LAKEVIEW

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—At a meeting held Wednesday night of the six members of the NRA compliance board, T. E. These six persons represent six classes of labor and were appointed by Dr. Kelly in accord with instructions received by him from NRA headquarters.

BONNEVILLE DAM CAUSES PROBLEM

The construction of the Bonneville dam will inject a new angle into the power problem in Oregon. It was declared by State Utilities Commissioner C. M. Thomas in a talk Tuesday night before the audience at the city gross sales tax hearing.

Thomas said that the problem of distributing the abundance of power produced on the new project will develop two alternatives:

1. The development of a state-wide, publicly operated distribution unit, which would destroy the investors' money in private utilities.

2. The development of state-owned transmission lines with local distribution by municipalities or private corporations, which would protect investments in private utilities.

Changing Conditions Cited

The latter proposal, he asserted, will be based upon the willingness of the power companies to "get down on a sensible basis." If they will submit to this, he said, the second alternative will probably prevail.

If they will not, public operation of the whole system may result. The utilities commissioner predicted that this situation will play an important part in the next political campaign.

Thomas spoke at some length on the bus and truck controversy, and declared that it was necessary to issue an emergency order in connection with the truck situation "to patch it up until the legislature gets the picture."

He said that conditions had changed, particularly as regards the cost of insurance and good faith bonds, since the legislature adopted the truck measure.

The commissioner declared for compulsory liability insurance on all motor vehicles.

AKRON, O., Oct. 25. (AP)—The Graf Zeppelin, over-all length 776 feet, came to Akron today on the wings of a storm, and a baby, over-all length 18 inches, just about stole the dirigible's show.

Amazingly good-natured round-faced and chubby, Master Billy Munson of Rio De Janeiro—and the state, too—disembarked from the ship in the arms of his father, Richard Munson, American lawyer who spends part of his time in Brazil.

Dr. Hugo Eckener himself, the commander, was anything but immune to the charm of Billy, for right in the midst of going to a press conference, he stopped to rap on the window and wave his hand to the dirigible's most important and youngest passenger in an adjoining office at the dock.

GASOLINE TEST CONDUCTED HERE

Demonstration and lectures on the performance of gasoline with respect to mileage were conducted here Monday by representatives of the Associated Oil company. An automobile especially equipped with intricate testing machines was driven to Klamath Falls from California.

The demonstrations were conducted by George Dixon, head of the aviation department from the company's headquarters in San Francisco, and J. C. McKean from the research department at Associated, Calif. Vincent O'Brien, Klamath manager of the Associated Oil company, assisted the two representatives from the south.

Tests were made here with the use of Flying "A" gasoline. Although temperature, road grades and the general condition of the car were taken into consideration to bring out the results of the test and show the excellent results of a high type of fuel, such as Flying "A," under handicaps.

Dixon and McKean continued to Bend Monday night. They will tour Oregon, Washington and Idaho and return to California by way of the Pacific highway.

LUMBER INTERESTS OPEN DISCUSSIONS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. (AP)—The lumber conservation conference today began topic discussions of the numerous proposals which have been proposed to place the industry on a basis of conservation and sustained yield in the forests of the country.

The subjects were divided into six main general divisions for discussion throughout the morning session of the conference. The divisions are:

- 1—Forestry practice by industry in which proposals relating to forestry and protection practice and the procedure of NRA code authority divisions to determine and enforce detailed and practical local applications were on the program.
- 2—Public timber disposal and public acquisition proposals.
- 3—Taxation, forest loans and matters of economic and financial policies.
- 4—Public co-operative expenditures and the proposals concerning continuous functions, like protection, research, etc.
- 5—Farm woodlands.
- 6—Public and industry policy for handling damaged timber.
