FEDERAL HEARINGS SET FOR THIS WEEK
Three hearings are scheduled this week before U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas, in the cases of federal prisoners arrested here on charges of selling liquor to Indians.

Jahn Doherty's hearing was scheduled for late Monday afternoon. Benny Gardner and Lon Carter, charged jointly with the same offense, will appear Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, and Pat Murphy will appear Wednesday at 9 a. m.

Five other men, faced with the same charge, have waived preliminary hearing and have been bound over to the federal grand jury at Portland.

These cases grew out of a raid here a week ago, staged by Charles C. Hoskins, Bend, Indian officer at large. Hoskins made all the arrests in one pool hall here. The charges are based on an old Indian statute.

SHEEP SALE HEAVY IN SAN FRANCISCO

SO. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6. (UP)—Hogs: 500, including 400 direct; about steady. Few 173 lb. Californians \$5.15 top; package 177 lb. \$5.05; good 140-160 light lights \$4.90; few 120 lb. slaughter pigs \$4.25; packing sows quotable \$3.25 down.

Cattle: 475, including 60 direct. Partial clearance, steady and she stock about steady. Few loads medium 770-1022 lb. grass steers \$4.35-\$4.50; some desirable under 1000 lb. grassers quoted possibly \$5. Car 1065 lb. Californians \$3.75; very few weighty steers offered, bulk on sale plain killers, stockers and feeders. Load 852 lb. grass heifers \$3.50; car 973 lb. hold-over cows \$2.75; bulls weak to 25c lower, mostly \$2.75-\$3.

Sheep: 2650. \$2.75 active; early sales lambs steady to strong; asking higher in instances for shorn. Three decks largely sold to choice \$9-\$12 lb. woolled \$6.60-\$6.75; latter sorted 10 per cent; double deck woolled Nevadas \$6.50; sorted 10 per cent; deck 86 lb. shorns \$6.25 sorted.

Small supplies of Oregon onions were being moved out of the valley with growers selling small lots around 75c and sacks. Yakima situation was gaining strength gradually with prices here better maintained as a result.

James Fenwick of the James Fenwick Co., Brokers, told the Journal farmers believe they are going to get enough out of their beans to show profit. Northern Idaho simply will not sell.

Local cranberries have been advanced 19c box by growers with sales to retailers \$2.85 while best Eastern Howes are \$2.75 top for quarter boxes.

Household tomatoes were selling fairly well. \$1.50-\$1.75 crate, according to quality.

Household cucumbers were moving around \$1.50 box of 2 1/2 to 4 dozen.

First navel oranges of the season were due to arrive from California about November 15. New dates, the first of the season were due Wednesday to sell about 9c lb.

Caulliflower market was firmer and fractionally higher for shipment.

Celery carload orders were very liberal.

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National, Local Markets

FARM STRIKE REFLECTED ON PRODUCE MART

PORTLAND, Nov. 6. (AP)—Strike conditions in the Wisconsin sector continued the chief influence within the domestic cheese trade. The dumping of milk en masse to the cheese plants was so general, that little cheese is now being manufactured in that section.

The strike closed the farmers' board of Plymouth and no session was held during the last week. On the Wisconsin cheese exchange at Plymouth, prices were nominally continued with little influence upon the trade.

Butter Tone Weaker
Noted in the week's review of the trade was the greater withdrawal from the store at eastern points as a result of the scarcity of fresh make. This has been a very great aid to speculative interests although prices as yet have not been affected.

Market for butter reflected weaker undertone with free offerings of supplies of cubes below the values established recently by the produce exchange. Prices were reported being held up there to force the government to pay more to speculators.

Eggs Hold Up Well
Trading in fresh eggs was holding up fairly well locally with practically no change in the source with most supplies being that suggested storage, showed a badly mixed price situation.

General market was continued in the market on live chickens of all sorts. Reports suggested the price list established here was not being followed with some operators paying more.

Weak trading tone was showing in the market with considerable carryover of stale stuff from last week. Prices were weak to a fractional decline in spots. Hogs were steady with lambs holding up fairly well.

Potato Mart Better
Somewhat better potato market situation was reflected here as a result of tight holding at the source with most supplies being moved into pits and into warehouses. The biggest drawback here continues the fight between dealers.
