

Frosh Combine Many Styles

Webfoot Yearlings Drilled in Methods Of Oregon's Major Opponents. Youngsters Will be With Varsity Next Season. Doc Spears in Trouble. Elmer Brown Chief Threat on Ashland Eleven.

The University of Oregon Freshman football team, like all freshmen eleven, will present a rather conglomerate offensive against the Southern Oregon Normal school on Modoc field Saturday afternoon. It will be a team that has been "playing the other fellow's game" all season.

Freshmen's eleven have two very important functions. They contribute variety material for next season's conference contender and they prepare this year's varsity for its major competition.

Billy Reinhart, freshman coach at Oregon, has served the university this year both as a coach and a scout. He has brought back to his yearling squad the formations and strategy of every conference opponent the Webfoots have this season.

The yearlings, besides learning the particular style of football propounded by Frank Callison, have been made familiar with the methods of Oregon State, Ucla, Southern California, Washington, Idaho, Gonzaga, St. Mary's and others. It has turned the freshman season into one of the most important in a player's intercollegiate career.

He learns his own game thoroughly, and he comes to know an abundance about the types of football he will meet as a member of the varsity.

So these freshmen, who have been scrimmaging the huge Webfoot varsity all season, come to Klamath Falls with something of the character of all major coast eleven.

With them rests the hopes of Oregon's success for next season. These young men who move against Southern Oregon Normal school will be in conference competition in 1934. Some of them will have the enormous tasks of replacing Mike Mikulak, Leighton Gee, Mark Temple, Bernie Hughes, Riff Nelson, Howard Bobbit, and others—all Oregon regulars.

The football popularity of Dr. C. W. Spears, appears on the wane this season at Wisconsin. The bulky doctor, one-time coach at Oregon, Minnesota, West Virginia and Dartmouth, wasn't won a game of any importance this season. He has dropped two Big Ten contests, one to Illinois last week, by terrifically heavy scores.

Spears had an excellent season in 1932, his first with Wisconsin. He lost but one game and was runner-up for the conference championship.

Doc left Oregon because he saw no prospects of developing a winner and perpetuating his excellent record for producing championships. Apparently, for this season, at least, he's not doing much to substantiate himself in the Midwest.

Alumni and college officials don't usually like Doc, even when he isn't winning games.

Selecting Saturday's winners becomes a little more difficult each week.

Southern Oregon Normal to defeat the University of Oregon Freshmen on Modoc field. Southern California to defeat California at Berkeley.

Oregon State to defeat Washington State at Corvallis. Stanford to defeat University of Washington at Seattle.

Oregon to defeat Ucla Bruins at Los Angeles. Idaho to defeat Montana at Moscow.

At least one star of the Pacific Coast conference will be in the Ashland lineup Saturday. He is Elmer Brown, fast-running halfback, who played for the Webfoots last year.

Brown had some difficulty with his studies, and was ineligible at Oregon. The best thing he could do was enroll with Howard Hobson.

Brown will be recalled here as the Bend high school youth who caused so much difficulty for the Pelicans.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 26 (AP)—Grant high school took undisputed possession of second place in the Portland interscholastic football standings by virtue of a 13-0 victory over Roosevelt high.

Washington, with two wins and one tie tops the league.

Grant has won three games and lost one.

PELICANS SET FOR MEDFORD

Klamath Team Underdog For Battle With Old Football Foe.

One team to uphold football tradition and another to remove it will collide on Modoc field Friday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. The Medford Tigers, traditional winner, were favorites to upset the Klamath Falls Pelicans.

The Pelicans, undefeated and unscathed upon, however, were not one-sided underdogs. Darwin Burgher, Medford coach, and Les Avrit, coach of the Pelicans, concurred in the belief their teams were meeting the strongest opponents of the season.

A bitter fight and a close score was the only prediction each coach would offer as the major contest of the season approached.

The Pelicans, working long on Modoc field, completed their practice Wednesday night. Thursday was to be devoted only to final instructions, a brief limbering up process, and a lecture on how to avenge the many Medford victories of the past.

Avrit, with Chester Jones almost certain to be in the starting lineup, was prepared to bring the full strength of his team against the Tigers. He has mapped an offensive plan to bring out the most effective punch from a combination outwheeled and with less experience than the Tigers.

Ends Named Bill Horn and Lynn Propst were destined to start at ends for the Pelicans. Horn, lean and lanky, is playing his first year as a regular. Propst, an all-conference youth from the 1932 team, has a reputation as one of the most dangerous receivers in Southern Oregon.

John Pastega and Nello Giovanni, husky Italian youths from Pelican City, will start the game at tackles. Both are veterans of the Medford game of last year and Giovanni, like Propst, captured a position of the all-conference elevation.

Marvin Mayfield was the center selection.

Homer Maxwell, a veteran, and Buford Weeks, a recruit, probably will be the guards. Maxwell, playing his final year, looks as one of the best defenders in the region.

The left halfback post was the only backfield position in doubt. Either Jones or Bob Leslie will start. Jones has been handicapped by an injured shoulder.

Klamath's most dependable ball carrier, Norman Taber, will be at fullback. The husky lad, playing his last season, has been the key man both offensively and defensively.

Eugene Barrows, captain, and Wayne Perry will fill out the ball carrying combination. Barrows will start at quarter and Perry at right half.

Alumni Complaints Arouse Wrath of Big Ten Chiefs

CHICAGO, Oct. 26 (AP)—Unless the alumni and students ease up in their annual campaign of "firing coaches," Big Ten football may be drastically de-emphasized.

The presidents and faculty representatives of the Big Ten universities are disgusted with the "get a new coach" movement, the Associated Press was reliably informed today, and will take concerted action to dampen the enthusiasm for the sport unless there is a let-up.

"Deflation" Considered "It's all right to have enthusiasm for football," one of the Big Ten leaders said, "but to let it run away with you is something else again. Every fall, some coach is on the fire of the alumni and students just because his team happens to get beat. Some alumni or student gets all burnt up because his team loses and the next thing we know the president of the university is roused out of bed to deny a rumor that the coach is going to get fired."

"Well, we're all getting tired of it. If it doesn't stop or ease up a bit all we can do is to deflate the game's importance. After all, you know, football is just a sport, not a college education. The president of every university wants a winning football team just as much as the most excited freshman. They are interested in the game and, through counsel, know when it's time to change coaches."

Today, with Big Ten football enjoying its greatest year since 1927 from a financial standpoint, at least one coach, Sam Williams of Ohio State, is on the

"fire." Rumors also were reported at Wisconsin that at Notre Dame, outside the conference but a close ally, heartily "Hunk" Anderson was rumored to be on his way out.

Although L. W. St. John, athletic director at Ohio State, expressed confidence in Coach Williams and his coaching staff, it was hinted that a legislative investigation would be made of the Buckeye athletic department.

State Representative Grant P. Ward, writing in the Ohio State Journal, called the Ohio state athletic department a "closed corporation with the control beautifully centralized and protected" and recalled that "it took a legislative investigation" to smash up a "similar" situation two years ago at the University of Wisconsin.

A former Ohio State star, Ward was an assistant coach under Dr. John Wilce.

In direct contrast is Ozzie Solomon of Iowa. He's sitting on top of the world right now with an undefeated team. The Hawkeyes supporters aren't expecting too much, either. Some say they don't care much what happens now as Ozzie's boys managed to eke out a 7 to 6 defeat of Northwestern, and crush Wisconsin, 28 to 7.

Jones Shifts Troy Warriors For California

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 26. (AP)—Coach Howard Jones planned a final overhauling of the Southern California offense today before 37 Trojans leave tonight for Berkeley where they intend to turn it loose Saturday against California.

Troy's head man, always hard to please when it comes to advancing the ball over an opponent's goal line, has displayed fine disgust over the way the Southern California attack failed to click against Oregon State.

No longer does Coach Jones intend to take Homer Griffith, starting quarterback, out of the lineup when he starts piloting the men of Troy goalward. Instead, on Saturday at Berkeley, he will shift Griffith to fullback, inject the speed and deception of Irvine Warburton into the backfield at quarter, and shoot the works.

Of course, the rub of this plan is to get the attack rolling. That's why Kenneth (Red) Bright will be at left tackle instead of right halfback.

FROSH WINDUP GRID PRACTICE

Rex Hamaker, Half, Out With Sprained Ankle; Sons Favored.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 26. (Special)—The University of Oregon freshmen ended intensive practice for their trip with the Ashland Normal school eleven Saturday at Klamath Falls with a long scrimmage with the varsity. The Webfoot babes will leave Eugene Friday afternoon.

The frosh backfield was seriously weakened today when it was announced that Rex Hamaker, Klamath Falls star, would be unable to play against the Sons. Hamaker suffered a sprained ankle in practice yesterday and is on crutches. He had been alternating with Bill Nye, Harrisburg, Pa., at right halfback in the first string backfield.

Frosh Underdogs. Despite the fact that the frosh will be distinct underdogs in Saturday's fray, Bill Reinhart, head coach, promises a surprise in the yearling offensive. He has been drilling his team in a special style to be used against the Sons and has high hopes that it will succeed in putting across scores.

That the frosh have an unusually strong forward wall was demonstrated in the initial game with the Oregon State rocks, when the Lemon-Yellow line held repeatedly deep in its territory. Several of the frosh linemen, notably John Farrar at center; Alan Wilson, end; Joe Murray, end and tackle, and Dick Bishop, guard, are expected to develop into varsity material next year.

Elmore Borden, left halfback, and Dick Bishop, big fullback, are expected to carry most of the offensive work. Borden proved to be a flashy open-field runner against the rocks, while Bishop appears to be another line smasher of the Mikulak type. He also does a large share of the team's kicking and passing.

The tentative starting lineup for the frosh, as announced after today's practice by Bill Reinhart, coach, is as follows: John Farrar, center; Dale Hardisty and Morris Burchard, guards; Joe Murray and Del Bjork, tackles; Alan Wilson and Frank Cross, ends; Phil Penn, quarterback; Elmore Borden and Bill Nye, halfbacks, and Dick Bishop, fullback.

Twenty-four players will make the trip, accompanied by Reinhart and Irv Schulz, coaches; Tom Stoddard, assistant graduate manager, and Paul Golden, student manager.

Kaplan Defeats Billy Edwards, Myers Gets Draw

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 26. (AP)—Abe Kaplan, 215, of Portland, won the main event on last night's wrestling program here from Billy Edwards, 199, of Kansas City on a foul called by Referee Verne Harrington.

Edwards took the first fall with a headlock in 17 minutes and Kaplan won the second in 6 minutes with a flying wing-clasp. When Edwards knocked Kaplan out of the ring and struck him again before he could make his way completely through the ropes, the referee called the foul, after the two had wrestled for about 5 minutes in an attempt to win the deciding tumble.

Chet Wiles, 172, of Portland, and Bob Myers, 165, of Tillamook, went five rounds to a draw in the semi-windup.

Hunny Martin, of Seattle, won the preliminary from George Bennett, 155, Tulsa, Okla., taking one fall.

Cantonwine and Kruse have followed each other in northwest matches but until Mack Lillard, Klamath promoter, signed them for Klamath Falls they hadn't faced each other since their rough bout in San Francisco last summer. Swift light heavyweights, Bob Myers of Tillamook, and Sailor Franks of San Diego, will meet in a one-hour semi-windup bout. Myers won here several weeks ago. Franks wrestled here for the first time.
