

THEATRE GROUP PREPARING FOR SECOND SEASON

Completing a selection of three one-act plays, which go into rehearsal immediately, the pioneering Little Theatre group swings into its second season.

A more closely knit organization and an increased membership to insure wider scope of activity are its primary aims.

Through the generosity of H. P. Bosworth, a vacant residence on Conger avenue is available to the group, and plans are in progress to furnish and heat the rooms through donations from individual members and patrons in order to provide a club house for activities and entertainment.

Season Outlined
After hurried preliminary searching of garret and basement a gala house warming was effected at the last weekly meeting, giving a hint of the vast amount of possibilities open not only to those interested primarily in dramatics, but also to the imaginations of collectors, decorators and arrangers.

In conjunction with the regular business routine of the weekly meetings, various members will present skits, sketches, studies and readings designed to combine alluring entertainment and constructive features during the season.

Definite study programs will be carried out by the group as a whole in order to gain a thorough understanding of specific productions, staging, and general methods of presentation, as well as the underlying problems of drama as it affects actors and the audience individually.

Ted McDonald, recently of St. Paul, has presented a discussion of the methods and accomplishments of an organized little theater movement in that city, in order to give the local organization several new working ideas.

Officers for the coming year include: Katherine Walton, president; Russell Andrews, vice-president; Ethelwynne O'Flaherty, secretary. Election of a business manager has been deferred until a later meeting. According to the officers, the one-act plays will be offered soon after Armistice day. They are: "Greasy Luck," "Moonshine," "The Impertinence of the Creature."

The entire group offers a cordial invitation to anyone who is interested in its type of activity. The widespread interest throughout the country in similar organizations signifies a definite comeback for amateur and semi-professional theatricals as they are worked out by and for the average interested person.

Henley Potato Grower Finds Unusual Spuds

J. R. Elliott, who lives in the Henley district, has brought to this office a number of potato oddities picked up while harvesting his crop. These oddities include potatoes shaped like the Siamese twins, a cream ladle, a bottle cork, a catcher's mitt, an almost perfect replica of a calf's head with a notched ear and a potato with a quack grass root grown entirely through it, showing the amazing penetrating power of these roots.

He brought also two perfect potatoes, one an unmarred No. 1 grade, the other just as perfect originally but showed damage done by machinery in harvesting, which reduces the grade.

Mr. Elliott has completed harvesting his 20 acres of potatoes, securing a yield of 5,000 sacks, or an average of 250 sacks to the acre. His crop, he says, ran all the way from 100 sacks to 400 sacks to the acre, the average being 250.

City Police Make Arrests For Liquor

Clarence Pyrellen paid a fine of \$10 in police court Friday, as did Sam Scilos, when he entered a plea of guilty to charges of intoxication. Clifford Hancock, Klamath Indian, was assessed a fine of \$20 or ten days in jail on the same count.

George Rillo, charged with drunkenness forfeited \$10 bail and Diana Daniels, negro, charged with drunkenness and possession, was released for hearing at a later date.

Grant county authorities are seeking relatives of Beron Scritchfield, about 51, who died at the Prairie City hospital on October 28, according to word received here.

TWO AMATEUR ACTS PRESENTED FRIDAY

been necessary to designate an additional elimination contest before the arrival on November 17, of Lon Mills and Bosco who will make final selections and be in charge of the final contest on that night. The date of this extra contest night will be announced at a very early date.

Camps Established In National Forests

The national forest service will have five NRA camps in Modoc national forest, northern California, this winter, according to S. B. Snow, regional forester. Insect control work will be the chief activity in the Modoc forest, with an allotment of \$45,000 for the winter's program. Truck trail and firebreak construction is also planned.

The NRA camp activities are in addition to the citizens conservation corps work.

COPCO MAKES LAST HALF TAX PAYMENT

The California Oregon Power company paid its last half tax payment Saturday amounting to \$71,200.52, which is one of the largest tax payments to be received by the tax collection department of the local sheriff's office.

The total property tax paid by the local power company this year in Klamath county amounts to \$142,402.87 which is over 3 per cent of the entire tax levy of the county. The \$142,402.87 which has been paid by the California Oregon Power company this year covers only the state and county property taxes paid by Copco in Klamath county and does not include various other forms of state and federal taxes.

Total property taxes paid by the California Oregon Power company in the State of Oregon this year will amount to \$342,785.52 according to local officials.
