

SLAYER TURNS GUN ON SELF AFTER ATTACK

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Nov. 2.—J. O. Bacon, 50-year-old Lake county farmer, yesterday killed his former wife with a shotgun and later blew his own head off with the same weapon.

The Bacoons were recently divorced, and with the divorcee decree came a division of the farm on which they had lived.

First Shot Missed.
Wednesday Mrs. Bacon was selling some grain to Charles Bateman, a neighbor. Bacon left his house and crawled through the fence built at the dividing line of the farms. He shot down his former wife as she was closing the grain deal with Bateman. Bacon then turned the gun on himself, but missed the first shot, which only blew his hat from his head.

He then re-crossed the fence, went to his cabin, and placed his head over the gun barrel. The discharge blew the top of his head off. Bateman called officers.

Mrs. Bacon was said by friends several times to have expressed fear for her life.

Three children survive the divorced couple. A son and daughter are in high school here.
