

A Varsity Contest For Klamath

Oregon May One Day Play a Southern Team Here. San Francisco Considered. Three Klamath Youths Have Promise. Oregon, Oregon State Game Has Coast Guessing.

Officials of the University of Oregon, satisfied Klamath Falls like football whether it's played in the sunshine, the rain or snow, have a few undeveloped plans which may designate Modoc field as an important meeting place between the northern and southern divisions of Pacific coast football.

It is not impossible the Oregon varsity might follow the Freshmen to Modoc field. One of the Webfoots' less important games probably would entice as many spectators in Klamath Falls as it would in Eugene. Playing here would reduce the expenses of a southern team traveling north and establish "political good will" for the university in southern Oregon.

Stoddard said Oregon was seriously placing San Francisco University, the team holding Oregon State, 12 to 6, and defeating Gonzaga, 6 to 0, on the schedule for either next year or the following.

Irv Schulz, former Oregon captain and guard who directed the Freshmen against Southern Oregon Normal school Saturday, holds an abundance of promise for the three young Klamath Falls boys playing with the yearlings.

He is heavier than Bernie Hughes, co-captain and center of this season's Oregon eleven.

Tom Stoddard has been connected with Pacific coast football, either as a student or as an official, for seven years.

Oregon State has no game this week end and Oregon is favored to defeat Utah at Eugene next Saturday.

More than that it will mean that one of the three teams, Oregon, Oregon State and University of Southern California, will be eliminated from the conference championship race.

The whole coast can only guess on this coming Oregon-Oregon State battle.

Dons Triumph Over Gonzaga Sunday, 6-0

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 30. (AP)—Heartened by a 6-0 victory over Gonzaga, the hard-hitting University of San Francisco football Dons nursed scars of battle cheerfully today.

The Dons put on a great third-period drive to defeat Gonzaga at Kezar stadium yesterday and hang up their first win of the season. Conrady, smashing back, led the 77-yard drive to scoring distance and then went over for the touchdown.

Key, right half of the Gonzaga Bulldogs, provided the big thrill of the game, however, when he ran the opening kickoff back 75 yards before he was stopped on the Dons' 15-yard line.

Because of rain only about 2000 spectators turned out to see San Francisco gain revenge for a 6-0 defeat at the hands of Gonzaga last year.



OREGON TEAMS READY FOR WAR

Beavers, Webfoots, Undeclared, Prepare For Battle.

PORTLAND, Oct. 30. —Oregon or Oregon State—take your choice, that's the most frequent comment heard here whenever football fans open a conversation regarding the annual "battle of the century" between the two grid teams, to be played here November 11, and the conversations become more heated every day.

"What about Mikulak and Temple," queries a Webfoot supporter, "what'll they do to the 'Iron Men' will be a shame." Before the final word of the statement is uttered, an Orange backer replies with "Southern California couldn't stop Franklin and they had a better offensive than Oregon's, what chance have the Webfoots."

Both Teams Win From this point the conversation shifts to each individual player on the two teams and what he'll do to his respective opponent, but a deadlock results, and those favoring each side end the talk still firm in their opinion of the respective favorites and what will happen Armistice Day.

Saturday's results, Oregon re-vengeing itself for a last minute defeat in 1932 by winning from U. C. L. A. 7 to 0, and Oregon State breaking a five-year jinx to edge out Washington State's Cougars 2 to 0, merely added fuel to the fire and add to the football fever that has swept Portland this season, as never before.

The fighting Webfoots gained their victory aided by the flying feet of Mark Temple and Leigh-ton Gee, flashy halfbacks, and an arrow pass from Mike Mikulak into the arms of Bud Pozzo, Oregon end, waiting over the Bruin goal line. The lone core came in the first period, and thereafter Oregon added a brilliant defensive game to their offensive play and held the Uclans scoreless.

At Corvallis, on a rain swept gridiron, Oregon State turned back every threat made by the Cougars and Clyde Devine, giant Orange center, smashed through on the Washington State 20-yard line to block Sarboe's kick in the second period, an act that resulted in an automatic safety, and the necessary two points for a conference victory.

To date, a certain gentry that sets the usual odds on the grid encounters are as muddled as any fan on, to wager on what the probable outcome will be. Not a one, however, but what expects the battle to be an epic in the football relations between the two schools.

It all turns back to the most frequent statement heard in circles of the city, Oregon or Oregon State—take your choice.

WEBFOOTS HOLD FOOTBALL LEAD

Unbeaten Oregon Meets Utah Next Saturday; Beavers Idle.

(AP) Inter-sectional engagements break into the far western football schedule next Saturday while the only coast conference clash of the day will pit the big and little brothers of the circuit, California's Bears and the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins, against each other for the first time.

It took several years of negotiations to bring the two state institutions together on the gridiron and U. C. L. A. alumni will see their hopes fulfilled when the Bears journey to the south next week-end.

Neither as yet have been able to break into the victory column of the conference. The Bruins lost to Oregon, 7-0, last Saturday, and to Stanford, 3-0, earlier in the season. The Bears were defeated by Southern California, 6-3, last week-end and on the preceding Saturday played a 6-6 tie with Washington State.

Rice Institute of Texas comes to San Francisco for an inter-sectional tilt with University of Santa Clara's Bronchos. While Santa Clara has had two discouraging setbacks through defeats by Stanford and the San Diego Marines, Coach Clipper Smith's eleven showed a return to early season form with a 19-0 win over the Olympic club a week ago.

Oregon's coast conference leader with three wins and no defeats, will sidetrack its championship seeking plans for the day to meet University of Utah at Eugene.

Oregon Favored The powerful Oregon squad will be favored to defeat the perennial champions of the Rocky Mountain conference, although upsets have been the rule rather than the exception on coast gridirons this season. On the basis of comparative scores, Oregon looms up. Oregon defeated University of California at Los Angeles, 7-0, last Saturday, while three weeks ago U. C. L. A. wallowed Utah, 21-0.

Washington State meets Gonzaga in a non-conference game at Spokane. The teams shape up on fairly even terms. Washington State lost to Oregon State, 2-0, last week and earlier in the year Oregon State and Gonzaga played a scoreless tie.

Beaten by Washington, 6-0, last week, Stanford will take on the Olympic club in a game that has no bearing on the league standings. The Stanford boys hope to win as easily as possible, as on the following week they will meet Southern California in Los Angeles.

Chicago Bears Defeat Giants In Pro League

CHICAGO, Oct. 30. (AP)—Luck and a lot of smart football continued to favor the Chicago Bears and as result they stand today as the only undefeated team in the national professional league and leaders of the western division.

The Bears pulled another of their last period rallies and trimmed the New York Giants, leaders of eastern half, 14 to 10 yesterday. Pittsburgh upset the dope by beating Boston 16 to 14.

In the other two games Brooklyn beat the Chicago Cardinals, 7 to 0, and the Green Bay Packers triumphed over Philadelphia, 35 to 9.

It is beginning to become an old habit with the Bears to win in the last quarter. Trailing 10 to 7 with five minutes to play, a kick by the Giants was blocked and the Bears started a drive which ended in a touchdown.

A pass, Grange to Miles, worth to Kerr who was standing in the end zone scored the winning touchdown. A pass to Bill Hewitt scored the first touchdown. The Giants scored on a toss from Newman to Strong and again when the latter kicked a field goal.

Green Bay wallowed the Phils in easy fashion, scoring 14 points in the first quarter and 21 in the last. Buckets Goldenberg scored three touchdowns. Others were accounted for by Blood and Englemann.

Pacific Breaks Three-Way Tie; Albany Beaten

SEATTLE, Oct. 30. (AP)—Pacific university boosted itself a notch closer to the Northwest conference football leadership by defeating Albany college, 7 to 0, at Albany, Ore., Saturday. The win broke a three-way tie for second place, putting the Forest Grove, Ore., school just half a game behind College of Puget Sound, the leader.

Pacific scored the game's lone touchdown when an intercepted pass in the final period put the ball on Albany's 20-yard stripe, and steadily smashes at the line took it the rest of the way. Albany threatened only once.

In the only other conference tussle of the week-end, Willamette overwhelmed Linfield, 22-6. The score was tied at 6-all at the start of the fourth quarter, when Willamette showed across a safety and two touchdowns.

College of Puget Sound scored two safeties to defeat Bellingham normal in a non-conference affair. The Teachers got to the C. P. S. 3-yard line, but couldn't go the remainder. In another non-conference game, College of Idaho and Eastern Oregon Normal battled to 6-6 tie at La Grande.

Two conference games were slated for this week, Pacific meeting Willamette at Salem and Whitman tackling C. P. S. at Tacoma.

AUTO FREIGHT FIRM PROTESTS DECISION

SALEM, Oct. 30. (AP)—Mandamus proceedings to compel enforcement of all provisions of the bus and truck law were filed in circuit court here today by Pierce Auto Freight, Inc., and 34 other companies.

The plaintiffs asked that State Utilities Commissioner C. M. Thomas desist from issuing temporary permits. Also that he start proceedings to collect from carriers who have been operating since the law went into effect, but who have not been paying fees required by the statute.

Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling granted an order restraining the writ returnable Monday afternoon, November 13.

The petitioners allege that contract carrier permits are being issued without posting of required bonds and without securing required indemnity insurance.

Giant Zeppelin Sails Over Sea

NEW YORK, Oct. 30. (AP)—The Graf Zeppelin, homeward bound over the Atlantic after her visit to the Century of Progress exposition in Chicago, reported her position at 10 p. m. (E. S. T.) last night to the Radio Marine Corporation as la. 39:38 north, long. 44:10 west, which would place her about 2000 miles east of New York. No word had been received from her early today.

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
