

ANNUAL POLICE CHARITY BALL ON SATURDAY

Last minute plans were shaped Thursday for a record-breaking crowd at the annual police charity ball at the exhibit building Saturday night.

Carl Cook, in charge of arrangements for the event, announced unusual features. These include dancing and musical events.

Donald Sumner, Betty Jane Kernum and Marjorie Montgomery, three 12-year-olds, will present tap and acrobatic dancing acts. They are the pupils of Mr. and Mrs. John McCona.

Billy Lott, known as "the mad musician," will give his version of the "Twelfth Street Rag." He will stand on his head while he plays. Lott has been billed as prominent vaudeville droll.

A nine-piece orchestra will provide the music for the dance. Members, all union musicians, will include O. K. Cole, Newt Green, Lloyd Derby, Roy Wells, Art Reed, Jess Bradley, Ivan Cook, Myrtle Thorne and Joe Solonberger.

The dance will be given for the purpose of raising funds for emergency and deserving cases of hunger and under-nourishment during the coming winter. Cook expressed appreciation of organizations, individuals and the newspapers and radio for helping promote the dance and postponing other functions in order to make way for the police ball.

Coach Little Offers Pleas For New Rule

NEW YORK, Oct. 26. (AP)—Lou Little, Columbia's football coach, offers a suggestion that will save gridiron officials a few gray hairs, do away with some of the controversies such as those which arose out of last week's Yale-Brown, Dartmouth-Penn and Army-Illinois games, and, perhaps, make the game more exciting for the spectators.

That is to do away with the rules which prevent running with a fumble ball or a blocked kick. "Let the boys run with a loose ball," says Lou. "That's the instinctive, the natural thing for them to do, so natural that even good officials forget that it's against the rules."

"Let's get rid of the artificial situation where you cannot capitalize on an opponent's mistakes. The rule against running with a fumbled ball was put into the books to promote lateral passing, which it has not done. The rule against running with a blocked kick, natural outgrowths, have merely added new problems to an already complicated situation."

Terry Scores Victory Over Teddy Yarz

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 26. (UP)—Young Terry, Trenton middleweight, scored a major boxing upset by winning a 10-round decision over Teddy Yarz, champion of Monaco, Pa., before 3,000 fans at the Newark armory.

Yarz, considered the outstanding candidate for the world title claims held by Marcel Thil of France and Lou Brouillard of Boston, had given the ring a two to one favorite. Terry's victory will give him a crack at Thil or Brouillard.

Terry weighed 160 1/2 pounds; Yarz 157 1/2.

It was a fast, savage bout and as close that many of the newspapermen at the ringside thought the Pennsylvania boy should have received the decision. Referee Jack Phelan of Trenton awarded the verdict to Terry. Terry's whirlwind rally in the 10th won the decision.

Giants Smother Washington Team

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26. (UP)—Approximately 3,500 chilled spectators in Griffith stadium watched the New York Giants wallop the Washington Packers 27-0 in their professional football encounter.

Harry Newman, former all-America back at Michigan, who is playing his first year of professional football, was the principal factor in the Giants' victory. He scored the first "ouch-down," threw a 47 yard pass which resulted in a second, dashed 59 yards to place the ball in scoring position for a third and threw another long pass instrumental in the fourth Giant score.

Realistic scenes of the destruction of modern civilization by a complete inundation of the world by a mammoth tidal wave and views of majestic structures crumbling to waste before the onslaught of earth tremors are among the spectacular sequences in a motion picture that has just reached the screen.

Through modern scientific photography and skillfully designed sets, S. Fowler Wright's story of the world's demolition is vividly presented in "Deluge," an RKO-Radio picture, coming to the Pine Tree theatre today. New York's harbor is destroyed. Piers snap from shore. The roles of the triangle are

portrayed by Sidney Blackmer, Peggy Shannon and Lola Wilson in "Deluge." John Goodrich and Warren B. Duff wrote the screen play for Felix Felt, Jr., director. Matt Moore, Fred Kohler, Ralf Harolde, Samuel Hinds and Edward Van Sloan support the featured leads in prominent roles.

PELICAN

Quite the gayest musical picture that has been seen on a local screen in many a day is "Ladies Must Love," the wisecracking comedy which opened at the Pelican theatre today.

The picture is filled with hitting songs, most of which are sung by June Knight, who can sing and dance in a manner which is very pleasant to the eye and ear, and who introduces the melodies with a zest which has made her a favorite of the New York stage. RED CROSS CHIEF HERE FROM SOUTH

R. E. Carlson of San Francisco, representing the American Red Cross, is in Klamath Falls for several days to assist the local chapter's roll call and life-saving projects.

Carlson is assisting Buford Morris, chairman of the life saving program, and Miss Ella Rodke, instructor. In addition to speaking at meetings and on radio programs, he is to recheck the life saving instructors, Paul Gravelle, Miss Rodke and Edna Kerns, and tonight will hold a first aid meeting of the instructors.

First aid, he said, is rapidly growing in interest here, and the Red Cross hopes to extend the program into the rural districts.

Prevention, the Red Cross expert said, is being incorporated into the first aid program. There are 30,000 deaths yearly from accidents in this country, and 85 per cent are preventable.

Carlson also is helping Mrs. Wilbur I. Joann outline plans for the Red Cross roll call which starts on November 11.

Discussing the national program of the Red Cross, he said that only 1.2 per cent of its income goes for overhead. The main divisions of service are disaster relief, war service, Junior Red Cross, relief and health, including first aid. He saving, home hygiene and nursing.
