

Coast Teams Re-Discover Field Goals

Three Games Won in Conference by Placements This Season. Huskies Take Stanford With Kicks and Stanford Takes Ucla and U. S. C. Oregon Leads Nation's Teams. Bill Reinhart III At Eugene. Grid Leaders Surveyed.

Something so old and forgotten it immediately becomes an innovation has been developed in the Pacific Coast conference this season. It's the place kick with its important and rarely considered three points. Closest home, of course, was the Tar Schwanmiller's magnificent boot in the first period against Oregon at Portland last Saturday. It was a kick as straight and true as an arrow, and gave the Beavers a quick advantage over the Webfoots. It might have been the turning point of the game had Oregon not quite so much power. It at once turned the psychology of the struggle in favor of Oregon State.

Oregon State might have scored a touchdown if it hadn't recalled the power of the place kick. But a touchdown was a gamble, and with Schwanmiller dropping out of line into the backfield, a three-point goal kick appeared pretty certain.

It was an intelligent piece of strategy, and might have brought victory.

Washington, that hopeless "in-and-out" team, defeated Stanford with placements. Two of the kicks were successful, and the Cardinals, conquerors of Southern California, were turned back for their first conference loss.

Bill Corbus, Stanford's all-American linebacker, is almost individually responsible for two Indian victories. This young giant thumped one over against Ucla early in the season, and the three points were exactly the margin of the Stanford victory.

The Stanford triumph over the late national champions, Southern California, was built up on two field goals, one touchdown and a conversion. Had any one of these three kicks failed the Trojans still would be undefeated, and Stanford unhappy in its sixth consecutive loss to men of Troy.

There have been countless incidents of football games won with field goals this year. It is a habit most football coaches would find advantageous in cultivating among his players.

Now this is Tuesday, we come again to the compilation of undefeated and untied football teams, and now the Oregon Webfoots gleefully discover themselves the leading team in the nation.

How long it will last depends entirely upon Oregon's ability to defeat two of the most difficult teams in America, Southern California and St. Mary's.

There are just 17 such teams in the United States, for no team playing less than three contests has been honored with inclusion in the charmed circle.

Many of the teams it is well to recall, have no rating among the "big eleven." So, considering the chaff must be removed, only Oregon, Army, Duke, Georgia, Princeton, Michigan and Nebraska remain.

Of these eastern and mid-western eleven, Princeton is by far the most interesting.

The Tiger of the East, once one of the country's most formidable eleven, has suffered a terrific decline in the post-war football era. It rather became a tame little house cat.

But Fritz Crisler, student under Alonzo Stagg at Chicago, brought about this revival. Crisler is in his second year at Princeton, coming directly from Minnesota. Previous to his Minnesota post he was backfield star and mentor at Chicago University.

The Tigers have swallowed six opponents, and remain as the only major outfit unscathed upon.

JONES REBUKES TROY WARRIORS

Southern Cal. Players Shifted for Oregon Game Saturday.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 14. (AP)—One man had been ordered off the varsity squad and two others were demoted today as Coach Howard Jones collected his Southern California football remnants together to begin all over again.

Johnny Dye, senior second team center, was told to turn in his suit because of failure to live up to training rules. Homer Griffith, quarterback and fullback, and Gordon Clark, blocking halfback of the first eleven, were set down to the third eleven.

There was no secrecy about the fact that Coach Jones was disgusted with the way his team performed against Stanford Saturday.

"We were outplayed, outthought and outconditioned by Stanford," the head man told his players. "I have accordingly made changes which are likely to stick for a long time to come."

"I am making these changes because some of our older players have become self-satisfied and are therefore of less value to the team than those who are still seeking to improve."

"Now that our winning streak has been broken we can start from the ground up and that's what I intend to do."

So as the Trojans went into their second day of practice for their game with the Oregon eleven, conference leaders, here Saturday, the first team lined up as follows:

Bescoe, left end. Erskine, left tackle. Rosenber, left guard. Yonel, center. Stevens, right guard. Harper, right tackle. Palmer, right end. Warburton, quarterback. McNeish, left half. Clemens, right half. Probst, fullback.

There was some question of whether Bob Erskine would be able to play even against Oregon here Saturday, in which case, Bright probably will go back to tackle. Haskell Watkins is expected to be able to play however. He has been out since the Oregon State game.

Pacific Coast—Oregon can clinch the title by beating Southern California. A victory over the Trojans might assure the Webfoots of participating in the Rose Bowl classic for the first time since 1920. If Oregon loses and Stanford beats Montana, Oregon will still lead, but Stanford will be a dangerous contender, with the Trojans still in the running. California plays Idaho and Washington meets U. C. L. A.

Rocky Mountain—Utah leads the conference, with Denver and the Colorado Aggies still menacing. The Utah Utes and Denver collide Saturday, while the Aggies have an open date. Colorado college meets Colorado Mines and Utah State plays Brigham Young.

Southern—Duke, South Carolina and North Carolina are still unbeaten and untied in conference games. Duke and North Carolina battle it out at Durham, while South Carolina tackles Furman on the outside. Virginia plays Virginia Poly.

Southeastern—Unbeaten and untied Georgia heads the conference, although Alabama is a menacing contender. Georgia meets Auburn, while Alabama tangles with Carnegie Tech.

Southwest—The pace-setter, Arkansas, was upset by Rice, leaving Texas in a threatening position. Arkansas meets Hendrix outside while Texas may be the lead by beating Texas Christian. Rice meets Texas A. & M. and Baylor tackles Texas Tech on Friday.

Big Ten—Michigan can nail down its fourth consecutive crown by downing Minnesota Saturday, and at the same time, Iowa defeats Purdue. After Iowa's showing against Michigan, and Purdue's power display against Notre Dame, both games should be hammer and tong affairs.

Bernie Bierman's Gophers are expected to be the Wolverines after a week's rest. Other Big Ten games bring together Illinois-Chicago, and Wisconsin-Ohio State. Northwestern tries to give Notre Dame its fifth straight defeat and Indiana meets Xavier.

Missouri Valley—Oklahoma A. & M. can tie up the title by defeating or tying Creighton. The Aggies eliminated Drake with a 21-0 beating last week.

East—The two eastern leaders, Army and Princeton, meet Pennsylvania Military and Navy, respectively, and neither appears likely to have its perfect record shattered. Accordingly eastern interest is centered on the two big inter-sectional clashes in which Nebraska makes its bid for national honors against the Pitt Panthers at Pittsburgh, and Oregon State's invasion of the Fordham Rams at New York.

Game Commission Discounts Stories of Wanton Killing Of Eastern Oregon Elk Herd

PORTLAND, Nov. 14. (AP)—The conclusion that wanton destruction of elk during the opening season in Eastern Oregon was "greatly exaggerated" has been reached by the state game commission.

The commission, which conducted an investigation in Union, Wallawa, Baker and Emmet counties, said it found, on the contrary, that hunters who participated in the three-day shooting "upheld in practically all instances the finer traditions of the sportsman."

Facts Not Presented. The report of the investigation was made at the regular monthly meeting of the game commission here Monday.

"Wild stories regarding the wholesale slaughter of domestic cattle during the open season are without foundation in fact," the investigating group further reported.

"A thorough investigation has failed to reveal a single case of the killing of domestic livestock during the elk hunting season," "Sentiment rather than facts have colored the early reports on the recent elk season," the commission concluded.

The report stated that contrary to affidavits filed by residents in the open area, "there was no excessive waste of elk meat."

Some of the affidavits accompanied officers into the area and their statements were found to have been erroneous, the commission said.

The report did point to some unfavorable conditions and circumstances, however. These included the following observations:

"Some hunters used guns of too small caliber."

"Many hunters were inadequately prepared to care for carcasses of bull elk when it was killed."

"Extremely high temperatures reaching 70 degrees were recorded during the three-day open season. These high temperatures complicated the situation and made it most difficult to care for the meat."

"Few Make Kills. Most of the bull elk were not in as good condition during the open period as they would have been at a later date."

Some conclusions reached by the commission report include the statement that "experience dictates that a joint season between elk and deer is not desirable in that section. It future open seasons are declared on elk they should be separate and later than the present season on mule deer."

"Ample checking stations should be located in the hunting territory to insure that adequate facilities for caring for meat are provided and to properly inspect and tag meat when it is killed."

The commission further held that "reports that the elk were as tame as cattle and that shooting them was unimportant, were not sustained by facts. Due to the concentration of hunters, a few lucky shots were reported, but most sportsmen had to hunt diligently and less than 20 percent of the hunters were successful in making a kill."

FORDHAM RAMS AWAIT BEAVERS

Oregon State Eleven En Route to New York For Big Game.

(AP)—The Fordham Rams and the Pitt Panthers, whose schedules annually give them a large share of the task of upholding eastern football prestige in inter-sectional games, stand by again this week to repel invaders of no inconsiderable power.

Fordham, victor over Alabama but beaten by St. Mary's Gaels, winds up a highly successful season against the Beavers of Oregon State. Pitt, beaten only by Minnesota and conqueror of Notre Dame and Centre from other sections, hopes to add Nebraska's undefeated and united Cornhuskers to the list.

Rams Want Revenge. Fordham wants revenge on the far west for that St. Mary's defeat and may set it at Oregon State's defense but Jimmy Crowley will be ready for the closest kind of a battle. Lon Stiner, in his first season as head coach, has developed the Beavers into a formidable array of "iron men."

Their only defeat so far came last week when they dropped a 13-3 decision to Oregon's unbeaten and untied outfit, heir-apparent to the Pacific coast throne.

The Beavers' feats of endurance have aroused widespread interest not only in the far west but throughout the country. They used only 11 men in holding Southern California to a scoreless draw and made only one substitution in a hard-fought 12-7 victory over San Francisco and only one when they nosed out Washington State, 2-0.

O. S. C. Lost in 1932. Saturday's game will mark the third New York appearance of an Oregon State team. The Beavers of 1932 laced New York University, 25-13. Last year they were nosed out by Fordham, 8-6.

Although Nebraska travels eastward with a perfect record and its championship Big Six championship safely stowed away the Cornhuskers probably will be conceded no better than an even chance against Pitt. There will be two reasons for that: First, some doubt as to the quality of the opposition through which the Cornhuskers have paraded so far; second, the fact that Nebraska's teams have had little luck against Pitt since the schools part their football relations on an annual basis in 1927.

Nebraska, in fact, hasn't won a game from the Panthers in that time although the games of 1929-30-32 ended in scoreless ties. Pitt won 21-13 in 1927, 12-7 in 1928, and 40-0 in 1931. This is another odd year and precedent calls for a Panther victory.

Nebraska can take considerable cheer out of the fact, however, that this has been a poor year for precedents.

Purdue Powerful. Talking about precedents calls attention to the fact that Purdue still is going strong, unbeaten in 20 games and unwhitewashed in 46. Nobody's whipped the Boiler-makers since Wisconsin earned a 21-14 triumph early in 1931 and nobody has shut them out since Minnesota won, 15-0, in the second game of the 1923 campaign.

Since then, Purdue eleven have scored 359 points against the opposition's 212 in hanging up 39 victories and three ties against only four defeats. Three of those reverses were by one point margins.

With Iowa and Indiana yet to face this year, the Boiler-makers seem certain to carry their long streak into 1934.

Nebraska Bids For Rose Bowl

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 14. (UP)—Nebraska university, football champions of the Big Six, and undefeated in 13 games, will make a bid for a Rose Bowl invitation and national recognition when it invades the stronghold of the Powerful Pittsburgh Panthers this week end.

The game will be the crucial test of the strength of the mid-western eleven.

Since Nebraska and Notre Dame have severed athletic relations, the Pittsburgh game has become the climax of the Cornhusker schedule. Pittsburgh is the scene of Nebraska's most brilliant victory and most humiliating defeat.

Billy Reinhart III At Eugene

EUGENE, Nov. 14. (AP)—William Reinhart, coach of basketball at the University of Oregon, was in a hospital today for treatment of neuritis, believed caused by an old football injury.

Reinhart's condition was slightly improved last night, his physicians said, but it was decided to make X-ray pictures to determine the extent of the trouble.

Coach Reinhart has been confined to his home for the past 10 days.

Midget Wolgast Draws in Paris

PARIS, Nov. 14. (UP)—Midget Wolgast of Philadelphia, recognized as world flyweight champion in New York and affiliated with Valentin Anglemann of France, Wolgast's title was not at stake, as both entered the ring over the 112-pound limit. Wolgast scaled 114; Anglemann 115 pounds.

PALO ALTO, Calif., Nov. 14. (UP)—All manner of noise-making devices created a din that was heard for several miles Monday, as Stanford welcomed home the football team which beat U. S. C. last Saturday by a 12 to 7 score.

Even the revered Stanford totem, usually reserved for a big game victory over California, was hauled from the moth balls to add its boom to the celebration.

Team members and coaches were placed in two hay wagons and hauled from the depot to the university chapel by horses decorated in Trojan colors.

Old timers in Palo Alto declared the celebration eclipsed any outburst of collegiate joy for years.

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 14. (UP)—Coach "Navy Bill" Ingram gave the California football team a rest after its display of power Saturday in defeating Washington 21 to 0. Ingram also declared Tuesday a holiday as far as football is concerned. The Bears play Idaho this Saturday, and next week end meet Stanford in the "big game."

SANTA CLARA, Calif., Nov. 14. (UP)—Declaring his only hope of victory over St. Mary's Sunday is by air, Clipper Smith started polishing Santa Clara's forward passing attack. Santa Clara had no game last Saturday.

MORAGA, Calif., Nov. 14. (UP)—Coach Slip Madigan set the St. Mary's football team down to intensive practice sessions. The Gaels had a narrow squeeze Saturday, eking out a 7 to 0 win over College of Pacific.

PULLMAN, Wash., Nov. 14. (UP)—Washington State faced two weeks of preparation for the annual "big game" with University of Washington to decide the championship of the state. The Cougars came through the close Idaho game in good shape, but are apprehensive about upholding their record of never having lost a game on their home field.

In 1929, the last year Washington went to Pullman, the Huskies held a 14 to 0 lead at the half, only to lose out subsequently to the Cougars, 19 to 14.

MOSCOW, Idaho, Nov. 14. (UP)—Hearstened by the fact they outlasted their rivals from over the border—Washington State—last Saturday, even though they lost 14 to 6, Leo Calland's Idaho Vandals prepared for their California invasion Saturday. The confident and fiery Vandals are hoping for their second conference victory—pointing out they nearly defeated the Cougars, who tied California recently.

"Little Dynamite" Smith, diminutive, elusive quarterback, is expected to carry the brunt against the Bears.

SEATTLE, Nov. 14. (UP)—There was little joy in Huskytown, as Washington prepared to play U. C. L. A. Little brothers of the club which lambasted Washington's football boys 33 to 0 last Saturday.

Grizzlies Hope to Wipe Out Four Successive Defeats.

The Ashland Grizzlies, overburdened with confidence, come to Klamath Falls Friday afternoon to seek their first victory over the Pelicans in three seasons of competition.

Ashland's scoreless tie with Crescent City last Saturday can't be judged as an accurate estimation of the Grizzlies' power. Ashland outplayed and outplayed the Northern California team, and frequently was stopped just short of the goal.

Grizzlies Favorite. Comparative figures, however, list the valley squad as a distinct favorite over the Pelicans. Klamath lost to Medford, 7 to 0; Medford lost to Crescent City, 7 to 0; and Ashland tied this team defeating the Tigers.

Not in two seasons under the present coaching regime at the Klamath high school have the Grizzlies beaten the Pelicans. The Pelicans won two games in 1931 and two more last season. This series of four successive defeats has been sufficient to stir the Grizzlies.

Ashland Undefeated. If Klamath can halt Ashland, an undefeated team will be tumbled from the list of contenders for the Oregon interscholastic title.

The Pelicans, a little bewildered after their 30 to 0 defeat at Bend Armistice Day, turned to practice again Tuesday. The Ashland contest will be the final one of the season.
