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National, Local Markets

OPEN MARKET DEALS LOWER AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Nov. 7. (AP)—There was no change in butter prices with the market for the product practically all open market transactions were at lower values.

That the government is about to enter the butter market was suggested by late messages from the south. Inquiries from California suggested the government was checking up on surpluses of individual owners here and that early action in buying will follow.

No Help Expected
That the government does not intend to be held up in regard to prices was also suggested and for that reason some holders have decided to take their losses as quickly as possible.

There was lack of general price change in the fresh egg market situation here, due to the increasing demand. However, storage stock was being offered at a very wide price spread.

Considerable aid has been given the cheese market generally by the strike of farmers at midwest points which has curtailed production at leading sources. Heavier withdrawals from stores were shown.

Good demand was continued in the market for live chickens of all sorts with prices maintained. Poor northern stuff was still the only detriment to securing higher prices here.

Calf Trade Slow
Slow trading tone was still suggested in the market for country killed calves. Prices were unchanged in all lines of dressed meat. Poor quality beef was still dragging.

Poor onions out of the Yakima section were hurting sales here for such supplies. Oregon stock was being asked for and some movement was reported around \$1.15 cental. Growers were obtaining 75c and sacks net.

Gain of strength was suggested throughout the potato trade here and at Pacific Northwest primary points. Buying was of better volume but in general practically no change was suggested in prices.

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LOS ANGELES SPUDS QUOTED AS STEADY

(Potato quotations from Oregon State college through county agent)

Carlot shipments of potatoes in the United States Monday totaled 485 cars. Oregon supplied 12. Washington 31 and Idaho 49. Maine shipped 153 cars and Minnesota 47. Loadings for the season to date total a little over 95,000 cars, which compares with a little over 79,000 cars during the corresponding period last year.

The market at Presque Isle, Maine, was dull Tuesday morning with No. 1 Green Mountains bringing mostly \$1.10 a hundred, sacked, in carloads F.O.B. shipping point.

At Idaho Falls the market was slightly stronger, with No. 1 Russets bringing mostly 30c a hundred, sacked, in carloads cash trade.

The Yakima market was steady. Prices were unchanged, with No. 1 Russets quoted at \$18 to \$19 a ton in carloads F.O.B. cash trade.

At Chicago demand and trading were moderate and the market firm. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought \$1.60 to \$1.70 a hundred, sacked, track sales carlots outright.

The Los Angeles market was about steady. Supplies were moderate and demand slow. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought mostly \$1.45 a hundred, sacked, brokers sales.

At San Francisco the market was steady, with No. 1 Klamath Russets selling to jobbers at \$1.50, while No. 1 Washington Russets brought \$1.30 to \$1.40 a hundred, sacked.
