saturday Medford wiped out the undefeated Marshfield Pirates. That alone was almost sufficient to place the Tigers in a stronger classification than the Pelicans.

It is much less difficult to point to a winner in the Southern Oregon Normal-University of Oregon freshman game here Saturday. The Normal school will win, past performances indicate very strongly. The Sons held the Oregon state varsity scoreless until the fourth period, they defeated Pacific and Oregon Normal at Monmouth and blasted the hopes of the Beaver rocks with a top heavy score. The yearlings have a 7 to 3 victory over the Oregon youngsters. They do have, however, a coach by the name of Billy Reinhart whose habit it is to upset the best of "dope."

Bruce Hamby, assistant director of football publicity at the university, has worked himself up to all kinds of enthusiasm over the freshmen. He predicts at least a half dozen of these boys will be on the Oregon varsity next season. "The original turnout of 84 men has dwindled greatly and right now there are only about 40 men out," Hamby writes. "Billy Reinhart gave them some tough work at the start of the season and a lot of them couldn't take it." One of the two boys from the east didn't pan out so well in western company and is playing third string fullback. The other is second string guard.

"Mike Delmonico, 195, of Pennsylvania is the fullback and John Augustus, 180, of New Jersey is the guard. Augustus is a little fellow, about 5 feet 8 inches tall, but has more power in his arms and legs than anyone I've ever seen. His father is an instructor in gymnastics back there and the boy can pick up 100 pound weights with one finger. "The stars of the team are Dick Bishop, former Eugene high player, at fullback; Joe Murray, the outstanding high school player of Seattle last year, end; Alan Wilson, Spokane, a brother of the famous Billy Wilson of Gonzaga and son of a famous Oregon player, end; and John Farrar, ex-San Francisco all-star center."

"Bishop is the class of the backfield. He weighs around 195 pounds and can kick and pass well. With Mikulak, Bob Pitt and Rushlow all graduating this year, Bishop looks right now to be the 1934 fullback. He hits the line hard and is improving as a line bucker. "Both Murray and Wilson are good pass receivers. Both can play excellent defensive football, too. Murray, along with Farrar, is the outstanding line man on Reinhart's team. "Farrar, 180, is considered a good prospect for next year's varsity to take a little higher place. He has a lot of fire and is a great defensive player."

Hamby places much credit for the strength of the freshman team with Irv Schulz, former captain and guard on the Oregon varsity. Schulz has handled the squad directly all season while Reinhart has been off the campus much of the time through his scouting duties. Howard Cantonwine, the huge grappler who meets Bob Kruse here Friday, would like to forget about wrestling and spend his days hunting ducks in the Klamath country. That's his hobby and he soon as he gets through with the farmer he has a trip on the Upper Lake all mapped out.

KLAMATH NEARS TOP CONDITION

Chester Jones, Half, On Sidelines With Bad Shoulder.

The serious task of preparing a football team physically and mentally for its major game of the season was in progress at Modoc field this week. The Klamath Pelicans, undefeated and unscored upon, were rapidly approaching top form for their Modoc game here Friday afternoon. Chester Jones, half carrying back, was temporarily out of the first string with an injury. Coaches, trainers and managers were at work rubbing out the soreness of an injured shoulder, but Les Avritt, head coach, expressed some doubts whether this star man could compete against the Tigers.

Short Handicapped
Jones received the injury last Saturday as he aided his pelican teammates in a 20 to 0 victory over the Klamath Townies. This is his last year with the squad. With the exception of Jones, all other players were expected to be in condition. Jerry Short, reserve end and punting specialist, was slightly handicapped by tonsillitis, but his ailment was not regarded as sufficient to keep him out of the game.

Al Sinclair, assistant coach, scouted the Tigers in their victory over Marshfield Saturday. He returned to Klamath Falls Sunday with the news the Modoc combination was "just as strong as ever."

Defense Platted
Sinclair will coach a reserve team and probably the Wilsons on Modoc formations this week, and bring them to Modoc field for scrimmage against the regulars. The majority of the time remaining before the contest will be spent in constructing a defense to halt the champions of Southern Oregon.

Fourteen Pelicans, many of them lettermen, will see their struggles against Modoc Friday. These players have been key men on the Klamath team for three years, and their departures will leave tremendous holes for next season. Those who will battle the Tigers for the last time will be: Norman Tabor, fullback; Nello Giovanni, tackle; Mayfield, center; Reynolds, guard; Homer Maxwell, guard; Van Emon, guard; Billy Horn, end; Lynn Phoebe, end; Jerry Short, end; Eugene Barrows, quarterback; Chester Jones, halfback; Perry halfback, and Wilfred Shulmire, fullback.

ELGAN RETIRING AS DISTRICT RANGER
ROCK CREEK—Announcement was made this week by Hugh B. Rankin, Medford, forest supervisor of the Rogue national forest, of the application for retirement made recently by Jesse C. G. Elgan, for a number of years forest ranger of the Klamath district.

Mr. Elgan, who has served for nearly fifteen years as a member of the forestry service, suffered severe injuries to his back a number of years ago and in consequence finds the duties of his office too strenuous.

Beginning his service in Utah, Elgan also served in the Sawtooth district of Idaho before coming to Oregon to be employed by the Fremont national forest, later being transferred to the Rogue River national forest. During his service, Elgan has manifested a keen interest in all branches of the service and it is with regret that his resignation will be accepted. No arrangements have as yet been made to fill the vacancy made by his retirement, Rankin stated. For the present the position will be filled by Hugh Ritter, Medford, ranger of the Dead Indian district, who it is expected will reside in Klamath Falls during the coming winter. Elgan, who resides in Klamath Falls with his family has made no announcement as to his plans for the future.
