

CRATER LAKE RIM HIDDEN BY SNOWFALL

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Saturday afternoon until 8 o'clock Monday morning and the pelting showers and snow continued almost without interruption throughout the day.

The moisture gained during the week-end storms exceeded normal for the month and has put the country nearly one-half an inch above normal for the stream year to date. Normal moisture expectation up to the present date is .32, or .40 of an inch less than the amount recorded Monday morning.

Farmers and stockmen were rejoicing at the heavy storm which will put range and farm lands into excellent condition before heavy winter freezes begin.

BEND, Ore., Oct. 30. (AP)—The Cascade mountains of central Oregon today were covered by snow which ranged in depth from four inches at Elk lake to about one foot in the foothills of the Three Sisters near the timberline.

While snow fell in the mountains yesterday and last night, rain drenched the Deschutes woods. Precipitation in Bend was light.

Information from the highway offices here indicates McKenzie pass is still open to travel, although heavy snow fell on the divide last night.

About eight inches of snow fell in the vicinity of Todd lake, temporarily blocking Century drive to traffic late yesterday.

PORTLAND, Oct. 30. (AP)—Portland had more rainfall in the past three days than is normal for the entire month of October.

In the 24 hours ending at 5 a. m. today the city received .89 of an inch of precipitation. Most of it fell between 11 a. m. Sunday and 6 p. m.

The total rainfall for the three days amounted to 3.26 inches. The normal precipitation for October is 3.12 inches.

The rain sent Willamette valley streams sharply upward. The Willamette river rose 3.3 feet at Portland over the week-end.

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the persons who nearly filled the spectators' section of the council room. No count was made but sentiment seemed about evenly divided.

Hanks moved adoption. Keller, Hanks and Hosking, in that order, voted yes. Van Camp said he wanted more time.

Mayor Mahoney said that Van Camp would have to record his vote, and the councilman replied he preferred not to vote at all.

Mahoney then said the measure was adopted and became a part of the law of the city. He said, as mayor, that he would declare in favor of the measure.

He introduced it when it first came up for official consideration several weeks ago.

The emergency clause was not attached to the ordinance. This would have precluded a referendum on the measure.

Mahoney said afterward that he did not propose the attachment of the emergency clause because he did not want to place an obstacle in the way of a popular vote on the ordinance.

He said he believed the measure would be sustained if taken to the people.

While no definite announcements were made, it was indicated last night that a referendum movement will be started.

E. W. Vannice, local merchant, in a radio address opposing the tax several days ago, implied that the referendum would be invoked if the council passed the tax.

The change in the graduated tax was believed a compromise to satisfy contentions of the councilmen at yesterday's meeting in the mayor's office. There was a feeling on the part of certain councilmen that the higher brackets were too high and the lower brackets too low.

Amendments Attached

No change was made in the higher brackets except to kill the 4 per cent rate on sales over \$1,000,000. It is not believed any local business has over \$1,000,000 in gross sales annually.

The boost in the lower brackets will increase the tax on merchants doing more than \$150,000 and less than \$500,000 worth of business a year. That is, it increases it over the tax called for in the original rate schedule.

Mayor Mahoney said after the meeting that a re-estimating of the revenue from the original tax rate had indicated it would not yield \$50,000 as he at first believed. With the amendment in effect, he said, he believed the revenue would reach approximately that figure.

Another amendment included in the exemption clause the products of filling stations. An amendment changed the penalty, making it \$10 a day for each day of violation of the ordinance. Changes were made to add the phrase "occupation tax" in naming the proposed levy in two sections of the ordinance.

Drinking Admitted

Dr. George H. Adler, county coroner, conducted the inquest Monday morning.

Hillside hospital attaches reported that the condition of young Dean, who was also riding in a running board of the Spicer car, is unchanged. Dr. is expected to recover.

TIMBER SALVAGE PROGRAM STARTED

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To salvage several million feet of timber damaged this summer in the stubborn Bly ridge fire, the Weyerhaeuser Timber company is setting up a small mill at Bly and has disposed of the remainder of the damaged timber to other operators for immediate cutting.

H. J. McCoy, assistant manager for the company here, said that the small circular mill, which was originally used to saw timber for the large Weyerhaeuser plant here, is being set up at Bly and will soon be at work.

From two to two and one-half million feet are ahead of this little plant, which is expected to get an allocation of 525 hours for the current period under the NRA code. The plant is being installed on a site south of the Crane mill and on the railroad.

J. P. Kimball of the Weyerhaeuser land department, said that a program is under way to salvage all the timber in the burned-over area.

The Crater Lake Box company of Sprague River is taking out approximately 4,000,000 feet. About 2,500,000 feet will be handled through the Crane mill at Bly.

The Hovey-Walker interests, who own some of the timber in the fire-covered area, will take out about 3,500,000 feet for the Ivory Pine Lumber company, whose plant is on the Upper Klamath lake.

Ordinarily, Mr. Kimball said, this is the time of year when logging and milling operations begin to slow down, but fall fire conditions have necessitated a reversal of the usual situation and activities have increased in the Bly timber area.
