Mrs. Sallie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, with headquarters at Portland, met at the chamber of commerce Monday night with Mrs. Effie Garcelon, chairman of the Klamath county tuberculosis seal sale, and with chairmen of the various county sub-committees.

The local committees were formally organized and received information from Mrs. Dunbar regarding the sale, which is to start on December 1.

Mrs. Dunbar said that economic conditions are causing a slight increase in tuberculosis and state hospitals now have the longest waiting lists in years. Last year Oregon lost a patient a day.

She said that 95 per cent of the money received from seal sales stays in the state and only 5 per cent goes to the national associations.

The hearing on the new city budget will be held on November 27, it was decided by the city council Monday night. First publication of the budget will be on November 4.
