BUTTER, EGG TONES EASY AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Nov. 15, (AP)—Market on butter was about as steady as it has been here recently. Undertone really continued easy, but quotations on the exchange were held.

Trading in the egg market was quite easy, but established prices were unchanged for fresh offerings during the day although many sales continued at shaded figures for both fresh and storage.

Market for chickens remained slow locally, but without additional price low. Values now were practically at the extreme low record mark for live offerings.

While the source was holding potato prices intact, very little action was shown in the movement. The city appeared unwilling to believe that prices will go materially higher and does not have the money to speculate.

More offers to buy onions were suggested at established points during the last 24 hours. Buyers appeared willing to pay 75c and sacks net, but few growers were willing to sell at the moment.

Market on honey was showing a slow trade, with late sales unusually small. Much low-grade and low priced extracted was being offered, which hurt the sale of good stock.

Celery prices were firmer to higher.

Good lettuce was scarce, best available was higher.

Cauliflower sales in carlots were better and at price rise.

Hothouse cucumbers were in fair call at 60c to 50c per dozen.

Quality tomatoes were practically off the market.

Some huckleberries were moving 8c to 10c per lb.

Word has been received that the invitation will be given consideration, although it is not certain Johnson will make the coast trip.

The colonel told his welcoming that he expected to spend several days here before starting to the Azores. It was said yesterday that he intended to fly back to the United States by way of the Azores and Bermuda.

WHEAT TUMBLES NEARLY 3 CENTS

CHICAGO, Nov. 15, (AP)—Giving way rapidly late today, wheat fell to nearly 3 cents under the best figures touched early.

One of the disconcerting factors was announcement that a cargo of spring wheat had departed as loading at Duluth for shipment to Chicago. Monetary uncertainties, however, formed the chief unsettling influence, with general lack of confidence by speculative buyers.

Wheat closed nervous, 1 1/2-3/4 under, yesterday's finish; corn 1 3/4-1/2 down, oats 1 1/2-3/4 off, and provisions varying from 17 cents decline to 7 cents advance.

Carlot shipments of potatoes in the United States Tuesday amounted to 516. Oregon supplied 19. Washington 15 and Idaho 114 cars. Maine shipped 133.

At Presque Isle, the market was steady. No. 1 Green Mountains brought mostly \$1.50 a hundred, sacked, in carloads f. o. b. shipping point.

At Idaho Falls trading was slightly better and the market firm. No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$5 to 9 1/2 cents a hundred, sacked, in carloads f. o. b. cash track.

In the Twin Falls Burley district a little better feeling prevailed this morning, but sales were too few to establish reliable prices.

At Yakima demand was moderate and the market about steady. Prices were unchanged but showing a firmer tendency.

No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$20 a ton, sacked, in carloads f. o. b. cash track.

Chicago reported practically no trading on account of the condition of the weather. Cars were not being opened on account of the extreme cold. Prices, however, were nominally unchanged.

At Fort Worth the market was firm, with supplies moderate and demand low. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought \$1.72 to \$1.75 a hundred, sacked, brokers carlot sales.

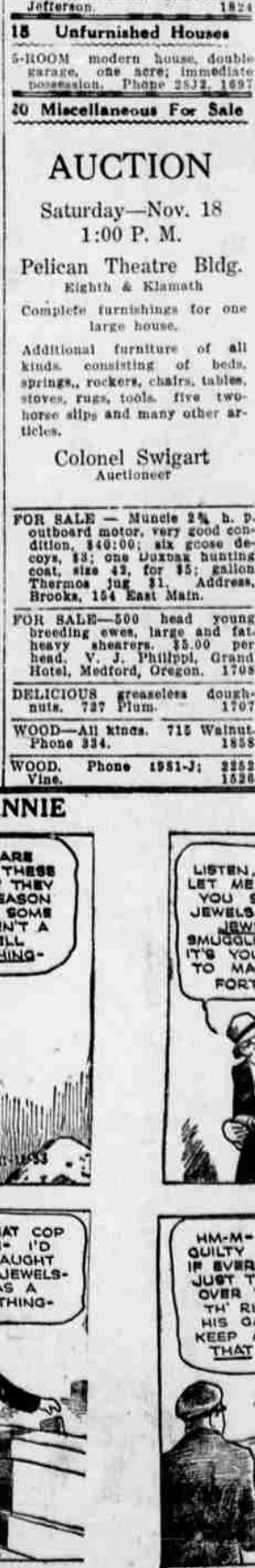
