

Oregon Can Be Tied for Title But Not Beaten

Stanford and U. S. C. only teams mathematically able to equal Webfoots' percentage. Mikulak, Franklin, Hughes real all-American material. Oregon center may not play against Trojans.

The unimpeachable results of mathematics won't permit an undisputed Pacific Coast Conference championship for the Oregon Webfoots unless they successfully put down Southern California at Los Angeles next Saturday.

If the Oregon team, now leading the coast as the only undefeated and untied team, should lose to the still victorious Trojans and the Trojans should continue to move through the season to defeat Washington, they would be tied at the close of the season. The Trojan's tie with Oregon State probably could be considered sufficient to place them below Oregon. But, according to the manner football percentages are compiled, the two teams would rank evenly officially.

California and Stanford still figure in the race. Oregon State, however, has completed its conference schedule and can't better its .667.

Both the Golden Bears and the Cardinals have two conference games. They oppose each other on November 25. One or the other will be eliminated, that is certain.

These percentage figures show definitely only three teams, Oregon, Stanford and U. S. C., can tie for the championship.

A number of befuddled football enthusiasts are attempting to estimate comparatively the value of Norman Franklin of Oregon State and Mike Mikulak of Oregon. These backs play different positions and are exactly converse in style. It would be impossible to offer a comparison.

Mikulak, perhaps, is more valuable to the Webfoots than Franklin to the Beavers. This is no fault of Franklin's. Mikulak shines more effectively simply because he has more help from his team mates.

Franklin is one of the best of the best players. He is better than the famous Howard Maple of Oregon State a few years ago. He is equal to the Webfoots' Flying Dutchman, Johnny Kitamiller. Perhaps he is even better than Kitz.

Southern California can't beat Oregon if the Oregon combination is playing at top form. There is more power in the Oregon backfield than there is in Southern California's. Oregon has the strongest line on the coast.

The Webfoots, however, have the malleable habit of going to pieces at Los Angeles and may be smothered hopelessly. Their ability to maintain their real form should be a test of greatness.

Oregon's chances will be seriously reduced if Bernie Hughes, center, is unable to play. Hughes is the coast's leading center and a key to the Oregon offense. Saturday he opened more holes for brilliant Leighton Gee and Mark Temple and the crunching Mikulak than any other man.

Swanson, Hughes' reserve, is a powerful player, but, of course, not quite equal to the man from Medford.

There were six men deserving of positions on the All-coast after Saturday's game. Three of them would look exceptionally well as all-Americans.

WEBFOOTS LEAD GRIDIRON RACE

Oregon, U. S. C. Clash Next Saturday For Coast Title

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13. (AP)—Down on the palm-studded, green-acred campus of Stanford they continued to celebrate today the 13-7 Cardinal triumph Saturday in Southern California that furnished far western football with its most spectacular upset of this season.

Up in the north Oregon rooters made the welkin ring as they re-fought the 13-3 victory over Oregon State that nailed the Webfoot banner a bit more firmly to the masthead of the Pacific coast conference.

Bears Celebrate
Over in Berkeley the campanile chimed seemed to peal out the glad tidings of a smashing 38-0 over Washington that brought California's Bears their first conference victory of the season after two ties and one defeat.

University of California at Los Angeles' Bruins followers congratulated themselves on a narrow 14-13 win over the San Diego Marines, which, while not of conference bearing, caused the Bruins to take battering that will not help in forthcoming conference tests.

Montana boosters were jubilant over the 13-7 win over Gonzaga, a non-conference team that earlier in the season held Oregon State to a scoreless tie.

Oregon Faces Troy
But to the principals of these victories or defeats, it was just another weekend of a 1933 schedule that has listed more reversals and upendings in the history of the great American college sport in the far west.

To the actors next Saturday's program was more interesting than the one that has been written into the records. On that day the conference championship will have to be determined when the last pigskin has been booted for the year.

Oregon, league leader with four victories and no defeats and only three points scored against it, travels to southern California in the hopes of duplicating the performance by Stanford that saw the Trojans defeated for the first time in 23 games, since early in 1931.

The Game Recalled
Although Oregon beat Oregon State 13-3 and Oregon State previously held Southern California to a scoreless tie, no Oregon booster is so rash as to predict a walkaway over the Trojan forces. The consensus is Southern California will be twice as full of fight as the result of the stinging defeat by Stanford.

The Trojans also will have the advantage of playing on their home field and in warm weather to which Oregon's Webfoots are not accustomed. The championship goes to Oregon if it wins.

Flushed with their great victory after five successive defeats by Southern California, the Cardinals of Stanford remain at home to take on Montana's Grizzlies. It is not considered likely, Bill Corbus, Stanford's sure shot kicking guard, will have to boot two field goals to beat Montana, as he did against Southern California.

California's Bears also entertain at home, meeting an Idaho eleven that last week lost to Washington State, 14-6. As California played Washington State to a 6-6 tie its chances of beating Idaho are considered good.

Starting from its bad beating by California, Washington will meet the Bears "little brothers," the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins, with hopes of gaining a partial revenge. On their home grounds at Seattle, where they beat Stanford, 6-0 two weeks ago, the Huskies should prove more formidable than their recent trouncing indicates. U. S. L. A. has not scored a point in three conference games.

Only a few conference games will remain after Saturday's heavy schedule is cleaned up. Oregon State has completed its conference play.

New President of Cincinnati Building Colorful Ball Team

CINCINNATI, Nov. 13.—One of baseball's colorful figures comes out of the bushes and into the big leagues with the advent of Leland Stanford "Larry" MacPhail to the presidency of the Cincinnati Reds.

Diary Dean, Art Shires and other headline boys of the playing field become mere zephyrs of personal exploitation compared to the storm of modern ideas and innovations continually perpetrated by this genius of the front office.

Considering his intimate knowledge of affairs on the playing field his baseball background seems singularly meager. He played ball at college, and for three summers in the Minor League, a now defunct Class D loop. Later he managed a semi-pro outfit at his home town, Ludington, Mich.

Larry went to college at Beloit, University of Michigan, Georgetown, and George Washington, taking his law degree at the latter. He played first base at Beloit for one year and two at Michigan. He played quarterback and fullback at Beloit and Georgetown.

After that he practiced law and was a sales manager for a tool manufacturing concern in Chicago, moved to Nashville to become president of a dry goods store and, after the war, came to Columbus, O., where he was an automobile distributor and a builder.

He came back into baseball when he purchased the Columbus club from the Cincinnati Reds in 1930. At that time Columbus had gone 26 years without a pennant and had been a second division outfit for 15 consecutive seasons. In the last 15 years its various owners had lost \$300,000.

MacPhail sold his club to the St. Louis Cardinals because they had the most players to offer him. He held the Columbus presidency, but transferred his stock to St. Louis.

During that first season they said MacPhail had three teams operating—one playing, one going and another one on the way. Columbus finished fourth and made money. More than 75 players

Chicago Bears Meet Reversals In Drive for Football Titles

CHICAGO, Nov. 13. (AP)—Slipping back with a defeat and one tie in their two engagements in the East, the Chicago Bears felt their lead falling in the national professional football championship race today.

The Bears were surprised yesterday as the Philadelphia Eagles threw up a hard defense and then gained a 3-all tie in the final period as Guy Turnbull, former University of Mississippi star, booted a goal from placement. A crowd of 18,000 saw the game, which brought the Bears' season record to six victories, one defeat and one tie.

Portsmouth stuck in the championship race by turning back the once powerful Green Bay Packers, 7 to 0, before a crowd of 9,000. Ernie Cappel, formerly of Stanford, carried the ball over for the touchdown in the third period, and Glen Prescott of Nebraska, famed added the extra point.

In a memorable game for the late Major Frank Cavanaugh, war hero and college coach, the New York Giants defeated Boston, 7 to 0, before 30,000. Harry Newman threw a pass from the 15-yard line and Cliff Battles knocked the ball down, only to have "Bo" Molenda grab it and score the only touchdown of the game.

Secretary of War Dorn, it was said Friday at the office of Congressman Ed R. Burke, Athletic Director Washburn of the military academy has definitely refused to sanction a game on that date. It was said, but Burke's office said Secretary Dorn might order it, anyhow.

Dorn is a former member of a Nebraska football team and is heartily in favor of the benefit game, it was said.

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OREGON BIDS FOR PASADENA

Northwest Leading Coast Candidate For Annual Grid Classic

PASADENA, Calif., Nov. 13. (AP)—While the potential Eastern Rose tournament football candidates continued undisturbed by defeat, a possible Pacific Coast defender had popped up in the Northwest today in the form of Oregon.

While the green-garbed grid-sters from Eugene, Ore., as the lone unbeaten member of the Pacific Coast conference as well as of the western slope, held the inside track today, there was some question as to the chance of their holding the positions after next Saturday, when they clash with Southern California at Los Angeles.

A victory for the Trojans, whose string of 27 games without defeat was broken by Stanford, would throw the situation into a jumbled mass with Southern California, Oregon, Oregon State, Stanford and California, all with one defeat against them, in the running.

The only possible change in the eastern, middle west or Southern sectors was the indication from several sources that a Big Ten team had no more chance than last year in gaining permission to participate in the January first game.

Army, a probable first choice, and Princeton, equally as enticing a grid morsel to the Rose Tournament association, remained unbeaten. But there were barriers in the way for either team. Duke and Georgia moved along unmolested in the Southland, but Georgia plays in Los Angeles December 2 against Southern California, which appeared to balk any chances of the Bulldogs playing in the same vicinity twice in 30 days.

Back to the Middle West. Nebraska, newly crowned Big Six champion, was looked upon with more than passing interest. The Cornhuskers undoubtedly will get even more attention should they handle Pittsburgh and Iowa successfully in the two remaining games.

C. P. S. Captures Football Honors For Northwest

SEATTLE, Nov. 13. (AP)—College of Puget Sound clinched at least a tie for the Northwest conference grid title by handling the College of Idaho a 54-12 trouncing at Tacoma Saturday in the only conference game of the weekend.

The Loggers swamped their opponents from the opening kickoff, piling up 41 points in the first three periods and holding the Idahoans scoreless. Puget Sound reserves added two more touchdowns in the final period, but allowed the visitors to ram the ball over for a like number of scores.

Pacific University remains as the only obstacle between the Loggers and undisputed possession of their second consecutive championship. A win next Saturday at Forest Grove, Ore., will put them out of reach of the other teams in the league.

Two other conference tussles were slated for the coming weekend. Albany meeting Williamette at Salem Friday, and Whitman journeying to Caldwell, Idaho, to tangle with College of Idaho Saturday.

The Lions, making five first downs to their opponents two, displayed superior offensive power in the contest at Kezar stadium yesterday before 5,000 fans, but were unable to cross the Dons' goal.

Several times the invaders, who lost to the Dons' 27-4 last year, were in striking distance. Two attempted place kicks failed, however, and in the final quarter Sherry's pass from the San Francisco 21-yard line fell incomplete in the end zone.

Eddie Atkinson, replacement half back for Loyola, kept the Dons in trouble with the exceptional punting.

Undefeated Grizzlies Candidates For Championship

The Klamath Falls Pelican will be pitched against another undefeated intercollegiate football team on Modoc field Friday when they play the Ashland Grizzlies.

The contest will close the Modoc field season and bring the Pelican schedule to an end for 1933.

Ashland Tied
The only unfortunate feature of the Ashland schedule this season was its scoreless tie with little Crescent City Saturday afternoon. The Grizzlies battled and held the same eleven successfully defeating the powerful Medford Tigers, 7 to 9, earlier in the year.

The Pelicans, out of the running for the Southern Oregon conference title after their touchdown loss to Medford here a few weeks ago, will offer vigorous competition to the Grizzlies. Ashland has never yet beaten the Pelicans under the present coaching staff.

Pelicans Beaten
The valley team, along with Medford, is a favorite to win the championship. Medford and Ashland will meet later this month.

The Pelicans were back in Klamath Falls Monday after their one-sided 30 to 0 loss to the Bend Lava Bears last Saturday. It was the largest score piled up against a Klamath team in almost three years.

The game marked Klamath's third successive loss to Bend.
