MOUNTAIN CRASH KILLS TWO FLIERS

MIDDLETOWN, Pa., Nov. 4. (AP)—Swept from the skies to a flaming death, two army fliers have been added to the roll of aviators conquered by Pennsylvania's mountains.

BOXING MAX HUMILES MICKEY WALKER

Champion Scores Decisive Victory Over Popular Bulldog.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4. (AP)—After 15 long years of toiling in the battle pits, Mickey Walker, the toy bulldog from Rumson, N. J., appeared to be very close to the finish of his fighting career today.

Mickey not only failed to lift the light-heavyweight crown from the head of Max Baer, but in his 15 round match at Madison Square Garden last night he showed more than ever the toll that time has taken. It was the second straight defeat for the one time ruler of the welterweight and middleweight classes. A few months ago he took a decisive trimming from Lou Brouillard who lost the middleweight title to Vince Dundee last Monday.

Mickey Does Best

Walker, perhaps seeing oblivion ahead if he lost, did his best all evening to catch up with the shifty Rosenberg and tag him with a winning wallop. But outside of a couple of good clouts in the first two rounds, a slashing blow that cut the champion's cheek in the eighth and a solid body smash in the eleventh, he got nowhere at all. His best was just to charge ahead in occasional rallies while Rosenberg danced around him, flicking in blows whenever he felt like it.

The referee and two judges couldn't agree very well on calling the rounds. Referee Eddie Forbes awarded Walker nine rounds and the judges, Charley Lynch and Jim Buckley giving Rosenberg 11 of the 15 bouts.

Max Fights Well

Rosenberg, who may occasionally drop a decision in one of his numerous non-title fights but always reaches the peak when his crown is on the block, rode the crest of the victory was all the way, cuffing and slapping in his usual way, he never seemed worried or troubled even when Walker put on a rally that brought back memories of the old Mickey. He kept the challenger off with smart lefts, stung him severely a few times with long overhand rights and took things easy in the clinches.

The crowd of 10,000, most of them cheering for an old favorite, saw few traces of the Walker who won the middleweight title from Jack Britton in 1922, moved on to take the middleweight championship from Tiger Flowers four years later and later became something of a terror among the heavyweights before Max Schmeling stopped him in eight rounds of their battle for the right to challenge for the biggest of titles. The old spirit was still there in the 32-year-old Walker but the speed and stamina were missing.

CONGRESSMAN AIRS THREE-C COMPLAINT

"Irrefutable evidence" that citizens conservation corps camps are being supplied with South American canned beef, many years old, is claimed by Walter M. Pierce, congressman in a letter received by the local chamber of commerce.

Pierce has received numerous protests from his district, part of an effort to secure an opportunity for local meat packers to bid on meat supplies for the camps, he indicated. He said he was investigating the matter of the tariff on South American meat, and that he is quite sure it was not inspected by the U. S. government before it was packed.

The congressman said he had been informed the war department and the agricultural department agreed on a cooperative plan with a view of extending the sources of meat for the C. C. C. camps. The bureau of animal industry is to inspect the plant of the local packer and if it passes inspection will report to the commander of the corps area of the army. The war department will then receive bids from the packer.

The packer requests the inspection of the nearest representative of the bureau of animal industry, and pays the expense of inspection.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 4. (AP)—A 51-yard sprint for a touchdown by Ray Woodman, ex-Portland high star, gave the Rooks a 6 to 0 victory over their ancient enemy, University of Oregon's Fresh, on Bell field here last night.

The lone touchdown came on a deceptive play that took an off-tackle smash as if Tom Swanson another Rook back, was carrying the ball and then sent Woodman through the line with the pigskin while most of the Fresh were chasing Swanson, on his fake dash. The score came in the second period and Swanson missed the try for points.

Fresh on 1-Yard Line

In the second half, the Oregon State Freshmen's six points looked to be hardly enough to win when the Oregon Beavers took the ball on a recovered fumble on their own 31 and marched 53 yards to the Rook one-yard line, but Wickett, another Rook half, smashed through the Fresh line on the fourth down and smothered the play for a two-yard loss, giving his squad the leather on down.

Sensational Passing of Sobrero Paves Way To Victory

KEZAR STADIUM, SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4. (UP)—Frank Sobrero's sensational forward passing paved the way for Santa Clara university's 13 to 0 victory over Rice Institute of Texas in an intercollegiate football clash before 10,000 spectators today.
