NEW ROAD TO SKIRT EDGE OF MODOC LAVAS

ALTURAS, Calif.—Under the NIRA program, the forest service will build a road through the western edge of the Lava Beds national monument from the southwest corner of Tule lake to the old Bearpaw road near Gold-digger pass.

The road will pass through a section of the roughest of the Modoc lava beds and one which is replete with memories of the Modoc Indian War of 1872-73. It will form a short cut from the Tule lake section to the cave region of the Lava Beds National monument and in addition to tourist travel during the summer months will be heavily used by forest officers and stockmen during the winter season. About 25 men, under the supervision of Road Foreman Wm. R. McCrary, will be employed on the project during most of the winter months.

The forest service camp will be located almost on the exact site of the soldiers' camp of 1872-73 when for months a force of almost 500 troops, in addition to California and Oregon volunteers, battled the Modoc Indians under the leadership of their chief, Captain Jack. The new road will pass fairly close to the scene of the Thomas massacre where Capt. Evan Thomas, a brave officer of the early days of the west, was killed with a large proportion of his command, including three of his fellow officers.

Rude rock forts, the soldiers' cemetery in which almost 100 men were buried and other evidences of the campaign in which less than 100 warriors made their last stand against white troops in California and Oregon, still mark the section through which the new road passes.

The road will also traverse a region of interesting volcanic formation and in one place the survey passes near a group of 25 chimneys or fumaroles, some of which extend down into the earth to an almost unknown depth.

The new road will also provide an easy outlet for travel in the lava bed region to Klamath Falls and points in Tule lake valley.

MYRTLE CREEK MAN KILLED BY HUNTER

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 24, (AP)—C. W. Jones, 63, well known Myrtle Creek resident, died last night while on the way by ambulance from Tiller to the Roseburg hospital. Death resulted from a gunshot wound inflicted by Ronald Loffer, 19, of Tiller, who mistook Jones for a deer while hunting in the Hatch Creek district, a mile and a half southwest from Tiller in the extreme part of Douglas county.

Loffer is being held under technical arrest pending an indictment. Jones and Loffer were members of a hunting party which included the former's son-in-law, Frank West and Allan Gould of Myrtle Creek, and J. D. Loffer, father of Ronald, a resident of Tiller.

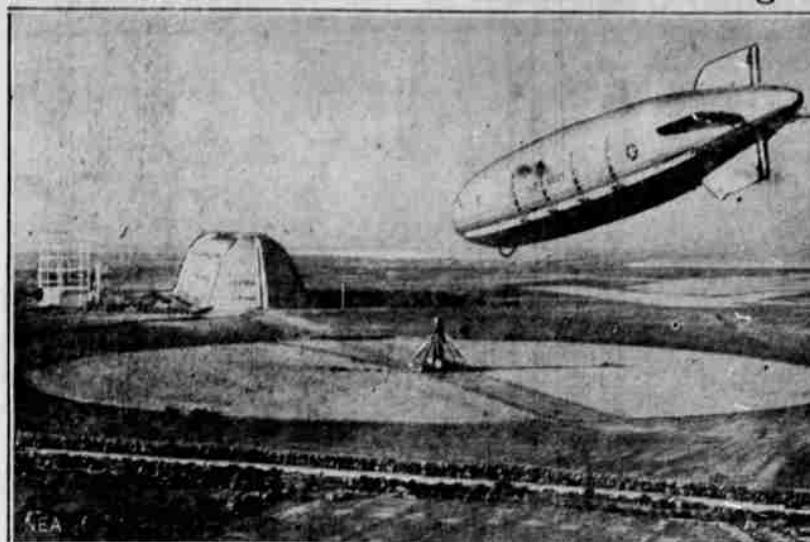
In foregoing any claim to alimony Mae Murray said she thought she was giving up something she felt she was rightfully entitled to but—

GOLD BUYING POLICY AIDS STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Oct. 24, (AP)—Stocks swung into a lively rally late in today's market as the dollar depreciated severely against European gold currencies. Gains of \$1 to more than \$4 were the rule for leading shares, though several issues, chiefly mining shares, showed larger gains.

Wall street appeared to have decided, after considerable hesitation, that the president's new plan for buying and selling gold as a means of price control had inflationary aspects, and there was a scramble to buy "equities." Commodities were less buoyant, wheat losing 1c to 1½¢ per bushel net.

BUYING PLAN READY
WASHINGTON, Oct. 24, (AP)—The first purchase of newly mined gold under President Roosevelt's move toward a managed currency will be made tomorrow.

Jesse Jones, chairman of the reconstruction corporation, Dean Acheson, acting secretary of the treasury, and probably Henry Morgenthau Jr., representing the president, will meet at the treasury at 9:30 a. m., or soon thereafter.

Higher Prices Expected
Through the treasury's regular facilities, foreign gold quotations at that time will be received and the price and amount of the first federal purchase decided upon.

President Roosevelt today conferred with the three officials.

It was said in high government quarters today that the price to be paid would be slightly above the world price level.

With President Roosevelt taking direct charge of preparations for putting his plans in operation, other officials clamped on the lid so far as comment and explanations of what is taking place were concerned.

Officials ordinarily accessible to newspapermen for comment of this kind declined to be interviewed.

GOLD PRICE UP
WASHINGTON, Oct. 24, (AP)—Today's treasury newly mined gold price was set at \$29.80 an ounce; 21 cents higher than yesterday's price.

Under the practice the treasury has been following for some time back, this price is based on the world price and has nothing to do with the Roosevelt government purchase plan, under which first purchases will be made tomorrow at a level above the world price.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 24, (AP)—The nation's gold producers began work today on the structure of a national association for the industry. Meeting here with the intention of organizing to work for common legislative and protective benefits, the operators were down to "brass tacks" discussing the terms of their proposed constitution by noon today.

Preceding the reception of the proposed constitution and bylaws the group heard several speakers outline the need for organization. Among them was Congressman Harry L. Englebright of Nevada City, Calif.

Englebright told the mining men he was certain President Roosevelt was well informed of the necessity of stimulating gold production—that the president had been surprised when Englebright informed him of the "decline in the country's supply of gold."
