

Few Teams Remain Undefeated

Davis Elkins leads list from East. Oregon only unbeaten, untied eleven on coast. Five goal lines uncrossed. Sons-Frosh starting time set at 2:15. Beavers get past Troy without a fumble.

It is a rare football team able to skip through mid-season without defeat or without a tie. This year, perhaps more than any recent year, the ranks of the major undefeated eleven have been reduced to a pety handful.

Not more than 25 teams remain with completely clear records. It's not many when one considers the hundreds and hundreds of college eleven in the United States.

The ability to score has been the character of football thus far into 1938. Only five teams stand out from all sections of the football world with their goal lines still untrod.

These eleven, one or two of them almost unheard of, are Emory and Henry in Virginia; Princeton, Grove City college in Pennsylvania; Nebraska, and Carnegie Tech.

On the other hand, the massing of scores has been terrific. Davis Elkins leads the list with six successive victories amounting to a total of 284 points. Only three touchdowns have been scored on this leader from the East. That's a record approaching 50 points a contest.

On the Pacific coast, the University of Oregon stands out as the only undefeated and untied eleven.

The Webfoots have been banged through to five victories, but their opportunity of maintaining this pace diminishes as each Saturday rolls around.

The games become exceedingly more difficult.

The Webfoots have scored 108 points in these games. Little Columbia, University of Portland has been the only team to cross the Oregon goal line in that 14 to 7 game that terrified the Oregon team until Van Vleet, the unknown halfback, stepped into the emergency to bring the victory.

A few other leading eleven undefeated are Duquesne, Georgia, Army, Dartmouth, Georgia Duke, Syracuse, Princeton, Colgate, Michigan, Iowa, Nebraska, Yale and Carnegie Tech.

The starting time of the Oregon Normal-University of Oregon game has been set at 2:15 Saturday afternoon. Howard Hobson, coach of the Ashland team, sends this announcement particularly to Klamath Falls fans who have become accustomed to a 2:00 o'clock or 2:30 game time for Modoc field.

There was something about the Oregon State team in its scoreless tie with Southern California equally as important as the lack of substitution. Those battling Beavers, going against one of the hardest tackling teams in the nation, played through four quarters without a single fumble.

There was an abundance of opportunity for juggling, too. Fifty-one times the Beaver backs received the ball from center, but fifty-one times they successfully tucked it away for a plunge at the line, a punt, a pass or a dash around end.

The incident spoke high praise for both the backfield men and the center.

Selecting all-Americans for 1938 already is under way. Out here on the coast there will be an exceptionally large number of candidates. The "star" list—Incomplete, of course—thus far in the season reads something like this:

KLAMATH KEYED TO MEET TIGER

Squad Completes Practice Campaign for Medford Contest.

The excitement of the year's major football game had settled over the Klamath Pelicans with the conclusion of a season-long practice drive. The spirit "to do" was the character of the squad for its contest with the Medford Tigers on Modoc field Friday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock.

The entire city was prepared for a "football holiday" Friday, with the high expectation of witnessing the Pelicans cast off their underdog standing and ride through to a victory over the powerful Medford eleven. Schools will be closed at noon, and many business houses will shut their doors for the game.

The pep rally set for the excitement reigned among the Klamath high school student body with intensity equal to the spirit of the football warriors. A pep rally in the downtown district on Thursday night will set off the enthusiasm for the game.

The pep parade will form at the Elks temple and continue to Modoc field. A huge bonfire will be touched off on the north end of the field as climax to the rally. The high school's "K" on the hills above Pacific Terrace will be outlined by flares.

Medford Ends Training — The Medford squad, perpetual victors over the Pelicans and never defeated by an Avrit coached team, will pull into Klamath Falls Friday morning. The Tigers have moved through a practice period with as much seriousness as the Pelicans and will be in excellent condition for the contest.

The Pelicans worked late on Tuesday afternoon, and it was after dusk when the players trooped off Modoc field. Chester Jones, injured halfback, was in uniform, and probably will start along with Norman Taber, fullback, Perry, halfback, and Eugene Barrows, quarterback in the backfield.

Klamath has not yet been beaten this year, and its goal line has never been crossed. Medford, encouraged last week by a decisive victory over Marshfield, lost an early season game to Crescent City of Northern California.

Uclans Groom Fullback To Match Mikulak

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 25. (AP)—If Coach Bill Spaulding has his way, the University of California at Los Angeles will repay Oregon in kind at the Memorial Coliseum Saturday when these two football teams clash.

The Bruin mentor is priming Joe Keeble, a pretty fair line plunger in his own right, to match the work of Mike Mikulak, Oregon's hard driving fullback.

Keeble hit his stride for the first time this season against Loyola, and Coach Spaulding hopes he will be able to rip off plenty of yards at the expense of the Bruins.

The matter of stopping Mikulak and the other Oregon backs is still bothering Coach Spaulding. A bunch of reserves, using Oregon plays, ran far too freely yesterday against the first and second squads, which means they will be in no defensive work in store this afternoon.

Capt. Lee Coats appeared definitely to be out as Phil Nordli and Bill Merrill worked in his place at center. Coats hobbled around on crutches. Mike Dima, veteran guard, may become eligible for the game after being absent all fall because of scholastic difficulties.

All Sections Preparing For Important Grid Games

NEW YORK, Oct. 25. (AP)—The studious football follower, curious to ascertain just what the sectional championship prospects are, will have plenty to gnaw on after this week's games have been won, lost and tied.

An early-season campaign against set-ups or inter-sectional foes, profitable or interesting as it may have been, leaves most conference races still in the formative stage with no possibility of accurate ratings. This week should correct that for most of the big fellows will take their fun in conference games.

In the Big Ten, for instance, four conference games should clarify the situation considerably although there's small chance of anything occurring to make Michigan's Wolverines any less the outstanding favorites they already are. The rest of their meetings with Chicago is regarded as a foregone conclusion. At Minneapolis, however, the clash of Iowa's Hawkeyes and Minnesota's Gophers should eliminate one or the other from further contention. Iowa has hung up successive triumphs over Northwestern and Wisconsin but Minnesota, despite ties with Indiana and Purdue, looks impressive. Purdue, tied but unbeaten, should coast by Wisconsin and remain in the chase. Northwestern and Ohio State, rivals at Columbus, have been beaten

and, at the moment at least, are out of the race.

A Nebraska victory over Oklahoma and a Kansas defeat by Kansas State would just about decide the big six race in favor of Nebraska's Cornhuskers. That would give three successive victories.

The five-game Pacific Coast schedule brings together only two eleven undefeated within the conference, Southern California and California, but Oregon, Stanford and Oregon State, the first two undefeated and untied, and Oregon State only tied, run into strenuous opposition that may make a wholesale slash in the contending list. Oregon must play U. C. L. A. whose only conference start ended in a 3-0 defeat from Stanford. Stanford plays Washington and Oregon State meets Washington State. The fifth game between Montana and Idaho involves the cellar-dwellers.

The numerous and unwieldy eastern colleges, with no major conference alignment at all, will have to wait until just about the end of the season before any generally recognized leader will emerge but this week's slate may serve to eliminate some of the unbeaten teams such as Yale or Army, who collide at New Haven. Fordham, Holy Cross, Dartmouth and Carnegie, all of whom run up against what appears to be formidable opposition.

Ben Friedman Holding Lead In "Pro" Race

NEW YORK, Oct. 25. (AP)—There's no let-up in the contest Benny Friedman, Harry Newman and Arnold Herber are waging for passing honors in the national professional football league.

Friedman, now with the Brooklyn Dodgers, has the best average with 21 completions in 40 throws for a gain of 323 yards. Newman, like Friedman an ex-Michigan all-American quarterback, has gained the most ground by the aerial route, completing 20 out of 41 tosses for the New York Giants for 434 yards. Herber has thrown the most passes, 67, and completed the most, 31, to gain 409 yards for Green Bay.

Glenn Praeland, former Nebraska ace now with Portsmouth, has scored the most points, 37, followed by Newman with 31 and Ken Strong of the Giants with 29.

Boston monopolizes individual ground gaining honors with Cliff Battles, formerly of West Virginia Wesleyan, topping the list with 469 yards, and Jim Musick, ex-southern California star, second with 323. Ace Gutowsky of Portsmouth is third with 295.

Luke Johnson of Northwestern and the Chicago Bears is the best pass catcher with 10 snared for a gain of 153 yards. Paul Moss of Purdue and the Pittsburgh Pirates rank second with nine for the same distance.
