

Football Wolves Growling

Many Coaches Going Through Uncomfortable Periods. Three Uncertainties on the Coast. Lon Stiner Heads List of National Successes. Portland Game Third for Oregon and Oregon State.

This is exactly the time of year when "boards of strategy" and "downtown coaches" begin serious consideration of the man who heads the football team. It is a critical time for the coach, but if he manages to squeeze through he is safe for another season.

The life of many a football coach in the nation is quite miserable just now. There have been some notable disappointments, but at the same time there have been some very illustrious gridiron successes.

Students and alumni of three Pacific Coast conference schools have generated dissatisfaction. Stanford hasn't definitely settled on Tiny Thornhill for another year, Washington still has its difficulties with James Phelan, and California hasn't accomplished what it expected under Bill Ingram.

Lonnie Stiner has been the unexpected and delightful success at Oregon State college so far this season. Young Frank Callison hasn't done anything to blush about, for it's been years since the Webfoots rode at the top position of the conference and were listed as one of the nation's unfetted and undefeated teams at midseason.

No one will trouble Howard Jones and the University of Southern California, and Bill Spaulding at UCLA apparently is "giving satisfaction." Babe Hollingberry, despite a poor season after the Cougars had built up hopes of another championship, still has an abundance of support on the Washington State campus and among the alumni.

Howard Cann, New York university coach, is in difficulty. Cann came to the Violets after Chick Meahan, with his powerful but commercialized team, was removed. Now the alumni aren't satisfied with the parity when it comes with defeat.

Reggie Root is a new coach at Yale, but the decisive loss to the Army last Saturday and a previously poor showing failed to increase the popularity of this young man. The Yale administration will say Root will stay. The downtown coaches will say Andy Kerr of Colgate will be the next coach for Eli.

Eddie Casey at Harvard won't last another season if he fails to defeat Yale.

Over at West Virginia Head Coach "Greasy" Neale is expected to turn in his resignation on Thanksgiving Day. Don Henderson of Davis and Elkins—one of the top teams in the country this year—is a strong candidate for W. V. U.

Ohio State has its difficulties. Sam Williamson is pretty certain to leave.

The Hunk Anderson rumor started early in the season, and it hasn't been put down. Anderson has been a miserable season with the Notre Dame Irish, but it is fairly generally believed he will return in 1934.

Dr. C. W. Spears, the coach who couldn't win at Oregon, can't win at Wisconsin either. Doe has lost every important contest this year.

Matty Bell of the Texas Aggies hasn't been getting along very smoothly, and there is active talk against Jack Meagher at Rice.

Bill Saunders at Colorado and Jackson Cannell at Dartmouth, too, are listed among the discordant notes.

Young Gard Davison, the handsome, prematurely gray lieutenant, who guides the Army's football destinies, Jim Crowley at Fordham, Bernie Bierman at Minnesota and Dr. Eddie Anderson at Holy Cross, ride securely atop the football heap with successful teams. Each coach, too, is in first year at the present post.

Here is something quite contrary to opinion. Since 1905 Oregon has faced Oregon State six times, with an unbeaten record. In that same length of time Oregon State has entered the traditional game undefeated five times.

Usually football followers are content to recall that both the Webfoots and the Beavers were badly beaten in the south before the annual November classic.

There isn't much opportunity to discuss past Beaver-Webfoots games at Portland, for there have only been two. Back in 1908 Oregon won 3 to 0, and then the Beavers came back in 1917 to win 14 to 7.



GRANTS PASS PLAYERS OUT

Two Stars Benched With Injuries for Pelican Game.

The Cavemen of Grants Pass, the combination of football players defeating the Klamath Pelicans last season, were at work this week preparing reserves to enter the starting lineup against the Pelicans Friday afternoon. The game will be played on the Grants Pass gridiron.

Paul Neely, ball carrier, and Joe Hamilton, linebacker, will be benched for the Pelican battle. Both men were injured in last Saturday's encounter and probably will not see service for at least two weeks.

G. P. At Peak Dale Ginn, Cavemen coach, sent word to Klamath Falls this week his squad was in midseason form. Although Grants Pass was defeated by Ashland two weeks ago, it will rate almost evenly with the Pelicans.

Klamath will seek to avenge a two touchdown defeat in the valley last season. The loss to the Cavemen toppled the Pelicans from the list of undefeated teams in Oregon and eliminated them from the Southern Oregon championship race.

Both Defeated Neither Klamath nor Grants Pass are title contenders this season since both have been defeated.

A soggy field and a slippery ball greeted the Pelican team at the start of this week's practice. The squad will work through Thursday afternoon and then leave Friday morning for the valley.

This will be the first away from home game of the year for Klamath.

Manila Filipino Captures Fight From Japanese

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 1 (AP)—Coming back after losing the first and third rounds, Star Frisco, 114, Manila Filipino, outpointed Joe Tel Ken, 117, San Francisco Japanese to win the decision in the ten-round main event on last night's light program here.

Ken launched a body attack to take the edge in the early rounds, but Frisco's ring generalship could not be denied, and he won five of the rounds, including the last three. The other three rounds were declared even.

The Filipino shot frequent rights and lefts to Ken's jaw, and easily avoided most of his opponent's punches.

Johnny Higgins, 135, Salem, and Battling Nelson, 140, Walla Walla, went six rounds to a draw in the semi-main event, and another six-round fight, between Whitley Neal, 127, Portland, and Rosa Dumaguille, 126, Manila, also ended in a draw.

Max Maxwell, 174, Atlanta, Ga., knocked out Bud O'Neil, 175, Portland, in the second round of a scheduled four round encounter.

Rollie Westerman, 135, won a four round decision over Harvey Watts, 134, in the preliminary.

Ski Tournament For Northwest Named at Meet

SEATTLE, Nov. 1 (AP)—Meeting in Cle Elum, the Pacific Northwest Ski association, set tournament dates, and recognized slalom racing for Oregon and Washington this winter. Fred McNeil, Portland, president of the association, presided.

Dates are: Jan. 13-14—Spokane Ski Club, cross-country races and class A and B, jumping.

Jan. 20 and 21—Cascade Ski Club, Portland.

Jan. 27 and 28—Seattle Ski Club, cross-country events, slalom races and jumping.

Feb. 10 and 11—Leavenworth Winter Sports Club, northwest championships.

Slalom racing is a sport of spectacular downhill dashes between staggered sets of flags, and is incorporated in the program for the first time.

Cle Elum decided against holding a tournament this year—the first time in a decade the ski club has not presented an official meet.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 1 (UP)—A battered and bruised flock of Webfoots resumed practice here following their sixth straight victory by defeating U. C. L. A. last Saturday. Chief cripples were Bob Parke, punter and quarterback, who suffered a

wrenched knee, and Mark Temple, half, who suffered a dislocated shoulder bone, his third injury of the season. They may not see action against Utah here Saturday.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 1 (UP)—Bill Tomack, Oregon State right guard, will not play in the Oregon game Armistice day, but may see action against Fordham, according to Dr. R. L. Bosworth, team physician. Tomack fractured two vertebrae in the W. S. C. game last Saturday. His teammates took a light workout today. Stan McClurg replaced Tomack and probably will start against Oregon.

PULLMAN, Wash., Nov. 1 (UP)—Where to get two halfbacks to replace the injured Christofferson and Colburn and an end to fill Ron Kelley's shoes was worrying Babe Hollingberry as he resumed practice. Washington State meets Gonzaga Saturday. Phil Sarboe, quarter, was not badly injured in the Oregon State game and should see action against the Bulldogs.

SEATTLE, Nov. 1 (UP)—Out of the tough Stanford game without an injury, eleven Washington Huskies took things easy today while the bench warmers had their day on the scrimmage field. Jimmy Phelan has 11 days to bring his "iron men" to a peak for the California class at Berkeley.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 1 (UP)—Opening an offensive drive after a day of rest, the U. S. C. Trojans today were given several new plays in preparation for the game with Stanford Armistice day. Aaron (Rory) Rosenberger, guard and Curtis Vogel, center, recovering from bruised

received Saturday, were not in uniform, but are expected to report tomorrow. Alvin Coughlin was given the call at right tackle over Houston Harper.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 1 (UP)—The U. C. L. A. medical staff revealed that Phil Nordli, second string center, was out for the season, but Leo Costa, who injured his ankle in the Oregon game Saturday, is expected to appear in the Bruin lineup against California. After a long workout against California plays, Coach Bill Spaulding said he expected to use Teek Baldwin in place of Verdi Boyer at tackle.

SANTA CLARA, Calif., Nov. 1 (UP)—"Clipper" Smith, coach of the Santa Clara Broncos, was preparing an aerial defense for the "intercontinental" battle with Rice Institute of Texas in San Francisco Saturday. The Texas team, according to advance notices, is the greatest passing team in the southwest. The Clipper has perfected a defense which he terms "zone control" in an effort to halt the aerial attack of the Owls.

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 1 (UP)—California vs. California. For the first time in history two teams representing the same institution meet in a major gridiron contest. The University of California and the University of California at Los Angeles oppose each other Saturday at the southern city. "Navy Bill" Ingram, coach of the Bears, warned his team not to take the game

with the southern branch too lightly. Ingram was also cheered at the news that Floyd Blower will be ready to play against the Uclans.

PAULO ALTO, Calif., Nov. 1 (UP)—After a day of rest, the Stanford Cardinals started work in preparation for the forthcoming battle with U. S. C. The Cardinals meet Olympic club Saturday, but Tiny Thornhill believes his team can take the weakened clubmen with what he has, so this week's practice will be devoted to new plays to spring on the Trojans.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 1 (AP)—The much-discussed and oft-reported deal which would send Chuck Klein to the Chicago Cubs is revived by a statement from the president of the Phillies that the club must part with "some" players to aid its financial situation.

"We are forced to part with some of our players in order to get the necessary financial assistance to carry us through next year," said Gerald Nugent, although he insisted he has made no deals with other clubs yet.

The reports say Klein is slated to go to the Cubs in return for Mark Koenig, infielder, a pitcher, and a sizeable amount of cash.

Other reports have Catcher Spud Davis bound for the St. Louis Cardinals with Jimmy Wilson, Cards backstop, and another block of money coming here. Still another forecast being heard is that Dick Bartell would wear a Boston Braves uniform in 1934, and that an outfielder, a hurler, and some more cash would be sent to the Phils from there.

TOWNIES DROP GRID PROGRAM

Schedule Troubles Force Independent Eleven to Disband.

Lynn Roycroft, organizer and coach of the Klamath town football team, announced Tuesday his squad had disbanded for the season. The verdict to withdraw from competition came as a disappointing climax to a two-month period of training.

Roycroft wired Howard Hobson, coach of the Southern Oregon Normal school at Ashland, the game scheduled for Klamath Falls next Saturday had been cancelled.

Schedule Troubles The Townies were to play the Sons' super variety on Modoc field. It was billed as one of the outstanding contests of the season inasmuch as an Ashland team won so much popularity in its victory over the Oregon Freshmen here last week.

Inability to schedule games was the reason for dropping the football plans for the season. Managers of the Townies had contacted cities in Oregon and northern California for contests without success.

Townies Were Strong Chet Dunsmuir, The Dalles, Bend, Yreka and Eugene had tentatively promised to meet the Townies. Later, however, negotiations were terminated.

The Townies, in their third season of organization, had perhaps the strongest team of all the independent players and a host of ex-high school stars were included in the enthusiastic comment.

The Townies lost to the Klamath Pelicans, 20 to 0, in the single contest of the year.

Rosson, Lodell Deny Rumors of Ticket Shortage

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 1 (AP)—A report that very few tickets are available for the Oregon State-Oregon annual football clash, to be played in the Multnomah stadium here November 11, was denied today by Hugh Rosson and Carl Lodell, graduate managers of the two institutions.

Reserved seat tickets were being sold here today for seats between the 20 and 40-yard lines, the officials stated. More than 3,000 grandstand tickets remain to be sold, besides thousands of general admission tickets that will be placed on sale here the day of the game.

Stadium officials have announced that applications from all sections of the northwest, including every city in Oregon, have been received here.

Young Fighter From Arizona Wins in South

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 1 (AP)—John Henry Lewis, flashy young negro light-heavyweight of Phoenix, Ariz., was in possession of another ring victory today in his campaign for national recognition.

The 19-year-old gladiator was awarded a close 9-round decision last night over Frank Rowsey, Los Angeles, by Abe Roth, above the loud protests of 3,500 persons at the Olympic auditorium.

Lewis took the first three rounds as Rowsey stayed at a respectful distance, and then lost his advantage in the next four.

A wild tenth round, which saw Lewis drive his opponent from one corner of the ring to the other, rocking Rowsey with rights and lefts to the head, gave the negro the nod. Lewis weighed 174½, Rowsey 166½.

The squad will stop for two hours at Niagara Falls, N. Y., on Wednesday morning to work out, and will arrive in New York on Wednesday night.

Coach (Skip) Madigan pronounced the squad in fair condition, but would offer no prediction on the outcome of the game. Dartmouth Indians to Renew Struggle With Yale Saturday

Barker (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Nov. 1 (AP)—Dartmouth has been trying for 48 years to beat Yale at football, but Reg Root, youthful head coach of the Elis, declines to count solely on the operations of this famous jinx to keep the Indians from their first victory over the Blues this Saturday.

Instead he has subjected the Elis crew, so soundly trounced by Army, to a thorough shaking-up, and most of the changes may stick. The most important shifts involved the back field, where Tommy Curtin, hitherto used exclusively as first-string substitute for Bob Lassiter, captain and left halfback, was sent to quarterback. This scheme will put the Elis' two best ground gainers in the same backfield. Andy Callan retains the fullback post, but Jim Whitehead replaced Stan Fuller at right half.

Gaels, Rams Lead Dartmouth hopes for a better offense now that two injured backfield aces, Jack Hill and Sammy Fishman, are recovering. Although over-shadowed by the Fordham-St. Mary's duel at the Polo grounds, Colgate's clash with Tulane at the Yankee stadium will be watched with plenty of interest by Eastern followers of the game. That intercollegiate test should provide the answer to Colgate's rating this year.

Last season, after the Pitt Panthers had been invited to the Rose Bowl, Andy Kerr, Colgate's head coach, pulled a nifty when he described the Red Raiders as "unbeaten, unfetted, unscathed and uninvited."

Unbeaten Teams Play Now, with the 1933 campaign barely half over, the Red Raiders have been scored on by Rutgers, and tied, by Lafayette, and stand small chance of being invited to Pasadena. They're still unbeaten, but Tulane, Syracuse and Brown are all ahead.

Two of the East's undefeated outfits will carry their banners into the Midwest, with their records dangerously threatened. Holy Cross, with triumphs over Harvard and Brown in its string of five in a row, will be favored by a slight margin over Gus Doerflinger's Detroit Titans. Carnegie Tech, undefeated, but tied by Washington and Jefferson, will quite definitely be the underdog against Purdue.

Wiggin Describes Short Sales As Efforts to Delay Tax Paying

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Albert H. Wiggin testified to senate investigators today that the purpose of his large short sales in Chase National bank stock through a personal corporation in 1929 was to "postpone" tax payments.

Previously the retired chairman of the Chase bank told the senate committee he had paid income taxes totaling \$1,365,000 in the last five years.

Replying to questions by Senator Gore (D., Okla.), Wiggin said the short sales were to "produce buying power" and to reduce the family holdings in the stock, which he said were very large at the time.

Wiggin denied the sales were designed to "depress the stock," though he agreed it might have prevented the price from rising.

Ferdinand Pecora, committee counsel, asked if prior to the 1929 market collapse the price of the stock was "out of all proportion to its true worth."

"I didn't think so at the time," Wiggin said, "but it has so developed."

In response to questions, Wiggin said the sales were made to "postpone the tax."

Wiggin contended it was his right to use all possible deductions allowed by law.

Mack Believed Ready to Sell Athletic Stars

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 1 (UP)—Connie Mack, 70-year-old manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, told the United Press he had sold no players, but smilingly declined to deny that important deals were in the making.

These reported deals, rumored in baseball circles for several days, involved the sale of Robert "Lefty" Grove, ace pitcher; Gordon "Mickey" Cochrane, catcher, and Max Bishop, second baseman, as well as one or two other players.

When asked if he would be willing to part with any of these men Connie thought a moment and replied: "I don't want to put myself on the spot by answering that question. All I can say now is that we have not completed any negotiations."

Among the baseball fraternity there is a belief that Mack and Frank J. Navin, president of the Detroit Tigers, have already agreed to shift Mickey Cochrane to Detroit, where he is understood to be slated for the managerial post left vacant by Hucky Thayer.

Connie is understood to be asking for \$120,000 and catcher Ray Hayworth, while Navin is offering \$100,000 and a second string catcher.

Mack is reported dickered with both the Boston Red Sox and Chicago White Sox for Grove.

Meanwhile, it is regarded as virtually certain that Pitcher George Earnshaw, who had a stormy season with Mack this year, will be sold or traded, as will Pitcher Rube Walberg.

Oregon Geologist Passes On Tuesday

PORTLAND, Nov. 1 (AP)—Andrew Sherwood, 85, geologist and author, died at his home here Tuesday. The funeral will be held tomorrow in Grace Baptist church.

Mr. Sherwood was said to have possessed one of the largest private geological collections in the country. He collected fossils and mineral specimens for many state museums, and contributed generously to the Smithsonian Institute at Washington, D. C., Carnegie Museum in Pittsburgh, and the American Museum of natural history in New York.

Incidentally, he got some of the best results of the season as the players tried to outdo him in charging.

ANN ARBOR, Mich.—After surviving the rigors of football games against such tough opponents as Ohio State and Northwestern, Carl Savage, veteran Michigan guard, has been laid low merely by attending to his studies. Savage turned up yesterday with a badly burned arm, the result of an accident in the chemistry laboratory, and will not be able to practice before Saturday's game with Illinois. He is expected to get into the contest, however.

NEW YORK—When the Tulane-Colgate game was scheduled last year, the prospect was for a struggle between two of the nation's outstanding teams but now it looks as if they would have to play second fiddle to another game Saturday. Tulane has been beaten and Colgate tied, and the fans—at least as many as can get into the Polo Grounds, are turning toward the Fordham-St. Mary's battle.
