National, Local Markets

SECRET PRICE SHADING SEEN ON EGG MART

PORTLAND, Nov. 9. (AP)—There was no change in butter or butterfat quotations today. Trading in eggs was unchanged insofar as top prices and quality were concerned. However, more or less secret price shading was again suggested in practically all grades.

Chicken Market Unchanged
Trade in the chicken market was marking time locally. Receipts continued of rather small volume but there was little pep in the buying with turkeys a chief competitor along with meat.

While the market reflected a steady tone generally for quality cheese and especially the better known brands, poor stuff and lesser known offerings were weak with more or less price loss.

Still better showing of strength was suggested in the cauliflower market as a result of increasing shipping call with sales as high as 50c on the car. Local is were therefore less plentiful.

Keen call was showing for celery at outside points with current orders still above ability to deliver. Prices recently were stretched a dime to \$1.10 crate at shipping points in carlots.

Cranberries Slow
Better quality Yakima onions out of store were being offered here and the price situation was therefore clearing considerably. Local onions were being sought but little was offering.

With offerings of eastern stock very liberal although there was little local supplies, the market for cranberries was ruling rather slow. No change was suggested in prices on quality stock.

OREGON SUPPLIES 11 CARS OF SPUDS

(Federal potato quotations Oregon State college through the district attorney.)

Carlot shipments of potatoes Wednesday amounted to \$59. Oregon supplied 11, Washington 24 and Idaho 111. Maine shipped 262 cars and Colorado 89.

The Presque Isle market was weak. No. 1 Green Mountains brought mostly \$1.05 to \$1.07 a hundred, sacked, in carlots, f.o.b. shipping point.

At Idaho Falls demand and trading were moderate and the market steady. No. 1 Russets brought mostly 90c to 95c a hundred, sacked, while in the Twin Falls Burley district the range was from 85c to 95c, sacked, in carlots, f.o.b. cash track.

On the Chicago terminal market No. 1 Idaho Russets met a firm demand at \$1.65 to \$1.75 a hundred, sacked, track sales, carlots outweight.

TURKEY QUOTATIONS SHOW REDUCTIONS

PORTLAND, Nov. 9. (AP)—Further reduction in the price of turkey producers and for resales, brought bids of leading buyers to 15 cents a pound for dressed No. 1 toms and hens at country points today. This quotation was set to producer, with 1 cent added for Portland delivery.

This price is from 2 to 3 cents below what was offered at this time a year ago. The condition is attributed largely to lack of speculative interest and to the fact that some of the previous liberal buyers in this territory now are getting their most immediate requirements at home.

One leading dealer said the eastern trade does not figure on anything that will net above 15 cents a pound for best stock here, and turkey growers appear in no mood to accept.

WHEAT CARRIED HIGHER SWIFTLY

CHICAGO, Nov. 9. (AP)—Soaring of gold prices, with British exchange at the highest point since 1914, carried wheat swiftly skyward today.

To the late dealings, wheat was up more than 4 cents a bushel compared with yesterday's final quotations. Trade was on a large scale, buying orders sweeping in from all directions. Aside from extraordinary monetary conditions, talk was current that unless the domestic movement of wheat increased from rural sources, mills would be forced to draw heavily on terminal markets for supplies.

Wheat closed buoyant, 28c to 4c above yesterday's finish; corn, 18c to 20c up; oats, 12c to 14c advanced, and provisions at a rise of 2c to 25c.
