RECOVERY CODE FOR RETAILERS INTERPRETED

Earl Reynolds, secretary of the chamber of commerce, has prepared an explanation of the NRA retail code for the information of the local public. It follows:

The code of fair competition for the retail trade went into effect on October 30 and will continue in effect until June 16, 1935, unless declared void by the president prior to that time. Prior to November 6 every retail establishment was to designate under which of the groups set forth in the code they elect to operate. Retailers under the code are defined as any individual or organization engaged wholly or partially in the retail trade. However, the code exempts retailers of milk and its products, tobacco and its products, food and foodstuffs, and the dispensing of drugs, medicine and medical supplies by physicians, dentists, surgeons, or veterinarians in the legitimate practice of their profession.

The four groups as established in the code are designated in accordance with the state working hours. Group A are the establishments whose store hours are 52 or over but less than 56 per week. Group B are the establishments whose hours are 48 or over but less than 52 per week. Group C are establishments who are open 44 hours per week and over. The fourth classification, Group D, applies only to retail drug establishments who may elect to remain open for business seven days a week for a total of 84 hours or more with no day less than eight hours. No establishment may change from the group so elected except upon December 31 of every year. The maximum hours of labor do not apply to outside salesmen, outside collectors, watchmen, maintenance and outside service employees. However, maintenance and outside service employees may only work six hours per week more than the maximum hours established for labor within the store, unless they are paid at the rate of time and one-third for all hours above such additional six hours per week.

The new code also calls for a drastic change in the definition of an executive and hereafter only one executive is allowed for each five or fraction of employees up to 20, after which an additional executive is allowed for each eight employees.

The minimum wages set forth in the code specify that the wages of all classes of employees shall be increased from the existing rate on June 1, 1933, by not less than 20 per cent provided that this shall not require an increase in wages to more than the rate of \$11.00 per week and further provided that no employee shall be paid less than the rate of \$10.00 per week. However, the Oregon state law superseding this minimum wage for women, the state minimum being \$13.20 per week. These minimums also apply whether calculated upon an hourly, weekly, monthly, commission, or any other basis, and the code further specifies that wages are not to be reduced from the rates existing on July 15, 1933, notwithstanding any reduction in the number of working hours of any employee.

There are many provisions regarding trade practices, price limitation increases, contracts, loss limitation provisions with which each merchant is advised to familiarize himself immediately. Copies of the code are on file at the local headquarters of the NRA in the chamber of commerce and advice will be given concerning it to those interested.

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RELIEF WORK OF RED CROSS HELPS SCORES

The Klamath chapter of the Red Cross, ready to join the nation in the annual Roll Call drive Armistice Day, plays a prominent part in the administration of relief assistance rendered to veterans in their various relations to the government.

There has been an important division of the Red Cross activities. More than 250 cases of this type were handled this last year.

Medical aid was furnished by the Red Cross to many persons and families without means.

This work included seven pairs of glasses, two tonsil operations, several single prescriptions, one pair of crutches, five hospital beds, one brace for hernia, taxi fares to hospitals such as the Shriners' hospital at Portland.

A small boy whose arm had to be treated after amputation was sent to the Portland hospital just a few days ago.

In preparing for the Red Cross drive, all manners of business and organizations have volunteered assistance. Governor Meier issued the following proclamation from Salem:

"The annual nation-wide Roll Call of the American Red Cross will be conducted this year from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day."

"During the past years when widespread unemployment has brought hardship and suffering in its wake, the Red Cross has met greatly increased demands and responsibility with cheerful courage and efficiency."

"I hope that every citizen of Oregon who can possibly do so will respond to this annual appeal, knowing that every dollar invested in Red Cross membership will yield a large return in service."

Christian Science

"Adam and Fallen Man" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, Nov. 5.
