

PEA GROWING ADVOCATED IN KLAMATH BASIN

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for all kinds of livestock; that will build up our soils, and that will eventually bring a cleaning plant and an additional payroll in Klamath basin.

"Ever since my first visit to Klamath basin I have believed that the district would produce good quality and heavy tonnage of seed peas. During April and May last, I discussed the matter with quite a large number of growers in all parts of the territory, including Bonanza, Fort Klamath, Tule Lake, Merrill and Malin areas. In selecting seed I chose the 'Canadian Field Pea,' (the small, round, smooth pea which is most commonly used for cracked peas, pea meal and stock feed, either as silage or dry hay), and 'The Perfecter,' which is one of the most popular table and canning peas. These two varieties represent the opposite extremes of more than a score of widely grown pea varieties. It is generally understood that any district which will produce both of these varieties satisfactorily will produce any pea.

We had twenty-three plots, running from one-fourth acre to five acres-plus. Four plots, one at Malin, and one in Tule Lake district, were planted extremely late, and did not mature, although they both made good growth of hay for feed. The one plot at Fort Klamath was also planted very late, and almost totally destroyed by alfalfa. All of the other twenty plots came through splendidly, and produced an excellent quality of seed, and very heavy yield. Owing to the facts that the plots were small, and that the growers were not equipped with mower attachment and side sweep rack for cutting and combine attachment for threshing, there was some difficulty about harvesting and cleaning the crop. As soon as any considerable acreage is grown, these troubles can easily be overcome, as the necessary attachments are not expensive, and one outfit can handle all the fields in any district.

"I propose now to secure samples of seed from the various plots, and send them to some of the large seed companies. Many farmers who are considering the growing of considerable acreage next season, I would suggest that all who are interested call at my office so that we can make timely arrangement for seed, and have information as to what acreage will be planted next season. Those who have produced more seed this year than they want to plant next year should notify me, and bring in a fair sample so that I can assist them in selling it to other growers. The market price for next year's seed has not yet been established, but promises to be fairly good.

"I recommend that planting be done early in May. The quality of soil about determine the amount of seed to be planted, but speaking generally, I would recommend from 135 to 165 lbs. of seed per acre. Seeding should be done with an ordinary grain drill. Owing to the fact that weeds often thrive in pea fields, many growers close two of each three spots and plant in rows sufficiently far apart to allow for cultivation, the same as corn, or potatoes. It is not wise to ditch the field for irrigation, as that prevents mowing at harvest time. Flood irrigation is generally done with peas.

Attention will be paid to transient families, defined by relief authorities as a family that has not been in the state 12 months. TWO FLIERS DIE IN OCEAN CRASH

AVALON, Catalina Island, Cal., Nov. 2. (AP)—McFarlane Moore, son-in-law of the late Rear Admiral William A. Moffett, naval aviator, and George Baker, Long Beach, airline co-pilot, lost their lives today in an airplane accident a half mile offshore from here.

Walter Siler, pilot of the ship, was injured and brought to a hospital here.

No passengers were aboard the craft, which was headed for the mainland on its regular Catalina-Wilmington airlines run from the airport here, of which Moore was the director.

Cause of the accident was not immediately known. Observers on shore saw the ship was in trouble and boats were rushed out, but the craft sank before aid could be supplied. Bodies of Moore and Baker were recovered and efforts were started with grappling hooks to retrieve the plane from the water.

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from authentic sources. The governor has been working on his message the past few weeks and it was learned he will propose the legislature with definite suggestions backed by the request they be enacted.

Liquor, Relief Lead. While there will be numerous problems coming up to the lawmakers for solution, the leading ones will be regulation of liquor distribution and relief for the state's needy and unemployed. The governor's chief point in his message will deal with relief combined with liquor control, the latter with the Knox liquor control committee proposal as a basis.

The plan under consideration, following receipt of the reports of the governor's committee of 32, will eliminate any increased tax schedule other than liquor and the other taxation of a gross tax on utilities. Disposition of the suggestion made to the executive upon a gross utility tax has not yet been made, it was understood, but may be included to augment immediate relief needs.

Eight Million Needed. The committee of 32 recommended a sum of \$8,000,000 for the next 15 months as a minimum for relief needs. This would call for more than \$5,000,000 from the state, the balance from the federal government in match-fund. But since that time, Governor Meier will point out, other proposals, if adopted, would bring the immediate need down to \$3,000,000 as a minimum for the state. The other proposals include the requested \$15,000,000 for highway work, virtual assurance of \$5,100,000 for the five Oregon coast bridges, several millions at least for municipal and state projects in addition to the Bonneville dam.

Assuming the Knox liquor control plan, or a similar licensing provision be enacted it was estimated \$1,500,000 would be collected by the state annually, the governor's message will point out.

With this revenue as a basis, and a provision that the legislature empower the state liquor commission with sufficient authority, as can be done under the constitution, to issue certificates of indebtedness, the state could borrow the \$3,000,000 needed for relief without issuance of general obligation bonds or placing any further burden upon taxpayers.

America Makes Gold Purchase Plan to World

Making known the first step in the buying of foreign gold, Chairman Jesse H. Jones of the RFC last night announced that the New York Federal Reserve bank would pay for imported gold in RFC notes, with which the newly mined domestic metal also is also bought.

By this plan, it appeared the government has avoided direct dealings in foreign gold and exchange markets, leaving them to individuals and firms choosing to ship gold here.

Effects Studied. The effect of this upon world gold prices and the exchange value of the dollar and the pound, economists said, would be virtually the same as though the government were making the purchase direct.

American firms importing the gold, it was explained, would have to buy pounds or francs to pay for it abroad, thereby depreciating the dollar in relation to the British and French monetary units.

PARIS, Nov. 2. (AP)—France's determination to stand by the gold standard was insisted upon today in a ministerial declaration of Premier Albert Sarraut which was approved unanimously by the cabinet.

LABOR, BUSINESS DIFFER OVER NRA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2. (AP)—Louis Kirstein, Boston merchant, today was elected chairman of NRA's industrial advisory board succeeding Walter C. Teagle, of Standard Oil of New Jersey, retiring from the board.

Kirstein, an executive of the Filene company, has been with the advisory board for a considerable period and has been especially active on the national labor board in the settlement of strikes and disputes.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2. (AP)—Business sought today to forestall objections which labor might have to a new plan for following temporary NRA with a permanent set-up under which industry would govern its own affairs through a single unit and with a minimum of federal supervision.

The idea behind the plan had the support of Hugh Johnson, recovery administrator, who told newspapers:

"It's a kind of goal to shoot at if we can reach it." But the proposal, advanced by Gerard Swope in a meeting with some of the nation's leading industrialists, and then referred to a committee for study, made no reference to labor representation in the unit which would govern all business and industry through codes.

Labor, under the NRA, has obtained representation on many boards and councils, and even an indirect voice in the boards administering present codes. The recent American Federation of Labor convention voted to seek greater representation.

William Green, president of the federation, was reported out of the city as Swope explained the plan, but some of his friends said he was very likely to insist upon worker participation in the proposed new set-up.

Swope's proposal, briefly, would merge into an enlarged national chamber of commerce all the trade associations for industries now operating under codes. A board of appeals would act as supreme arbiter. The government would be represented on this board through presidential appointees; labor not at all, unless one of the presidential appointees, whom Johnson said would have absolute veto power, were a worker representative.

University Student In "Kidnap" Plot

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Nov. 2. (AP)—A reported kidnaping into a Rutgers university student tonight, which resulted in a statewide police alarm for the arrest of five men, was revealed by state police to have been a "college prank."

The abducted student, the United Press was informed at state police headquarters, was a columnist on the university newspaper, the "Targum." He was inclined to specialize in gossip items in his column, it was said, and a number of other students decided tonight to punish him.

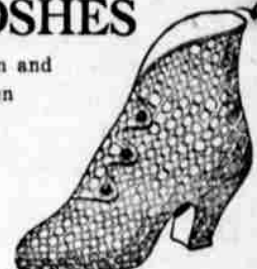
