

All-Americans Listed at Oregon, O. S. C.

Mikulak and Franklin First Serious Candidates Either School Has Offered. Both Webfoots and Beaver Often Neglected. Stiner's Rise Rapid One.

Many times in nearly four decades of football competition both Oregon and Oregon State college have produced men worthy of top positions on the most outstanding of the long lists of all-American selections. Years of obscurity have without championship have eliminated the Beavers and Webfoots from consideration. It is true a number of the men from the state's two largest institutions can be found hidden away among the honorable mentions. Not one, however, has gotten past the second team and only a few past the third.

Now this year the football world rather centers on Portland for Armistice Day. And when enough eyes are cast on the talents of the Orange and Webfoot squads, it's quite likely one or more players will find position on the best of mythical eleven.

Norman Franklin, the red-headed cymion, who blends beautifully into an Orange backfield, and Mike Mikulak, "Iron Mike," the fullback at Oregon, have become this state's leading candidates for all-American. There are no players on the coast capable of giving them a real race.

Looking through the honored past of Oregon and Beaver teams, it's not difficult to light upon some spectacular names. Johnny Beckett, Johnny Parsons, Bill Steers, Alse Cornell, Shy Huntington, Bill Morgan and Johnny Kitzmiller were overlooked when they were with the Webfoots.

Wes Schumelick, Jim Dixon, Cack Hubbard, Howard Maple, Vern Elfers, Roscoe Luce, Sherwood and Bob McKelip were forgotten at Oregon State. Each was a brilliant player possessing all the qualities making for all-Americans.

The more prominent the football team the more publicity for the coach. Lonnie Stiner, Beaver mentor, however, hasn't had an opportunity to catch up with the notice his team received after its tie with the University of Southern California.

Stiner, young man from Nebraska, who served as assistant to Paul J. Schissler, wasn't expected to "arrive" this year, or even next. He was regarded as something of a substitute until the athletic depression cleared away, and a nationally known coach could be employed.

He took a long shot and won. There isn't a coach in the country today who could fill his shoes at Oregon State.

The Beaver leader is but 33 years of age. At Lombard college in 1922 he was selected as all-star tackle of the Little Nineteen conference. He transferred to Nebraska in 1925 and 1926, and captained the Cornhuskers his final year. He was the tackle selection on the all-Big Six, Knute-all-Midwestern, and several all-American teams.

Stiner coached the University of Colorado track team and then transferred to Oregon State to join P. J.'s staff of assistants. He labored unheeded for eight years until his elevation after Schissler resigned.

Statistics are interesting. Since 1923 Oregon State has won 143 games, lost 96, and tied 26, for a percentage of .607. The Beavers have scored 3285 points, as compared with 1923 for opponents.

Since 1924 Oregon has won 156 games, lost 34, and tied 27, for a percentage of .650. The Webfoots have scored 3500 points against 1752.

Choice for Saturday's winners appear something like this:

Bend to defeat Klamath Falls at Bend.

Klamath Wildcats to defeat Medford Junior high school on Modoc field.

Oregon to defeat Oregon State at Portland.

University of Southern California to defeat Stanford at Los Angeles.

Washington to defeat California at Berkeley.

Washington State to defeat Idaho at Moscow.

Ucla to defeat the Marines at San Diego.

Gonzaga to defeat Montana at Spokane.

Webfoots, Beaver Players Excited As Title Contest Nears.

PORTLAND, Nov. 9. (AP)—There's to be a feature in the Oregon State-University of Oregon annual football clash here Saturday, that will be denied to spectators, though to thousands of fans this feature alone would be well worth the price of admission. It is something that cannot be seen, only heard, and just the players on the field and a few officials will enjoy this part of the contest.

It is something that all veterans of the gridiron remember for years after their playing days end, the repartee of participants in a hot battle. "Bunch of Sissies" No doubt it will start on the first play, something like this, as the Oregon line men talk among themselves as if the Orange gridsters were miles away instead of two feet. "Have you heard about those great 'Iron Immortals,' a human stone wall," Stanley Frye, Webfoot tackle, will probably say to Dutch Clark, Oregon guard. "Nope; never heard of them, but it sounds like a lot of sissies. If you're asking me, Clark will reply, 'Just about this time some ears will start to burn, and the play will start.'"

If Mark Temple, the Lemon-Yellow halfback, carries the ball and is smeared for a loss by a pair of State tacklers, the conversation between the two teammates is expected to be along this line. "I wonder if this could possibly be the great Temple, with big face in the dirt," and then the reply, "Why I should say no; haven't you heard that the great Mr. Temple is going to run wild against Oregon State?"

Devine Ready For Mike Clyde Frederick Devine, giant Oregon State center, will surely have his say, if he stops Mikulak on the famous "cruncher" play. "Well, well, here's the mighty 'Iron Mike,' who tears a line to shreds; my, my, what a marvelous ball carrier he is. How anyone could stop such a fullback is beyond me."

Woody Joslin, Beaver wingman, who has played such sparkling ball all season, is in for plenty of trouble when the university interference cuts him down. He is possibly will sound like this: "I can't understand why Stiner didn't start that speedy end that made the Trojans weep; he probably turned sissy just before game time," one of the blockers will say. The nonchalant reply will strike the Joslin ears. "No; he's in the game; why else is the fellow right here, the one we have been tramping over all afternoon." What Woody will answer had better be left unsaid.

Franklin Big Show Norman Franklin, the State's great backfield ace, will also come in for his share of the talk. "Where he is now," an Oregon man will say. "That's the 'Red Flash' of Oregon State." You know the one that's going to be an All-American. Well, he doesn't look one to me; in fact, my opinion is that he plays like an amateur, thus far he has only played like a rookie."

And so it will go, throughout the game. But there will be many of the players, in their last conference game, and at the finish, and in years to come you couldn't purchase their memories of this part of the game for pounds of gold.

Telegrams of Support Piled High in Anderson's Office; Burns, Ore., Sends Backing

By Paul Mickelson (Associated Press Sports Writer) SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 9. (AP)—The man who shouldered one of college football's toughest assignments when Knute K. Rockne crashed to his tragic death almost three years ago, broke his long silence as his wistful eyes peered out of a veritable pile of telegrams and letters on his desk.

But he didn't reply or attack his critics. Instead, he talked of loyalty—the loyalty of Notre Dame's alumni.

Telegrams Piled Up "These are trying days for Notre Dame football and for me," Coach Hearty "Hunk" Anderson spoke up, "but when I'm through with the game I'll never forget these."

He pointed to the letters and telegrams from all over the country in that pile, he continued. "They are proof that the greatest finest bunch of alumni that ever trod on a campus are those of Notre Dame. Kickers? There isn't one in a thousand! Instead of pointing out faults, these alumni of Notre Dame send messages of cheer and hope. 'Keep your chin up,' 'Don't let 'em get you down,' and 'we're all for you.' That's what those letters and telegrams say. And you can just tab it in your hat that they provide the inspiration of a lifetime to a fellow who happens to need some inspiration right now."

The "haunted man" of Notre Dame football leaned back on his chair, and a grin spread across his face. Call From Burns "What do you think? Last night I was awakened by a long distance telephone call. It was from a bunch of alumni at Burns, Ore. 'Keep your chin up; we're with you,' was their message. Another night I got a call from Atlanta, Ga., and from Chicago, New York and Los Angeles. Yesterday I got a night letter from a group of alumni at Peoria, Illinois."

"Even the kids are sending me messages of hope and confidence. Other letters come from fans, who never saw Notre Dame or a Notre Dame football team in action, I suppose, but I try my best to answer them all. Any that I missed, I want to thank you now through the Associated press."

A trifle sadder, perhaps, than when he hustled the big ramblers lines for Rockne as an assistant, "Hunk" is merely sawing wood

these days as reports and rumors of a change in the Notre Dame coaching situation stare at him in glaring newspaper headlines. He gets to his office around 9 or 10 a. m., answers his heavy pile of mail, and discusses plays with his players until drill time arrives. Then, as if Notre Dame were still undefeated, he bounces out to the practice field and does his best.

Three Straight Losses Notre Dame, blanked the last three games, expects another defeat by Purdue Saturday, but one would never guess it. The students, who turned out almost to the last man, to cheer the team last Sunday on its return from the Navy defeat, are excited, and plan the season's largest pep meeting Friday night. With favorable weather between 40-60 and 45,000 are expected, the largest crowd at Notre Dame since the memorable game against Southern California in 1931.

Schmeling Plans New Invasion of American Ring

NEW YORK, Nov. 9. (UP)—Joe Jacobs, manager of the former heavyweight champion, Max Schmeling, arrived from Germany on the liner Champlain and announced that Schmeling would sail for the United States on December 26 to launch another campaign for the world title. "Reports that Schmeling had decided to quit the ring because of his marriage to the movie star, Anna Ondra, are completely the bunk," Jacobs said.

Schmeling will open his American campaign at New York late in January against Tommy Loughran, King Levinsky or some other good heavyweight at the Coliseum, Jacobs explained. Then he will go to San Francisco to meet Maxie Baer in a return match there on February 22.

BILLY EDWARDS READY FOR ALL

Kansas City Man Seeks To Avenge Defeat At Bend.

Big Billy Edwards, restored to confidence after a victory over Ted Thye at Portland Wednesday night, will make his first stand in Klamath Falls Friday rated evenly with Al Karasick of Portland. Karasick, the Russian Lion, appears destined for his toughest match since he started his string of victories at the Legion hall.

Karasick Wins One. Edwards, giant from Kansas City, had his first experience with Karasick last Saturday at Bend. The bout was so rough it ended up in a free-for-all with the state police but Al, apparently as always, came out the victor.

Monday night Edwards trimmed Jack Kugat at Pendleton and then moved on to Portland to upset Thye. The two victories warmed him up for his second go with Karasick within a week.

Warren Meets Edwards. Roland Warren, Copco engineer, completed training early Thursday in preparation for his clash with Young Billy Edwards of Denver. The 45-minute semi-windup will mark Warren's return to the arena after several months in retirement.

Edwards, nephew of Billy Edwards the light heavyweight, appears here for the first time. Bunny Martin of Seattle will clash with Heine Olson of Portland in the curtain raiser. Olson lost a close bout here last week. The match will be for a half hour or to the first fall.

Huskies Seek Victory Over Golden Bears

SEATTLE, Nov. 9. (AP)—Eight years since the University of Washington Huskies "took" both Stanford and California in one season, Coach Jimmy Phelan heads south today with three full eleven, bent on beating the Golden Bears at Berkeley on Saturday. Already a 6 to 6 winner here over Stanford, through two field goals booted by Bill Smith, stellar Washington end, the Huskies were pronounced fit as they ran through a fast final practice. They were to train for the south at 4:02 p. m.

With 10 days of scrimmages against California formations behind them, and rested up because no game was played last Saturday, Washington was out to avenge last year's 7 to 6 trimming here. Thirty-three men will make the trip. Only one break in the line-up of 11 "iron men" who battled Stanford here appeared in prospect for Saturday's battle. Dan Lazarovich, strapping sophomore end, looked to have the call over Ted Markov, with Bill Smith still able to take care of the other extremity.

PULLMAN, Wash., Nov. 9. (UP)—Those ancient rivals, Washington and Idaho, who digest their studies in universities located but nine miles from each other across the Washington-Idaho border, will "have at it" Saturday, with Babe Hollingbery's Cougars the favorites. The Babe reported Ted Magness, stellar pass snatcher, and Stanley "Steamer" Colburn, hard-socking halfback, will be ready for action against the Calikanders. Both were injured against Oregon State and did not play last week against Gonzaga.

MOSCOW, Ida., Nov. 9. (UP)—Moscow the best chance in years to take into camp their arch-rivals from over the border, Leo Calland's Idaho Vandals, with Willie "Little Giant" Smith, sparking them, went through a stiff drill in preparation for the Cougar invasion. The Vandals are remembering that 9 to 8 loss sustained at Pullman last year and have hopes of humbling W. S. C. for the first time in several years.

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 9. (UP)—Gonzaga hopes to break into the scoring column Saturday against a coast conference team for the first time this year. The Bulldogs have drawn blanks in their games with Oregon, Washington, Oregon State and Washington State. Saturday they play Montana, a team which they whipped decisively last season. Coach Mike Peacovich experimented with combinations which would give him some weight in the backfield, instead of the "pony" combination which has counted but eight points all year.

MISSOULA, Mont., Nov. 9. (UP)—Coach Bunny Oakes drilled his team for a passing attack against Gonzaga Saturday. The Bulldogs have a sturdy line which has held leading conference teams to low scores all season. Blastic, halfback, was groomed to do much of the tossing.

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 9. (UP)—Coach Bill Ingram said that despite earlier hopes neither Chilly Bertoli, halfback, or Dave Meek would play for California against Washington Saturday. Floyd Blower, the Bears' best passer and a good ball carrier, was expected to see service. He was out of the U. S. C. game but played a few minutes against U. C. L. A.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 9. (UP)—With Aaron Rosenberg of U. S. C. still ailing, Coach Howard Jones moved Tony Beard, third string fullback, to running guard as understudy to Frank Williamson, who is expected to alternate with Rosenberg Saturday. In the last scrimmage for the Stanford game, the varsity easily ran through the Spartans using Indian formations.

Their losses to county teams have been close ones and the county leaders, Malin and Bonanza, have had exceptionally powerful combinations. Malin and Bonanza, the only two winners to defeat the Wildcats, tied for the county championship.
