The County Budget

THE county budget has been completed. It will appear for publication on Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning in these newspapers, giving all of the people of the county an opportunity to study it.

A cursory examination indicates that the budget committee have done a most workmanlike job. They sat on the lid, but at the same time gave intelligent consideration to the real needs and unusual requirements that are in prospect for next year.

It was necessary to appropriate fairly generously for relief, not only to meet the emergency situation existing but to make a showing to state and federal relief authorities who administer the funds we must get from outside sources.

It is noteworthy that salaries were not increased by the budget board, although in many municipalities such action is being considered in view of the prospects for inflation and higher living costs. This is evidence of the budget commission's hard-headed determination to stay within bounds.

The budget may not be perfect. There may be some adjustments to be made before it is finally adopted after the public hearing on November 28. It is to be hoped the financial schedule, upon publication, is carefully studied, and that any criticisms or suggestions that are directed toward the county court and budget committee come after a thorough understanding of the budget and the problems involved.

"Duck Stamps" May Conserve Bird Life

THE "duck stamp" is the newest proposal for staving off extermination of migratory waterfowl in this country. It comes as the suggestion of the American Game association, the Izaak Walton League of America, and other sportsmen's groups.

This unique plan will probably be offered to congress for action. The "duck stamps" would sell at \$1 each, and would be attached to the hunting licenses of all those wishing to hunt migratory birds.

Unless the plan's proponents are over-optimistic, the stamps would yield about \$1,000,000. This would be used in restoring breeding grounds, creating sanctuaries, acquiring breeding grounds and refuges, and for research to prevent disease among the fowl.

The "duck stamp" plan, if properly administered, would seem to be an effective help to the program of water fowl conservation. That it comes from sportsmen's groups is a happy indication that the hunters, themselves, are beginning to realize the serious danger of utter extermination of waterfowl.

That danger has brought an appeal this year from the United States biological survey, urging that the hunters do most of their shooting among the more abundant species. A quick survey just after the season opened here by U. S. Game Protector Hugh Worcester, indicated that this appeal for selective shooting had won considerable response locally.

Through these indications of hunters' concern is the greatest hope for saving and conserving migratory bird life.

FOUR-L METHODS ATTACKED

Labor Council Urges Lumber Workers to Join Union

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore.—(To the Editor)—It has come to our attention recently in recent weeks that the organization known as the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, which, contrary to general opinion, is in no way recognized by labor or the government as an instrument that can be used to legislate or act in the interests of the employees of the lumber industry in their dealings with the various management or associations, has been resorting to very unmanly and un-American campaigns of intimidation and coercion to force employees in certain units of the industry into their organization.

Unable, legally, to use the method of previous years of mass herding employees into their organization after a signed agreement with the employer, they have stooped to the so-called whispering campaign, where the threat of discipline and unemployment is not only hinted, but becomes a fact when the employee refuses to join when solicited.

A careful study of the constitution of the 4-L organization will convince any laboring man that his best interests cannot be served by his becoming a part of

it. It has been branded by the labor board of the NRA and all organized labor as a company union, and its application has been outlawed by the Norris amendment; better known as the Yellow Dog contract law. Despite these indictments against it, certain of our major lumber companies continue to encourage and foster its agents in their underhand methods of obtaining members; and recognizes them as a medium of collective bargaining in violation of Section 7 of the National Recovery act. We may rest assured if they violate this section of the law they will openy snarl at the entire national recovery program and chisel at the balance of its policy.

We, the Central Labor Council, therefore, urge every lumber worker to join with the Loggers, Sawmill and Timber Workers union in a program arrived at openly and manifestly that will prevent a repetition of these conditions, so that peace will hover over our district and the recovery act of our government will be a success. In spite of the attitude of certain of our employing group, who seem to wish for its failure, Local 15229 of the Loggers, Sawmill and Timber Workers union is struggling against these conditions, and solicits your membership, your co-operation, and moral support in this fight.

The Inside Story From The Capital

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WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—The insiders believe Mr. Roosevelt's latest magic dollar trick is just about the slickest ever conceived. They see it as a new psychological inflation stunt to raise prices without disturbing the hidden roots of his sound money principles.

It appears to have been thought out along the same lines as his first slight of hand trick in going off the gold standard. Then he had most of the gold in the world as reserve for his currency. He still has it. He went off gold in theory, but he kept the gold.

Now he is devaluing the dollar in theory, but he is still keeping the old value of it hidden away in the treasury gold vaults.

In other words Mr. Roosevelt is keeping the sound basis for the dollar and trying to have inflation at the same time. You have to be a magician to do that.

ROOTS

The average man need not be worried about his failure to understand it all. No one does entirely, including Mr. Roosevelt. Only the basic general purposes appear to have been very carefully thought out.

The only thing it can be likened to in a psychological way is a man who swears off liquor and yet keeps his cellar full. He can advertise himself as a teetotaler and reap the advantage of such an advertisement. But he personally knows he does not need to worry about where he is going to get the next drink.

Mr. Roosevelt is advertising himself as a dollar devaluationist in theory but he is keeping his sound money essentials safe.

THEORY

The devaluation theory works out like this: By bidding up the price of gold, Mr. Roosevelt makes dollars less valuable in terms of gold. It takes more dollars to buy the same amount of gold.

The idea is that all other commodity prices follow the price of the basic commodity, gold. As Mr. Roosevelt bids higher and higher for gold, commodity prices are supposed to rise commensurately.

That is devaluing the dollar continuously and progressively. It is almost the same as if Mr. Roosevelt directly eliminated a gold grain from the dollar instead of bidding up gold prices. There is just one difference. That is, he can always get out of the gold price method without trouble, while the direct elimination of gold grains is forthright and final.

In other words, the gold price method is temporary, while the direct devaluation method is final.

GROANING

Those who have dollars or dollar values do not agree that it is fun to be fooled this way. They want to know definitely where they are going.

It appears very likely that the next month will witness a crafty game between them and Mr. Roosevelt. They will do everything possible to squeeze a more definite commitment out of him.

They will have many basic arguments for their cause. One is foreign trade. No foreigner who buys here will know what to pay or how to pay unless some protective details are worked out. It may be necessary to insure each purchase against Mr. Roosevelt's altering the gold value of it while it is in transit.

Also, such a shifting system of values makes it almost absurd to try to talk to the British

about war debt payments or to talk tariffs with anyone.

Maybe they can arrange payment in Mr. Mellon's aluminum. That is about the only sacred price still left.

Only last week the heretofore sacrosanct price of steel rails was readjusted, and now it is gold.

WAGE

The current talk about taking the dollar away from the international speculators makes good reading, but that is all.

Mr. Roosevelt handed the dollar over to the speculators when he went off gold. He did it deliberately to let them hammer it down. They did, for awhile, until they found out he was using them to get prices up here. However, the domestic inflationary psychology played out about a month ago. When the dollar went lower, prices here did not go up.

The truth is the international money speculators have served their purpose in Mr. Roosevelt's scheme of things. He has now discarded them.

If he has anything legitimately to be held against them, it is the fact that they treated our dollar too respectably, and not that they took it and ran away with it.

SPECULATORS

Mr. Roosevelt is supposed to have had the case of a certain Wall Streetor in mind when he talked about driving out speculators.

This fellow aptly fits the president's description of one who would not know a kernel of wheat if he saw one. It is said in high places that he dropped several millions lately in the wheat market. The estimate of the amount is probably exaggerated.

Market insiders really believe the president's drive to kill off the speculators may work this time.

They say no speculator would be silly enough to bet very much either way as long as the president can ruin him by changing the price of gold the same day.

CONTROVERSY

Skeptics protest in whispers now that the program is an effort to make a fifty million tail was a four billion dollar dog. The annual output of domestic gold has run around fifty million. The gold reserve is about four billions.

That is why the best money experts in the government want-

ed actual reduction of the reserve gold content in the dollar now. They believed that the theory of gold price purchases would not work out to increase commodity prices in the long run.

That view is not shared by many astute economists such as Prof. Warren and those connected with the committee for the nation.

Time and only time will tell.

100 KLAMATH ADULTS READY FOR STUDIES

With text books and note books tucked under their arms, at least 100 men and women of Klamath Falls will start a 16-week course in adult education as a result of a project which was started this fall by the Klamath Falls Women's Library club.

The classes are scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday evenings, November 1 and 2, in the Fremont school rooms. Classes are fast reaching capacity, according to the board of directors of the Library club, and in several cases waiting lists have already been formed.

Personnel of Staff

Six teachers are in charge of the classes, which will include the teaching of French, psychology, English literature, public speaking, elementary business law and accounting. Following is the personnel:

Mrs. S. R. Berry, beginner's French. Mrs. Berry is a graduate of the New York State Teachers' college, and holds her degree as Bachelor of Pedagogy. Mrs. Berry majored in Latin and French, and for five years taught in New York state. She also taught in Klamath Falls high school in 1918.

Mrs. Don Hamlin, who will return from Ohio to teach classes in psychology by November 1, holds her Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Ohio. For two years Mrs. Hamlin had post graduate work in psychology in Smith college.

Mrs. Victor C. O'Neill, A. B., is a graduate of the University of Oregon, and was a member of the Medford high school faculty as well as the Klamath Falls high school. Mrs. O'Neill will teach English literature, and is well known in educational circles in Klamath Falls.

Groeschbeck to Teach
Paul T. Jackson, principal of Klamath Union high school, holds an A. B. degree from Linfield college, and has done post graduate work at Washington university as well as many seasons at Stanford University attending the summer course.

Rollo C. Groeschbeck, well known Klamath Falls lawyer, with 15 years experience teaching in colleges in the south, holds his A. B. degree from the University of Nashville, Tennessee, and also his L.L. B. from Illinois College of Law, Chicago. Post graduate work was also done in the Chicago university. Mr. Groeschbeck has also taught in the State Normal school of Louisiana. Classes in law will be under the supervision of Mr. Groeschbeck.

W. W. Southwell, Klamath Falls accountant, will take over the class in accounting. Southwell holds his B. S. degree from the University of Missouri, and is well known in this city.
